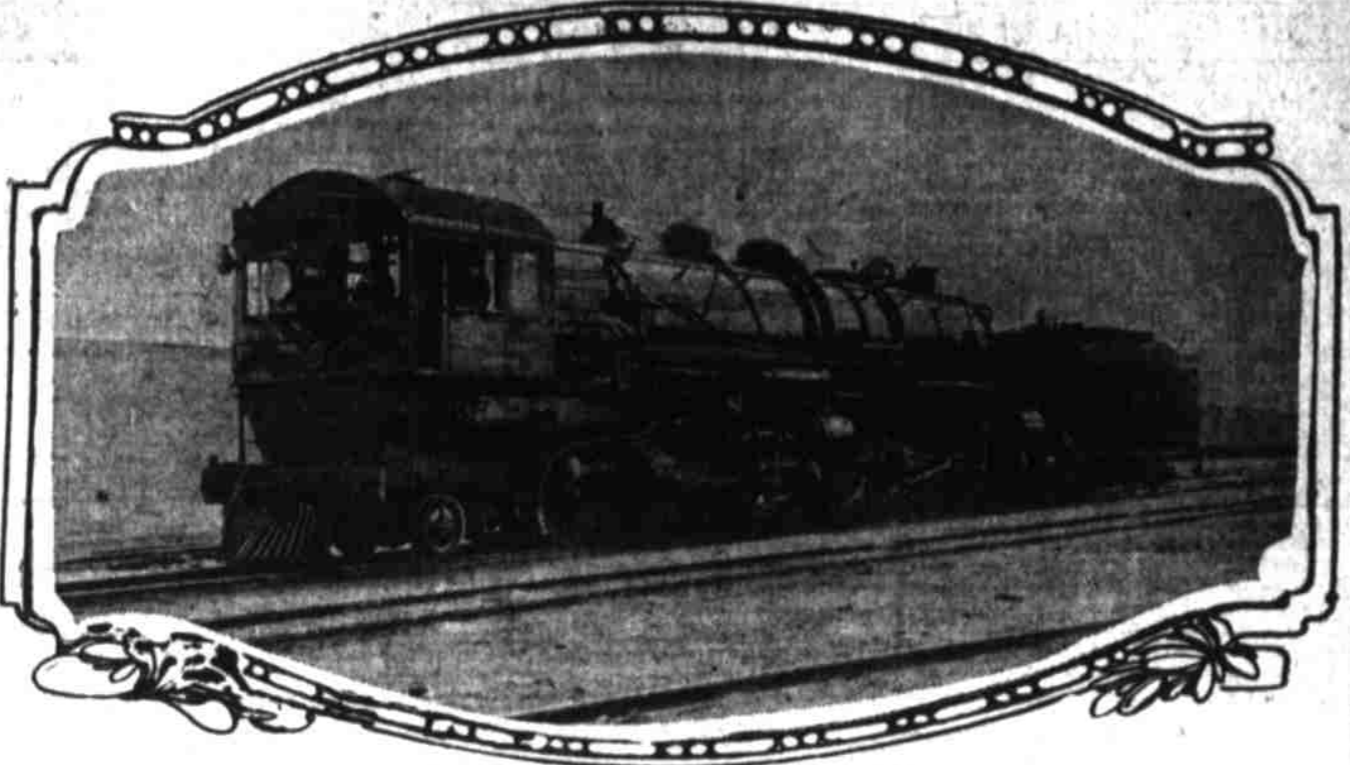
Pasco Pastor's Novel Scheme Will Insure One Big Congregation.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Kennewick, Wash., June 22.—In responding to an invitation to preach to the people in the little village of Ringold, where there is no church building, Rev. Earle Munger, pastor of the Congregational church of Pasco, has conceived the idea of taking his choir, congregation and church along with him and at the same time combining the features of a Sunday picnic with his regular religious services.

Rev. Munger left Kennewick yesterday to charter the Open River Transportation company's steamer Inland Empire, which for one Sabbath day will lose its identity as a steamboat, and be known as the Congregational Church of Pasco. The boat will leave Pasco early Sunday morning with minister, pulpit, congregation and all on board, for a day's excursion up the river. At Ringold the villagers will be taken aboard and religious services will be conducted as the boat steams on.

Music, a basket lunch and other picnic features will be combined with the regular Sunday services. Mr. Munger expects a huge congregation on that day.

MR. ROTHCHILD'S HUMOR DID IT ALL

North Powder Knows Now How Packing Plants Are Built.

Baker, Or., June 22.—North Powder's sweet dream, that the Armour Packing company was to establish a \$1,500,000 packing plant at that place, has gone glimmering, having had its origin in a practical joke on a well known resident of that place by M. Rothchild, a North Powder merchant. The Oregon Daily Journal was the only northwest newspaper at the time to view the story as a hoax.

A young man whose name is really Armour, came to Rothchild's name as a representative and investigated a supply house, to sell him a bill of goods. Taking advantage of the name, he was introduced to a friend of Rothchild, with the explanation that he was in North Powder for the purpose of making preliminary arrangements for an establishment there for the great packing company whose name he bore. This is the immense plant, talk of which filled the air at North Powder, and local papers ever since.

To make the joke good Armour scattered inquiries and investigated land, and the North Powderites began to have visions of a large metropolis. The faith of those who fell for the story was somewhat shaken when he failed to return as he promised, but they hung to the belief as long as they could, until the announcement of Rothchild's joke was made, and now it is said that old friends refuse to speak as the result of having taken sides in the controversy as to whether or not the packing plant was to be built.

TEACHERS TRAINING AT SUMMER SCHOOL

Representatives From Four States Gather at O. A. C. for Special Work.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Or., June 22.—Washington, Idaho and South Carolina, as well as 13 counties of Oregon are represented in the summer session enrollment for the first few days at the Oregon Agricultural college, making a total of 78, most of whom are teachers seeking additional training.

Benton county naturally leads in point of numbers with 18, of whom 11 are from Corvallis; Yamhill is next with 10; Clackamas 8; Multnomah 6; Polk 5; Douglas, Lane, Umatilla, Wasco and Washington, 3 each; Clatsop, Linn, Morrow and Marion, 2 each; Coos, Hood River, Lincoln, Harney, Tillamook, 1 each.

The state of Washington has three representatives, Idaho and South Carolina one each.

Among the number are city school superintendents, county school superintendents, departmental teachers in high schools and other teachers of special subjects, as well as many rural and grade teachers. The strong course in high school methods has attracted many as has also the course in high school science, given by W. F. Fargo, teacher of physics at the Salem high school.

During the summer the college is planning a trip to Mary's Peak for the purpose of camping at the foot and climbing to the snowy summit on Saturday. There is also to be a reception this week at Waldo hall for the purpose of making the students and instructors of the session acquainted.

Why Baker Rate Decision Is Late.

Baker, Or., June 22.—The delay in a ruling by the state railroad commission in the Baker rate case, which was heard by the commission in this city last fall when Governor West was then a member, according to President F. J. Miller, is caused by the fact that the commissions of this state and Washington, which are working on almost parallel cases, might not agree in details. On the other hand they might agree, he states, but then the interstate commission might step in and say both were wrong, so the two bodies are delaying a report, until they have met in joint session, with a representative of the interstate commerce commission. The conference will be in August, July or August, with Portland as the probable place of meeting. Mr. Miller would volunteer no opinion as to the outcome, which is eagerly awaited in Baker, as well as in Medford, which city in the western part of the state has the same interests at stake.
