

ADE AND M'GUTCHEON TIED TO TREES; RUSH MADE TO HOSPITAL.

(United Press Lead Wire.) Indianapolis, June 24.—Held up by daring highwaymen, George Ade, John T. McCutcheon and E. M. Holloway, all of Chicago, but formerly of Indiana, were today bound to neighboring and friendly trees on the outskirts of Indianapolis and robbed of everything of value found lurking about their clothes. After being backed up to the trees, the victims were also compelled to stand hitched while a long line of automobiles bearing the Indiana Society of Chicago filed by to the grounds where the society's annual outing was held.

The hold-up was the first of a series of "stunts" carried out today by the local committee which planned the entertainment of the returning "exiled" Hoosiers.

Old fiddlers, bun eating contests, dressing races and "mild" amusements kept the 300 picknickers busy during an occasional shower which also drove

many to the much advertised "Knickerbocker" hospital.

To gain admittance to the "hospital," it was necessary to knock three times. The "knocker" would then be allowed to advance to the operating table, which was a long mahogany affair with a brass rail on which patients might rest one foot.

Immediately on arriving on the grounds George Ade sprinkled a confetti path leading toward the hospital sign, for friends who asked me to look out for them," he said.

LOVE PROMPTS HIM TO KILL HIS TWIN

Murderer-By-Request Practically Freed By Japanese Court as Press Applauds.

(United Press Lead Wire.) Tokyo, June 24.—Killing his brother because he loved him well is the gist of a police case concluded here today which casts a curious light on Japanese habits of thought and in a record for the empire. Mutsu Kato, the murderer-by-request, has been practically freed by the district judge and the Tokyo press is unanimous in praise of his verdict.

Mutsu Kato and his brother, Sura Kato, were twins and loved each other with an affection rare even among the Japanese. When Sura became stricken with cancer of the stomach he asked his brother to kill him, pleading that to be dispatched thus by a loving hand would be the greatest pleasure he could enjoy. For days Sura refused, but finally consented and after a heart rending parting, slew his brother with a sword. Immediately afterward the slayer reported the whole matter to the police.

When brought to trial the executioner through lowly wept bitterly. He was sentenced to two years' imprisonment but the execution of the sentence was postponed by the judge for three years, this being tantamount to a cancellation of the punishment. The trial was a record, no manslaughter case under similar circumstances ever before having been tried in Japan.

PRESIDENT AWAITS CONGRESS' ACTION ON CANADIAN PACT

(Continued from Page One.) It is best to revise it schedule by schedule. We have made a good start on that plan. We will continue as we have begun. The country endorses what the house is doing. If the Republican senate beats our bills or President Taft vetoes them we will appeal to the country and it will sustain us. We believe we are right. We are not afraid of a contest.

Senator Stone said today that the reciprocity bill must be passed without the crossing of a T or the dotting of an I. "Most of our side feel that way about it," he said. "After that is done we can turn our attention to other tariff matters."

He added that what was done in the way of revision depended on whether the insurgent Republicans would cooperate.

Democrats Will Oppose. Senator Cummins, who with Senator La Follette, will lead in the effort to get the reciprocity agreement amended with general tariff revisions, admitted that as it stands now, most of the Democrats will oppose amendment of the reciprocity agreement.

Senator Penrose, chairman of the finance committee, has advised Republican senators to wait until the regular session before doing anything with the tariff further than to pass reciprocity. He has vouchsafed the information that President Taft intended to send in a message, probably special, at the opening of the next congress, urging revision of the wool schedule along the lines that will at this time be recommended by the tariff board.

Senator Penrose has indicated that he will be willing to undertake revision of the wool schedule then and perhaps general revision.

Insurgents and Democrats, however, do not trust a Penrose revision of the wool schedule and would like to take that job off his hands.

(Continued from Page One.) The stringency of that year of bank failures became acute. Edson M. Rowley, who with S. M. Beard, controlled the bank prior to its sale to the Phillips-Aldrich interests in 1906, was at that time one of its patrons and disposed to aid it.

Between the time of the sale in 1906 and June, 1907, Washington adopted a banking law which required the publication of statements showing the condition of banking institutions at intervals. In June of that year President Phillips told Mr. Rowley in effect that the bank was heavily loaded with real estate, and he was not certain how the bank examiner would view it.

He suggested an arrangement by which Mr. Rowley should turn in notes to the bank to be held there for "a while," thereby strengthening its apparent assets. Rowley consented to do this, but insisted on being given a bond for deed on waterfront property owned by the bank. On June 12, 1907, he placed three notes in the bank for amounts aggregating \$55,000, these notes running for one year, and received in return a bond for deed from Phillips.

The Rowley notes are supposed to have appeared as an added asset for the bank. The investigation will show as to this. Had the bank failed during the time these notes were running, Rowley probably would have been "stuck" for the full \$55,000, since the title to the waterfront land stood in the name of the bank and the bond for deed was executed by Phillips.

By the time the year was up on the notes Rowley became uneasy. He did not consider the waterfront property worth enough to secure the notes. The notes were given as an accommodation, without consideration, to fit a temporary purpose, and had assisted the bank to weather the shock of panic in the

GOATS SUPPLY FAMILY WITH PURE MILK



In order that her two small children may have pure, fresh milk Mrs. Charles J. Maher, of 777 East Market street, has recently purchased three milk goats. Two of these are giving milk and supply Mrs. Maher with a gallon a day.

The goat's milk is a great deal like a cow's milk except that the butter fat in it is much finer particles and the cream is white and not so thick as that of the cow. The milk can be used for every purpose that a cow's milk can.

The goats are easily kept on a back lot and require much less attention than a cow. Contrary to the popular notion, they are very clean and are very dainty about their eating, scornful tin cans and old clothes, but very fond of clover.

If given a chance to keep clean goats will supply milk which one need not fear is watered, dirty or germ-laden, and children can be allowed to drink it without fear. It is also considered a very easy food for youngsters to assimilate.

One of Mrs. Maher's goats is a Spanish Maletese and the other two are American milk goats. Mrs. Maher became interested in milk goats several years ago, but was unable to procure any until lately. The goats are great

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DISSECTING TABLE HOLDS SON'S BODY

Father Finds Corpse of Missing Son in Colorado Anatomical Laboratory.

Denver, June 24.—A pathetic story was told the state authorities tonight when C. S. Sanberg reported finding the body of his son on a dissecting table at the state university at Boulder, Colo., after a search lasting one year and extending to all parts of the country.

The youth, Carl Anton Sanberg, was a victim of tuberculosis. One year ago he disappeared from home here after telling his parents that he knew he was dying of consumption and that he intended to relieve them of the worry and responsibility of caring for him.

The lad was then in the last stages of tuberculosis. His father searched hospitals and sanitariums in all parts of the country, and finally, discouraged, began to investigate the deaths of unidentified persons in Denver. One of these led to the state university medical department, where the grief-stricken father this afternoon came upon the corpse of his son, partially dissected by the knives of the students.

NO DEED ON RECORD TO ASYLUM TRACT

State Spent \$200,000 on the Property to Which Title Lay in an Out-of-Way Box.

(State Bureau of the Journal.) Salem, Or., June 24.—After the state of Oregon had expended over \$200,000 in improvements on a tract of land adjoining the asylum, she still had no valid title to the land. This fact was discovered recently by Surveyor W. J. Culver, who was running out lines for the state. He found that no deed had been recorded for the site of the new receiving ward, which has been constructed at heavy expense, and to which wings costing \$70,000 will soon be added.

Secretary of State Olcott instituted a systematic search and located the unrecorded deed in an out-of-way nook in the archives of the governor's office where it had been carelessly thrown by a clerk in the former administration. Fire in the state house would have left the state without any hold upon the land upon which so much had been expended.

The officers at work on the case have relaxed their vigilance an instant since they started in to run down the do-gooders who killed the woman and two little children. Much of their time has been spent in following clues offered in good faith, but that have ended in the arrest of persons easily proved innocent of connection with the Hill affair. It has been thought necessary, because of public safety, however, to follow up and arrest suspicious characters.

Residents of Milwaukie, Sellwood and the district about Ardenwald have been in a state of terror since the murders were reported, kept so by the frequent appearance of tramps or others who acted in a suspicious manner. Such a case occurred yesterday afternoon, when two men called at the homes of Mrs. McIntyre and Mrs. Ray in Milwaukie and asked for food.

Bummers Fly Fast. Mrs. Ray saw a man at the door, remembered that there was a man on the chopping block in the back yard, and cried for help. One excited man rushed up with a revolver which fortunately failed to explode the cartridges when he pulled the trigger. The men were caught, told a straight story, were fed and turned loose again to continue their way to Oregon City.

Another report published by an afternoon paper gave an excited account of the escape of an Alaskan insane patient from Dr. Henry Waldo Coe's sanitarium at Monticello, saying it had just been discovered that he was loose and was undoubtedly the fiend who had attacked women and murdered the Hills. Journal readers were told of the escape of the lunatic and its possible connection with the Hill case two weeks ago this morning. There has been nothing to show that he murdered the Hills or ever attacked women.

BRIDGE PAINTER GETS 10,000 VOLTS AND LIVES

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Oregon City, June 24.—Harry Henderson, a Portland painter, received a voltage estimated at 10,000 this afternoon at 3:45 o'clock, and yet will recover, local physicians say tonight.

Henderson was at work on the suspension bridge over the Willamette here. When he leaned against the live wires, he was knocked to the floor of the bridge, unconscious. He is now at Willamette hospital.

Henderson is 26 years old. Henderson, one of the proprietors of the Pacific Tent & Awning company of Portland, is an uncle. The painter has two bad burns and doctors worked over him two hours.

ROGUE RIVER WHIRLPOOL CLAIMS ANOTHER VICTIM

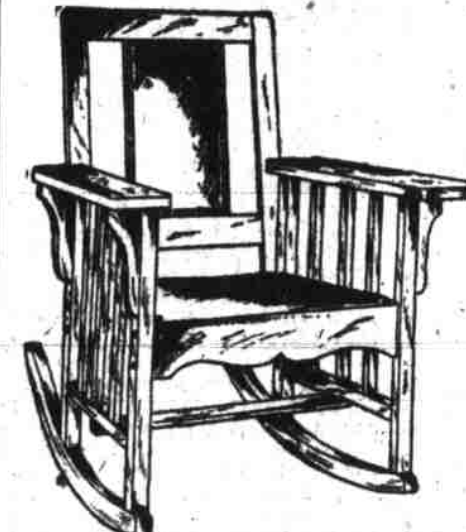

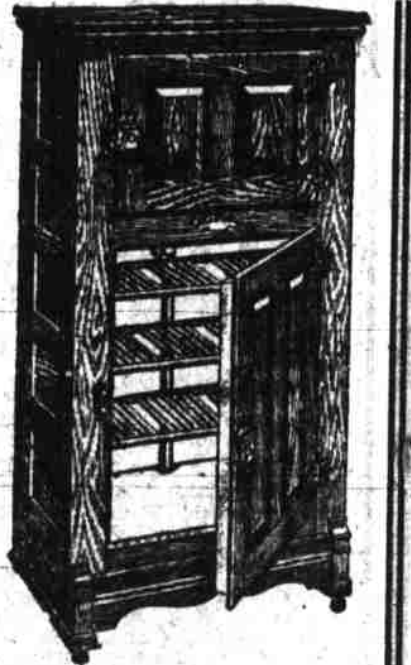
