

DARROW TURNS HIS WIFE AGAINST HIM, M'MANIGAL SOBS

"Slick Guys" All Poisoning Her Mind, Dynamiter Sniffles; "Even Keeping My Two Children From Me."

Los Angeles, June 28.—Declaring that his wife's mind is being poisoned against him by Clarence Darrow, chief of counsel for the McNamara brothers, Orlie E. McManigal, indicted on charges of dynamiting the Llewellyn Iron works, today entertains little hope of effecting a reconciliation with his wife.

"All during our meeting in the court house Tuesday," said McManigal in his cell, "I had her in my arms. The men from the district attorney's office were mighty kind to her and I do not know what caused her to faint."

Would Die for Her.
"I love my wife above all things in this world and would give up my life for her if it would do any good, but not for the others."

"I guess it is all off, though, for her mind has been poisoned by those slick guys on the other side. Why, my wife even told me that if I did not agree to see Darrow I should never see her again. Maybe you think that didn't hurt."

"Why, they are even keeping my two little children from me. They say I can see them if I will do as the defense wishes me to do. Now that ain't right."

Here McManigal sobbed bitterly.

Tells of Her Fainting.
"My wife didn't see me," he said, "until I walked over and took her in my arms. Then I kissed her three or four times and advised her to stand with me and tell the truth. Then the district attorneys began to question her. They were decent about it, too, for would not stand for anyone to threaten or intimidate her. My wife has been subject to nervous prostration for years and maybe that had something to do with her fainting."

When shown McManigal's statement today, attorneys for the defense claimed that it was "all bosh."

It is understood that Mr. Sharp will accompany his distinguished guest on an auto inspection tour of the Deschutes valley, en route visiting Prineville, Bend and the other towns of the interior.

COUNTIES OVERPAY TO LIBRARY FUND

People Favor Larger Expenditures for Public School Reading Matter.

Salem, Or., June 28.—That the law authorizing a tax levy of 10 cents for every child of school age in the state, to go into a public school library fund to be apportioned among the districts of the state, is working more successfully every year is the statement of Miss Cornelia Marvin, secretary of the state library commission. Up to the present time almost half the counties have sent in their levies and every one has exceeded the minimum levy and sent in a private fund in addition.

Although the minimum levy which must be made for school library books each year is 10 cents for each child, Benton county has reported a levy of 17 cents, Grant 27½ cents, Malheur 25 cents, Umatilla 12½ cents, Linn 10 cents, Crook 19 cents, Klamath 17 cents, and Wasco 29 cents. Last year Linn county made a 25 cent levy and Sherman made a levy over three times the minimum. Added to these large levies have come from every county large sums raised by the districts by giving

socials or other entertainments. Miss Marvin says that Oregon will soon have record breaking public school libraries under this law which has been on the statute books six years.

"When this popular law was first proposed it met with strenuous opposition. Thousands of people murmured at an increase in taxation for buying books, declaring that they had enough books. But after they had gotten a start and found the value of these books the people of the entire state came to see their value and are going far beyond the tax they are required to levy."

PRE-ICING PRIVILEGE DENIED TO SHIPPERS

Washington, June 28.—By order of the interstate commerce commission today, the privilege of pre-icing carload shipments of lemons and other similar fruits, which was formerly permitted to shippers, has been stopped.

This gives the railroads exclusive control of the icing and refrigerating of citrus fruits in all cases where the shipper does not specifically direct that fruit shall move under natural cooling processes.

The order also directs that advances in the price of transportation for these fruits shall be suspended until October 28.

HARMON PRINCIPAL SPEAKER

Light Rates to Be Reduced.

Hood River, Or., June 28.—The Pacific Power & Light Co., owning the Hood River electric light plant, has announced that as a result of the consolidation of the Hood River plant with its other systems there will be a sweeping reduction in the light and power rates for the Hood River section. The low rates will go into effect July 1.

Business Men Fight Phone Rates.

Hood River, Or., June 28.—The Hood River Business Men's association held a meeting Tuesday night when one of the main topics for discussion was the toll rates to be charged by the Home Telephone company between the Mt. Hood district and the lower section of the valley. A committee was appointed to confer with committees from the Odell and upper valley sections and it is planned to select a committee from the three committees to interview the directors of the company relative to the raise. The toll rate proposed is very unpopular. The phone users would much rather consent to a general rate to make up for the losses sustained in the operation of the upper valley system.

McCan to Build Big Garage.

Hood River, Or., June 28.—Captain McCan, the Hood River millionaire, will begin the erection of an auto garage on his property in the city. The building will be constructed of concrete and will be 100x200 feet. The Tip Top Motor Car company, in which McCan is interested, is located a mile from the city.

Injunction Stops Street Sale.

Hood River, Or., June 28.—E. W. Stark, attorney for the property holders on the south side of State street, who are contending that the city charged too much for the improvements made abutting on their property, has secured an injunction from Circuit Judge W. L. Bradshaw, restraining the city from disposing of his clients' property provided for by an ordinance advertising the same for sale. The attorney for the property owners avers in his application for an injunction that the city engineer, P. M. Morse, and the contractor, W. G. Aldred, had conspired to change the contract price of the work which had unlawfully increased the assessment.

Apple Buyer Arrives.

PRINEVILLE PLANS FOR BOOSTER MEET

Oregon Development League Gathering Expected to Be Large.

Prineville, Or., June 28.—All is in readiness for the first central Oregon meeting of the Oregon Development league which will convene in the assembly hall of the Prineville Commercial club tomorrow morning for a two days' meeting. Delegates from the east, south, north and west are expected and will begin to arrive this evening. J. J. Sayre has been in the field for several weeks and has given assurances of a large attendance during both days. William Hanley of Burns will preside over the meetings of the league. All the interior towns will be represented. Automobile parties are expected from Klamath Falls, Lakeview, Burns and Paisley as well as from points in Crook county, including Madras, Bend, LaLlaw, Sisters, La Monte, La Pine, Redmond, Hillman and Opal City.

Among those here from Portland are C. C. Chapman of the Portland Commercial club, President Gray W. E. Coman and other officials of the Hill lines. There will be addresses by many prominent men of Oregon. Music will be furnished by local talent.

Great disappointment was manifested when word was received today that Governor Oswald West and party would not be able to make the trip into Prineville, as extensive preparations had been made to receive them. Arrangements are being made, however, to entertain lavishly all who pay a visit to the interior during the convention.

Crops Look Better.

Prineville, Or., June 28.—Backward crops in central Oregon were greatly benefited this week by the rains that have been general throughout Crook county. The heavy rains of Friday and of Monday and Tuesday have been a great boon to growing crops and every shower means thousands of dollars additional to central Oregon farmers. A cold and backward season has stunted the crops to such an extent that many immigrants have been very much discouraged. With the warm rains of this week and last the crops will have gained almost the entire loss sustained



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by the late season and both the growers and stock raisers are jubilant over the prospects of a crop. Not for years had prospects for a full crop looked so discouraging as they did before the late warm rains.
