## Pasco Pastor's Novel Scheme Will Insure One Big Congregation.

(Special Dispates to The Journal : Kennewick, Wash., June 22.—In responding to an invitation to preach to the people in the little village of Ringold, where there is no church building, Rev. Earle Munger, pastor of the Con-gregational church of Pasco, has conceived the idea of taking his choir, congregation and church along with him and at the same time combining the features of a Sunday picule with his regular religious services.

Rev. Munger was in Kennewick yesterday to charter the Open River Transportation company's steamer Inland Empire, which for one Sabbath day will lose its identity as a steamboat, and be known as the Congregational Church of Pasco. The boat will leave Pasco early Sunday morning with minister, pulpit congregation and all on board, for an all day excursion up the river. At Ringold villagers will be taken aboard and religious services will be conducted as the boat steams or.

Music, a basket lunch and other picnic features will be combined with the regular Sunday services. Mr. Munger expects a huge congregation on that day.

The state of Washington has three representatives and Idaho and South Carolina one each.

Among the number are city school superintendents, county school supervisors, departmental teachers in high schools and other teachers of special grade teachers. The strong course in high school methods has attracted many science, given by W. F. Fargo, teacher of physics at the Salem high school. The summer students are planning a


