

HUNDREDS ADMIRE EXQUISITE BLOOMS AT HEIGHTS CLUB

Thousands of Beautiful Roses Exhibited, Among Them, Being Imported Blossoms Shown Here for First Time.

Six thousand roses were picked over yesterday morning in order that the most perfect specimens grown on the lawns of Portland Heights might be placed on exhibition at the Portland Heights Rose Show which opened yesterday afternoon in the main room of the Portland Heights club, at Twenty-first and Spring streets. The result was a veritable fairland of beauty.

Climatic conditions make the rose season on the heights later than in the lower sections of the city and the backwardness of the present season delayed the blooms until the Rose Festival was over. The residents of the heights are too enthusiastic, however, as rosearians to let their beauties go without giving their friends a chance to admire them. The rain of Wednesday night damaged many blossoms but the finest were saved.

Fine Specimens Shown.
Mrs. A. C. Panton's exhibit is the feature of the show, and with reason, for among her roses are two varieties which have never been shown here before, one, the Miss Cynthia Ford, being shown for the first time in the United States. Mrs. Panton had this rose sent from London, where it won the gold medal in 1910. It is a very beautiful, delicate pink. The other new variety is the Golden Lena. Among the roses Mrs. Panton is showing the second time is the Mrs. Nicholas Longworth. Mrs. Panton is one of the most successful rosearians in Portland and has developed several varieties of her own. One of her finest is a William Sheen, seven inches in diameter. Altogether Mrs. Panton exhibited 45 varieties.

Mrs. Fletcher also has a fine exhibit, her Ulrich Brunner display being very striking. Some of the blooms are six inches in diameter. The display of Mrs. Harrison Allen is especially noteworthy for seven of her specimens are from bushes only six months old, yet are as perfect as most older ones.

Several Blooms Exhibited.
Two exhibits by Mr. Blaise Labbe and one by Mrs. John Cronan are especially interesting novelties. Mr. Labbe shows two black calice lilies similar to the white variety, but several times larger. The plant has five blossoms, of which Mr. Labbe cut two to exhibit. His other novelty is a beautiful lavender Queen Victoria climber. Mrs. Cronan shows a vase of water lilies grown in her fountain.

Among the other exhibits are those of Mrs. R. J. Grace, Miss Louise Pfunder, W. J. Jellison, Mrs. J. A. Curry, Mrs. Isadore Lang, Mrs. A. Decker, Mrs. F. H. Page, J. H. Page, W. H. Lash, Miss Harriet Jellison, Miss Gladys Sigel, Mrs. Jay Smith, Mrs. Arthur Spencer, Mrs. John A. Keating, Mrs. F. L. Fuller, Mrs. George W. Lilly, Mrs. J. W. Cook and Mrs. John S. Bradley.

The room in which the exhibit is held is prettily decorated with Caroline Testout and other roses. The exhibition will end tonight. Many parties are enjoying the show. J. A. Curry, president of the Portland Heights club, and Mrs. Jay Smith, chairman of the exhibition, assisted by members, are in charge.

CITY DEFENDED BY MAY ROBSON

Popular Actress Sweeps Away
Drew's Eloquence in Be-
half of Country.

It's great work, this thing of being a part of the Hellig jury to decide between the city and the country. W. Somerset Maugham of England, aided by John Drew, argued the country's side of the case all the first half of the week. He came pretty near to convincing everyone that city folks are bound straight for perdition. And now last night came May Robson for the defense, and swept away all John Drew's eloquence. Who wouldn't live in the city with May Robson and "Aunt Mary" to help make things lively? It's probably just as well there aren't many women lawyers—there would be no use for logic if there were.

The last time Miss Robson was here in "The Rejuvenation of Aunt Mary" there weren't enough people who saw her. Portland tried to remedy that last night by filling the Hellig. No audience that falls short of taking every seat in the theatre is big enough for this happy actress and her fun-making play. After her last visit she promised to come back because she loved Portland and Portland roses. That Portland returns her sentiments must have been shown to Miss Robson's complete satisfaction last evening.

Though Aunt Mary herself was in some need of rejuvenation, it is to be doubted if the play that tells about it will grow old. It is one of those rare things that bears repetition with ease. To think of Miss Robson taking up anything else is impossible. It is to be doubted if her public would allow it. The character of the old maid, who gets her taste of city life and decides after that she "isn't strong enough to live in the country" her arguments with Lucinda, the hired girl, her spats with her nephew Jack, her adventures with his friends, are all so impregnated with tears and laughter, so full of kindly humanity, as to defy time. We hope our grand children will go to see Miss Robson and Aunt Mary.

The supporting company this season is unusually good. Nina Saville as Lucinda is delightfully funny. So is Lotia Blake as the begging woman of the village whom Aunt Mary has helped support through life. The boys are surprisingly capable. Most stage boys of 30 or thereabouts are not to be tolerated. Jack Storey, Paul Decker, Arthur Deering and John McMahon are the real thing in a likeable, lively way. Pay Cusick is an attractive girl and Lester Wallace is a villainous looking lawyer.

It isn't necessary to advise people who have seen Miss Robson in this play before to go—they will, anyway; but those who haven't seen it, should. It makes life happier and leaves no sting.

DEFECTIVE ORDINANCE IS VETOED BY MAYOR

In accordance with an announcement made in The Journal, Mayor Simon yesterday vetoed the ordinance passed at the last session of the council calling for a special election in January for the purpose of voting on a revised charter embodying the commission plan of government.

The ordinance was defective in its legal phraseology. A new ordinance correcting this defect will be submitted to the council by the mayor next Wednesday.

The mayor also vetoed an ordinance granting a revocable permit to the Portland Railway, Light & Power Co. to construct a switch track on East Couch street. The ordinance is so framed as to permit the company to lay the track any time in the next three years. The mayor believes that only one year's time should be given.

NO MORE OREGON MONEY FOR TIPS

Olcott Will Allow No More
Items for Gratuities in
Expense Bills.

Salem, Or., June 23.—The tipping evil has become so persistent and universal that it has passed the common nuisance stage and is now nothing short of an abomination, declares Secretary of State Ben W. Olcott. "The state of Oregon has long been sanctioning and

giving, not only its cash, but its moral support to the tipping evil. I believe it is time the state should cease to spend the money of the taxpayers to help perpetuate this evil.

"In the past it has been the custom of this office to pass expense items of the state officers covering tips to porters and other employees of hotels and public service corporations. Hereafter, as long as I have anything to say about it, no claim of this character will be allowed to get through the secretary of state's office. Any state official, regardless of his importance or position in the public service, who desires to spend money for tips, will have to use his own funds for the purpose.

"While tipping may have had some merits in the past, the custom has certainly been abused. It works embarrassment and hardship on many who, financially unable to meet its demands, have to accede to it at a personal sacrifice in order that they may save themselves the humiliation of being branded as 'cheap.' These—and this includes the

most of us—have not the courage of their convictions, or this form of evil would have long since been stamped out of the body politic."

RUNAWAY TEAM IS STOPPED BY DRIVER

Presence of mind on the part of a driver stopped a runaway at the east end of Morrison bridge this morning. A runaway team on the wrong side of the street started to cut across to the opposite side. A driver coming toward the runaway turned his team across in front of the frightened horses, stopping them. No damage resulted.

An accident a few minutes later delayed the westbound cars on the same bridge for several minutes. The brakes of one of the Sunnyside cars failed to work and it crashed into a car ahead, breaking the cross bar holding the draw bar up and doing slight damage to the front of the car.
