Weather Conditions. A high pressure field, central at sea off the Washington coast, is spreading eastward over Oregon, Washington and Idaho, and another high pressure area overlies the plains states and extends Idaho, and another high pressure area overlies the plains states and extends eastward to the lower lake region and then southeastward to the Atlantic coast. Low pressure areas are central this morning over Alberta, California, Louisians and the Canadian southeast, respectively. Light rain has fallen in extreme northwestern Washington, southwestern Montana, southern Saskatchewan, western Tennessee, North Carolina and southern Louisiana, and moderately heavy rain has fallen in southern Florida. Thunderstorms were reported from Swift Current, Havre-Helena, Winnemucca and Shreveport. The weather is alightly cooler in British Columbia, Washington, northern and western Idaho, northern Utah, northern Oregon and along the Oregon and California coast, in the Mississippi valley, and in the southeastern states, and it is much warmer in Nevsda, Arisons and in the north Atlantic states. In Arizona, southeastern Idaho, Saskatchewan, eastern Montana, western North Dakota, Manitoba, Minnesota, Wisconsin, Ontario and in the north Atlantic states temperatures are considerably above normal.


