

CHINESE HUNTS MISSING SPOUSE

Woman Takes Adopted American Child—May Be Headed for China.

Somewhere in Portland Mrs. Lem She is believed to be hiding from her husband, Tau Gué Nuey, 31 North Fourth street. She disappeared June 16, taking with her a young child, an adopted American child, six years old, but left no word as to her intentions. The disappearance has been reported to the police and the husband has offered a reward of \$50 for her return to him.

"Billie" Vale, Chinese interpreter, who is active in the search for the woman, says that she has been wanting to return to China. Her husband said if she would wait a year he would go with her. She is believed to have become impatient to go. She is said to have several hundred dollars in her possession.

Mrs. Lem She is about 35 years old, five feet two inches tall and her weight is about 110 pounds. The little girl is dressed in boys' clothing and the woman when seen last was attired in American clothing with her hair done up on her head. For Special Privileges. No special privileges will be accorded to anyone during the coronation ceremonies. The police have decided to refuse all requests of princes and visiting royalties for special street passes during the time of the parade. Moving pictures of the coronation itself will not be taken. Permission for a moving picture camera inside Westminster abbey was denied as cinematograph company, and the only picture that will be taken will be those by Sir Benjamin Stone, official photographer.

The robes and coronation regalia have been removed from the tower of London and are stored in Buckingham palace. Many of those who will participate in

Special Ambassador John Hays Hammond, representing the United States, is delighted today with the dinner at which King George and Queen Mary semi-formally entertained the visiting envoys at Buckingham palace last night. "It was bully," was Hammond's comment today.

The American special ambassador was the only untitled person at the banquet. Most of the royalties present were accompanied by their wives. Hammond dined alone. He was attired in court dress, silk knee breeches, silk hose and slippers. Above the waist his costume consisted of conventional evening dress. He escorted Princess Alexandra of Teck.

King Honors Hammond.
King George talked longer with Hammond than with any other guest and requested the pleasure of another conversation today.

After dinner Mrs. Hammond joined her husband and went to the ball given by the Duchess of Sutherland. The Duchess of Argyll, an old friend, took charge of the Hammonds. Mrs. Hammond wore a gown in the style of Catherine or Aragon.

The distribution of honors to many well known Britishers was announced last night. Sir Joseph Ward, prime minister of New Zealand, is made a baronet. Andrew Fisher, premier of Australia, and Sir Edward Morris, premier of New Foundland, are made privy councillors. A baronetcy has been bestowed upon Dr. William Osler, regius professor of medicine at Oxford and formerly professor of medicine at Johns Hopkins university, Baltimore, and McGill university, Montreal.

The Earl of Crewe, formerly Liberal leader in the house of commons, is made a marquis. Lord Rosebery, Lord Curzon and Lord Brassey are made earls.

Secretaries Are Honored.

The Right Honorable Alexander W. Murray, master of Elibank; Baron Knollys, the king's secretary; Baron Allendale and the Right Honorable Aretas Akers Douglas, Unionist member of the house of commons for Kent, are made viscounts.

The king's secretaries are recognized. Lord Knollys and Lieutenant Colonel Sir Arthur A. Bigger, the latter being one of the nine new barons created. The others are Lord Mountgarrett, Sir Charles M. McLaren, Sir Alexander Aoland-Hood, Sir William T. Lewis, mining expert, Sir James L. Mackay, Archibald C. Corbett, member of parliament for Glasgow since 1895; Thomas Gair Ashton, M. P. for Bedfordshire, and Godfrey R. Benson.

FIRE ON LOGGED LAND - OBSCURES ABERDEEN

Aberdeen, Wash., June 20.—Smoke from a large fire northwest of this place is so dense that the sun can hardly penetrate it. The atmosphere is so thick with the smoke as to obscure objects on the outskirts of town. The fire, which has probably started in some logging camp, has gotten beyond control and finds plenty to feed upon in the slashings and dead timber, which is all exceedingly dry, as no rain of any account has fallen for weeks. This section is experiencing a long dry spell. There is still plenty of water for the use of the city, but if it does not rain soon the supply will be greatly shortened.

Polk Eighth Grades Do Well.

Salem, Or., June 20.—School Superintendent H. C. Seymour, Polk county, has reported to the state department of education the total results of the eighth grade examination in his county. During the year there have been 211 pupils who passed the examination and 176 who passed, making a per cent of 83.4 successful. Mary Howard of the Independence school won second place with an average of 95.2 per cent.

VENERABLE ABBOT IS CROSS-EXAMINED

Sight of Mt. Angel's Founder Under Legal Fire Seems Incongruous.

Salem, Or., June 20.—When Father Prior, the venerable founder of the abbey at Mount Angel, took the witness stand to testify in the contested will

Nine Hours for Women Workers.

Jefferson City, Mo., June 20.—The women's nine hour law recently enacted by the Missouri legislature becomes effective today. It provides that no woman or girl shall be required to work in any manufacturing, mechanical or merchandising establishment more than nine hours in any one day or more than 56 hours in any one week.

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
