

PORTLAND'S GAIN IN MANUFACTURES SHOWN BY CENSUS

Bureau's Tentative Summary for 1909 Gives Idea of Stride Taken by Rose City in Five Years.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Washington, June 30.—A preliminary statement of the general results of the thirteenth United States census of manufactures of the city of Portland, Or., was issued today by Acting Census Director Falkner. It contains a summary comparing the figures for 1904 and 1909, by city totals, prepared under the direction of William M. Stewart, chief statistician for manufactures, bureau of the census.

The figures are subject to such revision as may be necessary after a further examination of the original reports.

Percentage of Increase.
The summary shows percentages of increase as follows: 110 per cent in the miscellaneous expenses; 93 per cent in the capital invested; 87 per cent in the value added by manufacture; 87 per cent in the number of salaried officials and clerks; 70 per cent in the salaries and wages; 64 per cent in the value of products; 49 per cent in the number of establishments; 49 per cent in the average number of wage earners employed during the year; and 47 per cent in the cost of materials used.

There were 449 establishments in 1909, as compared with 437 in 1904, an increase of 213, or 49 per cent.

Value of Products.
The value of products in 1909 was \$48,861,000, and \$28,651,000 in 1904, an increase of \$18,210,000, or 64 per cent. The average per establishment was approximately \$110,000 in 1909, and about \$66,000 in 1904.

The value of products represents their selling value or price at the plants as actually turned out by the factories during the census year, and does not necessarily have any relation to the amount of sales for that year. The values under this head also include the amount received for work done on materials furnished by others.

Summary for Steam Laundries.
The preliminary totals for steam laundries for Portland, in 1909, are not included in the foregoing table, as the thirteenth census was the first at which they were canvassed, and therefore they are here given separately, as follows:

Number of establishments, 30; capital invested, \$881,000; cost of materials used, \$192,000; salaries and wages, \$113,000; value of products, \$1,131,000; number of salaried officials and clerks, 121; and average number of wage earners employed during the year, 586.

GOOD ROADS MAN COMING HERE TO TALK OF HIGHWAYS

H. S. Earle Will Address Citizens at Commercial Club Monday—West Outlines Plan for Road Building.

H. S. Earle, for eight years highway commissioner of Michigan, and better known as "Good Roads Earle," is coming to Portland to speak to the participants in the better highways movement.

A letter announcing this fact was received yesterday by President Prall of the Highway association, and he immediately made arrangements for a meeting in the convention hall of the Commercial club next Monday evening at 8 o'clock.

As "Good Roads Earle" is a national authority on highway building, a large attendance is assured. He will speak at Spokane and Tacoma before he reaches Portland.

West Outlines Plan.
Governor West's good roads plan, both for legislation and the "Capital Pike," is personally outlined by him in a letter which came yesterday to President C. T. Prall of the Oregon Association for Highway Improvement, in answer to a communication commending the governor's highway policy which Mr. Prall had sent the governor. The letter reads:

"I am in receipt of your kind favor of the 26th inst., and was pleased to read that my remarks at the Rotary club in reference to road building met with your approval.

"I am this day appointing a committee, consisting of yourself, ex-Mayor Rodgers of Salem and ex-Judge Dimmick of Clackamas county, to devise ways and means of cooperation with this office in the employment of convict labor in the construction of a public highway between Salem and Portland. As this road would pass through three counties—Marion, Clackamas and Multnomah—I have named a committee from each county. This office will be pleased to cooperate with the committee and will render every assistance to bring this matter to a successful conclusion.

"In order to eliminate the possibility of a multitude of good roads bills being initiated at the next election or presented to the legislature, I am this day naming a committee of one from each county in the state, except Multnomah, where I have appointed five, for the purpose of uniting all elements favoring good roads legislation and the

drafting of one bill to be submitted either through the initiative or presented to the legislature. You have been named as a member of this committee."

Small Roads Letter.
The letter from President Prall to the governor is as follows:

"Your address on good roads at the Rotary club luncheon today was very interesting to members of the Oregon Association for Highway Improvement who were present, and we heartily endorse your plan to work convicts on the public highways. We are strong advocates of this method of road building and believe it represents a sound economical policy for the state and humanitarian system for the convicts.

"In regard to your suggestion for a convict built main road from Salem to Portland to serve as an object lesson to the whole state: If you will outline a plan by which this piece of highway can be constructed, this association will be very glad to further it in every way. We are conducting a campaign of general education for highway improvement, but we feel that a concrete example in the shape of a good highway from Portland to Salem will be of more value as an educator than tons of literature. The 'Capital Highway' will make good roads converts of all who travel over it."

Hope to End Deadlock.

Vancouver, B. C., June 30.—To end the deadlock in the building trades caused by the strike at present prevailing will be the mission of men selected by the independent contractors of the city, who held a mass meeting in the city hall last night, about 175 contractors and subcontractors attending. This committee will attempt to confer with both the strikers and contractors.

Gibson Is Nominated.

SALEM'S PRODUCTS RUN INTO MILLIONS
Census Bureau, Making Tentative Summary of Manufactures, Gives Report.

Washington, June 30.—A preliminary statement of the general results of the thirteenth United States census of manufactures of the city of Salem, Or., was issued today by Acting Census Director Falkner.

The figures are subject to such revision as may be necessary after a further examination of the original reports.

Average Is High.
There were 63 establishments in 1909 and the value of their products was \$2,208,000, an average per establishment of approximately \$35,000.

The value of products represents their selling value or price at the plants as actually turned out by the factories during the census year, and does not necessarily have any relation to the amount of sales for that year. The values under this head also include the amount received for work done on materials furnished by others.

Summary Shows Growth.
Further details can be drawn from the summary which follows: Number of establishments, 63; capital invested, \$1,661,000; cost of materials used, \$1,177,000; salaries and wages, \$484,000; miscellaneous expenses, \$270,000; value of products, \$2,208,000; value added by manufacture (products less cost of materials), \$1,031,000; number of salaried officials and clerks, 135; and average number of wage earners employed during the year, 587.

ALBERTA COAL STRIKE SETTLEMENT ARRANGED
Nelson, B. C., June 30.—It is reported here on good authority that a settlement of the Alberta and Crow's Nest coal strike is arranged. The operators, it is said, have agreed to offer day workers an increase of 7 per cent in wages, and other concessions, not including the closed shop, and it is understood that the strikers have agreed to accept the offer.

Official announcement of the end of the strike is expected to be made at the beginning of the week.
