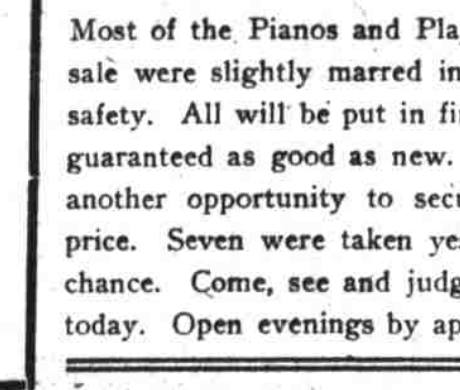
KNABE PIANOS IN RAILROAD SMASH-UP
