Weather Conditions.

A high pressure field, central at sea off the Washington coast, is spreading eastward over Washington and Idaho, and another high pressure area overlies the plains states and extends eastward to the lower lake region and then southward to the Atlantic coast. Low pressure areas are central this morning over Alberta, California, Louisiana and the Canadian southeast, respectively. Light rain has fallen in extreme northwestern Washington, northwestern Montana, southern Saskatchewan, western Tennessee, North Carolina and southern Louisiana, and moderately heavy rain has fallen in southern Florida. Thunderstorms were reported from Swift Current, Hays, Helena, Winnemucca and Shreveport. The weather is slightly cooler in British Columbia, Washington, northern and western Idaho, northern Utah, northern Oregon and along the Oregon and California coast, in the Mississippi valley, and in the southeastern states, and it is much warmer in Nevada, Arizona and in the north Atlantic states, in Arizona, southeastern Idaho, Saskatchewan, eastern Montana, Wisconsin, Ontario and in the north Atlantic states temperatures are considerably above normal.

Conditions are favorable for generally fair weather tonight and Tuesday in this district, with lower temperatures tonight in southeastern Idaho. Winds will be mostly northwesterly.

Dr. Dechmann will be in Portland, Tuesday, June 27, when he will take to the Mothers' Congress, telling them how to cure and prevent the dreaded summer complaint. These lectures are delivered by Dr. Dechmann without price, with the view of helping as much as possible the cause of healthy children.

Lecture is Interesting.—An interesting talk on "Constitutional Government" was heard at the Y. W. C. A. yesterday by a large audience when Charles Frederick Adams, noted authority on the single tax propaganda, chose that for a subject. He told of the success of the plan of government in Galveston, Des Moines and other cities, and explained the methods in an interesting and able manner. The audience was greatly impressed with Mr. Adams' address.

FOUR CANDIDATES IN RACE TODAY IN SCHOOL ELECTION

Contest to Choose Successor to Mrs. Sitton as Member of Board of Education is Warm One.

Beginning at 7 o'clock this afternoon the polls at 25 places in the city were opened for the election of a member of the city board of education to succeed Mrs. W. W. Sitton. An active campaign in behalf of four candidates has created more than usual interest and a large vote is expected.

A. F. Fiegel, Jerry E. Brossough, M. G. Moody and Ben Risland, all of them attorneys, are candidates for the position. Each has the backing of a large number of friends who are interested in their success, and as each lives in a different section of the city, the voting is expected to reflect local preference in large degree.

FORMER MEMBER OF COUNCIL DIES

Frederick W. Hanson, Old Time Resident of Portland, Was Well Known.

Frederick William Hanson died at his home near Manor, Wash., last night, aged 84 years and 3 months. Mr. Hanson was born at Milwaukee, Or., April 19, 1827, and removed to Portland with his parents, Hans and Nancy Hanson, in 1858. He resided here until he moved to his farm and the place of his death in January, 1905.

Mr. Hanson was elected to the city council during the second administration of Mayor Mason, and served the city in that capacity for two years. He was then appointed superintendent of the county poor farm, which he managed for two years.

He was a member of the Sunnyside Methodist Episcopal church almost from its organization, and served on the official board of the church for many years. He was also superintendent of the Sunday school for several years. He was a member of the Oregon Pioneers' association.

Mr. Hanson was stricken with paralysis on November 14, 1910, and lingered until last Sunday night. He leaves a widow, Mrs. Alice Hanson; a son, A. C. Hanson, and two daughters, L. Hand Hanson and Mrs. E. A. Roberts, and one sister, Mrs. J. C. Roberts, and a brother, C. E. Hanson.

Funeral services will be held at the Sunnyside M. E. church, Wednesday, June 21, at 10:30 a. m. The funeral service will be conducted by Rev. Dr. T. B. Ford. Services at the grave will be private.

WILL MAKE RULE FOR RAILROADS

Oregon Commission to Meet at Union Stockyards June 20.

The Oregon railroad commission will meet at Portland Union Stockyards, North Portland, 10 o'clock, June 20, to consider the question of making a rule for railroads in Oregon applying to the handling of livestock in less than carload lots, on specified days in the week, at a minimum speed per mile. This will be in accordance with the livestock law adopted by the last legislature.

At the same time there will be considered the question of furnishing accommodations to shippers accompanying livestock. It is said to be important that every livestock shipper in the state attend this meeting, and the Portland Livestock exchange makes the request that there shall be a good attendance.

This hearing is the result of complaints that have been made to the railroad commission, and as no heavy evidence will be considered, a personal attendance at this meeting is important.

SERGEANT AT ARMS ON TRIAL FOR BRIBERY

Columbus, Ohio, June 18.—The second trial of Rodney Dietz, former sergeant-at-arms, for alleged bribery, in which it is charged he was a go-between for senators and detectives posing as lobbyists, began today. Dietz attempted to swear Judge Kinkaid off the bench on a charge of prejudice, but the affidavit was overruled by Judge Goldsberry.
