On reaching Cape Rock the stiff winds freshened to gales and the waves became mountainous.

From that time until she reached the Straits of Magellan the storm pursued the Ethelwolf and runs of 70, 79, 83 and 90 knots per day are on the log for that part of the passage. While floundering 50 miles off Punta Arenas the breakdown in the Ethelwolf's boiler rred. Two cracks that appeared in the two furnaces of the starboard boiler widened into big gaps, from which big amounts of steam and water began to insue, while the Chinese engine room crew fied to the deck in terror. Steam was shut off that boiler and the Ethelwolf limped into Punta Arenas on one boiler. She left there April 23 and arrived at Coronel May 3. She was delayed at that port for three days because of another steamer coaling there. and she proceeded on the last leg of her voyage May 6.
