

KING AND CONSORT TRAVEL IN STATE THROUGH STREETS

British Subjects Peep Over
Top of Troops' Heads at
Royal Progress—Special
Service at St. Paul's.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
London, June 29.—Traffic through the very center of London was tied up again today by another "royal progress." The royal party included King George, Queen Mary and the Prince of Wales. First they drove from Buckingham palace to St. Paul's cathedral, attended a short service and then journeyed on to the Guild Hall for luncheon with the lord mayor, Sir T. Vesey Strong. Luncheon over, they returned to Buckingham palace, by a devious route through north and central London to give as many of their subjects as possible a chance to see them.

The royal carriage was met and preceded to the cathedral by the lord mayor and a big party of city sheriffs, councillors and lesser officials.

Public interest in the royal progress today was not great and the crowds were of the most meagre description. There were more troops than spectators in the streets through which the pageant passed.

The service at St. Paul's was a special one of thanksgiving for their majesties' safe coronation. It lasted about 20 minutes. Then the procession reformed and proceeded to Guild Hall, where the king having been installed on the royal dais, the lord mayor read an address of welcome. The king replied briefly and then the party adjourned to the famous Guild Hall banquet chamber for luncheon.

At the banquet the company numbered about 700. It included Premier Asquith, Home Secretary Churchill, Chancellor of the Exchequer David Lloyd-George, the rest of the cabinet, the political leaders of all British parties, the foreign ambassadors in London and the representatives of all the British colonies.

The lord mayor proposed the toast of "The King" and "The Queen and the Royal Family," but according to custom there were no speeches, the king merely responding by proposing the health of "The Lord Mayor and Corporation."

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be a certain fact. Residences burning a few, varying in number with occasion, would be uncertain. If all paid the same rate it would certainly not be just to them."

Mr. Montague said that the fact of the water department's having installed meters for a fourth of the homes made the factor of injustice all the greater to those who have no meters, and pay

therefore, upon a flat rate, several times as much as the home where the water is measured by meter.

Mr. Montague asserted his belief that the water department's argument that the income of the department would be uncertain was all "tommyrot."

No Argument Against Meters.

"There can be no sound economic argument against the adoption of the meter system throughout the city," he said. "There will always be a certain minimum of water use which can be used as basis for contracts and expenditures. The charging of a minimum rate makes this income all the more certain."

It was deducible from the three interviews that Portland homes without meters pay for the fact of water supply. With meters they pay for what they get. Without meters waste continues necessitating new equipment without benefit. All were convinced that new expenditure to balance waste is not good investment, that the waste should be stopped and that meters will accomplish this object.

The citizens who want the incoming water board and city council to install meters at every home express belief that they will do so, because of Mayor-Elect Rumligh's favorable attitude, and because of the fact that they think justice and equity can in no other way be given the small home owner and water user who has been paying for the wastefulness of the larger water user.

They point out, too, that the excessive use of water in sprinkling when then be stopped. It is said that sprinkling goes on uninterrupted by inspection, throughout the night at many places. At other places water in summer is allowed to run to keep it cool and in winter it runs to prevent freezing. These are some of the items of waste. It is pointed out, which will be

stopped when the new water board has ordered that meters be installed.

Seamen's Strike.

That something must be done to end the struggle, and at once, is the view of Premier Asquith, who today is bringing all the power of his position into play to bring about a settlement. Enormous quantities of foodstuffs are needed in Britain at once, as the United Kingdom has less than one month's supply of imported foods on hand.

That the premier will be unable to settle the war unless the shipping companies capitulate was strongly intimated today by the leaders of the union. They issued a statement blaming officials of the White Star for the trouble and saying they would not return to work unless all their demands were granted in full.

The action of the Glasgow lines was followed here today by the Cunard and Southern Pacific lines, which settled with the unions, according to recognition and all other demands.

Shipping at Standstill.

Glasgow, June 29.—All shipping in the Clyde is at a standstill today as the result of the seamen's strike. Reeling rioting followed attempts to operate the docks by strikebreakers and a large number of persons were injured.

Demand Full Recognition.

Liverpool, June 29.—Except mail tend-

ers, all shipping is tied up here today. The board of trade and leading citizens are trying to settle the strike, but the men will consent to return to work on nothing short of full recognition of their union.

The stewards of the various liners in port struck in sympathy this afternoon. Rioting is general all along the waterfront.

Riots Are Threatened.

Hull, England, June 29.—The harbor here today is filled with ships loaded with perishable freight and business is at a standstill. The board of trade is seeking to effect a settlement of the strike. There have been numerous small riots already and these promises to become severe, as the shipowners are preparing to operate with strikebreakers.

Ships Congest Harbor.

Southampton, June 29.—Ships congest the harbor here today and the hotels are jammed with tourists as a result of the huge seamen's strike. The travelers, most of whom are Americans, are unable to return home and their sailings will be cancelled unless a settlement of the labor troubles is quickly reached.

indications were that no senator would be elected from Illinois and suggested that Lorimer might solve the problem. After that I met Aldrich in his office, when he said: 'I would like to have you come to the White House and tell the president about the Springfield situation.'

"He telephoned to the White House at 10:30 at night, asking the president to see him. He asked me to go as well,

but I objected that my presence might embarrass the president. Then Aldrich said: 'All right, you go to my house and wait for me.'

"At midnight Aldrich returned and said the president had suggested that Lorimer be the candidate. He suggested that I telephone Lorimer. I accordingly telephoned that I had just talked with Aldrich, who had visited the president, and that both were anxious that he be a candidate.

Mention of Taft Surprises.

"Lorimer was surprised when I mentioned the president. He asked that Aldrich send a telegram confirming what I had said, which he could show to Governor Dineen and others. I said I was authorized to send it, and Lorimer said: 'Well, send it.' I sent the message. That was the day before Lorimer was elected."

Hines filed as an exhibit a receipt for the telephone message. It covered five minutes and the bill was for \$5.75. The call was given as at 12:10 a. m., the day Lorimer was elected.
