Weather Conditions.
 A large high pressure field over the Lake region, but unsettled conditions prevail west of the Mississippi river, where marked depressions are central this morning over northern Saskatchewan and northern Utah. Light rains have fallen in northern California, northern Oregon, Washington, southwestern Montana, western Canada, eastern South Dakota, and the Missouri and southern Florida, and moderately heavy rains in southwestern Oregon, southern Idaho, eastern North Dakota, central Minnesota, and Maine. Thunder storms were reported from Pocatello, Moorhead, Huron and St. Paul. The weather is 16 degrees cooler in northern Montana, northern Minnesota, Pennsylvania, New York and in the St. Lawrence valley; in general it is slightly cooler on the Pacific and Atlantic slopes. Warmer weather obtains in Arizona, Utah, the Plains states and Mississippi valley.

Conditions are favorable for showers tonight and Friday in this district, and southwest to west winds.

MOTHERS' CONGRESS IS PROMISED SCHOOL HELP

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.)

Salem, Or., June 28.—Twenty-seven county superintendents of Oregon, who are in Salem correcting state teachers' examination papers, pledged to Mrs. Robert H. Tate of Portland, president of the Oregon Congress of Mothers, their influence and cooperation in extending work of congress throughout

the state. In addition to the 27 superintendents present there are three other counties represented by prominent educators.

One of the definite plans now being worked out by Mrs. Tate is the formation of a state wide committee to contain one member from each county for the purpose of extending the work of organizing parents' associations or mothers' circles in public schools. Mrs. George F. Gilling of Dallas has accepted the chairmanship of this committee and the superintendents are to suggest mothers from other counties who will serve on the committee.

Mrs. Gilling declared, in her address to the superintendents, that the school

and the parental roof were two divisions of the home of the children. She said she had come to Salem to win the cooperation of county superintendents in her work.
