M'NAMARA, ASSERTING INNOCENCE, HITS TRUST

Indianapolis, Ind., June 15.—Charging that secret agents of the United States Steel corporation once offered him money to betray the Structural Iron workers and assailing the National Erectors' association, John J. McNamara, now in jail in Los Angeles, charged with murder in connection with the alleged dynamiting of the Los Angeles Times, reiterates his innocence in a letter appearing in the current issue of the Bridgemen's magazine. The letters connect the steel trust with the fight against the unions.

"First we notice that the American Bridge company, which is not only the backbone of the National Erectors' association, but is also the erection department of the steel corporation, is the most ruthless organization of capital in the world," the letter says. "The plan is now and has been since its inception to throttle competition and crush and crushify its employees, meanwhile maintaining such control of the steel industry as to defy even the federal government."

TREASURE SHIP SPOKEN: ON WAY TO SAN PEDRO. San Diego, Cal., June 15.—The so-called treasure ship Eureka, of the North Pacific Steamship company, which is said to be bringing recovered gold from the Spanish main, was spoken at Salinas Cruz, June 8, by Captain G. STATE SUPREME COURT PROHIBITS OIL MERGER

Topeka, Kas., June 15.—A decision rendered by the Kansas supreme court prohibits combining and sitting of crude oil and transporting it to the Standard Oil company, which are chartered in Kansas. The three companies are the Standard Oil company of Indiana, the Standard of Kansas, and the Prairie Oil & Gas company. It was publicly made known today that the companies were working together as one system.

It was brought out in the evidence that the Prairie Oil & Gas company is the transportation company; buying the crude oil and transporting it to the Standard Oil company of Kansas, which is the refining company. The latter turns the refined product over to the Standard Oil company of Indiana, which is the marketing and of the enterprise. The state asserted that this division of labor showed an illegal agreement between the three.
