An ordinance calling for a special election 'to submit charter amendments to the voters January 9, 1912, was introduced in the city council this morning and referred to the judiciary committee. The ordinance was submitted by Mayor-elect Rushlight.

If the measure is passed by the coun-cil it will provide for the submission to voters of amendments embodying the commission plan of government, these amendments to be prepared by the committee of 15 taxpayers and citizens ap-pointed by Mayor Simon to revise the present charter.

The ordinance provides that the ballot shall be so drafted as to permit of a vote being taken on the commissio plan as a whole or upon any general amendments that may be put before the voters, in the event that the committee of 15 does not embody its amendments so that they can he voted on altogether, Mayor's Veto Sustained.
