High Water Interferes With All Gear-Talls at \$1.95 and Flats at \$2 Confirmed Opening.

> Eggs weak. Chickens dragging. Strawberries stendy. Potatoes steady. More red onlons arrive. lops firm but quiet. Wool firm. Canned salmon firm.

Fishing operations have been practically suspended along the Columbia river and the few fish now being caught are almost too nominal to note. The seines have quit operation for a week and while the wheels are being operated few fish are being captured. Gilinetters report the smallest catch in years and practically none are being caught in the traps.

There are indications of a better run of flah after the high water subsides. A special from Monterey, Cal., says that the catch of salmon there is the heaviest for many seasons. This would indicate that the big run of fish has been delayed and is now making its way up the coast and will soon reach the Columbia river.

There is considerable speculation among the trade of the north as what the pack of salmon on the Frazier river will be the coming season. Some estimate that the output will reach 60,000 cases. Four years ago the pack there was 58,000 cases.

It has been estimated by British Columbia parties that the total pack of salmon there would be between 700,000 and 800,000 cases, and that the total pack of the coast, including Alaska, will be in the neighborhood of 4,000,000 cases.

The sockeye fishing season in northern British Columbia will open on June 26. At present fishing in northern waters is confined to springs and it is stated that these are not running very well, owing to unfavorable weather conditions.

Will Eold Opening Prices.

Notwithstanding the fact that Columbia river packers have made no formal opening prices, sales are still being confirmed on the basis of \$1.95 for pound tails, \$1.20 for half flats and \$2 for pound flats. Two packers, the Pillar Rock Packing company and the Warren Packing company, have sold practically their total output at these figures and all sales have been confirmed.

The J. K. Armsby company, the largest salmon selling firm in the world, has been the buyer of Columbia river fish at these prices and is said to be in the barket fom additional supplies at the same price. With Armsby as a persistent buyer and bidder for the 1911 pack of Columbia river fish at the sharp advance, it is not believed that other packers will care to sell for less. Seufert of The Dalles has also sold his pack at the advance but the output of the upper river man consists principally of halves.

"We will purchase all the salmon offered below the prices we have named," said Robert S. Farrell of the Pillar Rock Institution this morning.

Foreign salmon markets are reported as failows: Will Hold Opening Prices.

Liverpool—The demand from the country is most active, and half pound tins have advanced quite another 6d per case since last week. One pound flats are also strong and there is more attention being paid to best one pound talls, which, at the present time, are far the best value in salmon. Alaska is strongly held, and holders require about 6d per case more than they did a week ago.

London—The demand for salmon from the country, for all canned goods continues excellent, and business has been done in British Columbia and Alaska salmon this week at slightly higher prices.
