A large high pressure area is over the Pacific coast, and the barometer is relatively high in the eastern and southern states. During the 24 hours light to moderately heavy rain has fallen in eastern Oregon, eastern Washington, Idaho, Utah, Arizona, Colorado, Montana, North Dakota and Canadian northwest. The temperatures on the Pacific slope are generally well above the seasonal average, while everywhere east of the Rocky mountains it is warmer than usual in portions of the lake region and in the lower south and upper Mississippi valleys. Temperatures from 10 to 15 degrees above normal.

DEATH IS SLEEP
ASSERTS RUSSELL

God Will Redeem Man From Grave But Not the Dog, He Declares.

Death, as explained by Pastor Charles E. Russell at the Armory last night, is a sleep from which man will some time be redeemed. "Death in the actual sense would mean utter destruction," he said. "The word of God does not speak of the first death as absolute death. It speaks of it as a sleep. Jesus said, 'Our friend Lazarus sleepeth.' He was not annihilated in the sense of being utterly destroyed. Except God had arranged for man to be redeemed from death, death to a man and death to a dog would have been exactly the same. He made no provision for redeeming the dog, but he did make provision for redeeming the man."

Pastor Russell answered the large number of questions propounded to him by persons in the audience without the use of a Bible, trusting to his memory for all quotations he gave. He had an answer ready for every question. "How shall we understand the earth to abide forever?" was one of the questions asked the speaker, accompanied by the following scripture reference: Revelations 21:1 says: "I saw a new heaven and a new earth, for the first heaven and the first earth were passed away, and there was no more sea." "According to the Bible there have already been two worlds and a third is coming and this earth has been and will be the scene of all of them," answered Pastor Russell. "The apostle speaks of the world which was before the flood and of the present evil world. It doesn't signify three earths, but three different orders or condition of things. Before the flood they had the ministrations of angels. Until the second advent of Christ things are in the hands of man. The government of the world is the dispensation of the prince of peace, will be the ruler. The word heaven is used symbolically to represent ecclesiastical powers. The heavens of the present time are the religious systems of this time. The mountains represent the kingdoms and the rivers troops."

MILK CRUSADE SAVES
MANY BABIES' LIVES

Indicative of the great improvement in milk production and distribution since The Journal began its pure milk "crusade" two years ago, Milk Chemist E. D. Smith reported this morning that less than 2.5 per cent of samples by him during the past month were below standard.

"In the first month of the operation of the city milk laboratory," said Inspector Smith, "more than 60 per cent of the samples were below standard, hence unfit for human food. The difference between having one fifth of the samples below standard and of having 50 per cent below standard is the difference between life and death for the children of this city and the decreasing mortality rate among the babies of Portland is, I am sure, to be thus accounted for."

An inspection of creameries has just been completed by the city milk inspectors. Several grade considerably above the required 50 per cent.

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HARMONY WILL RESULT
FROM SESSION, BELIEF

It is believed that complete harmony between the railroad officials of the O. W. R. & N. and the Southern Pacific and the stockmen who ship over the lines, will be the result of the hearing concluded yesterday before the stock railroad commission. About 75 people were present at the hearing.

One of the chief complaints was in regard to the speed of stock trains. The railroad officials assured the shippers that they would do all they could to handle the stock shipments in a satisfactory manner. A new law required that the railroads shall run a train at least one day a week for handling small shipments of stock, this train to make not less than 12 miles an hour. This speed must be made by all stock trains of 10 cars or more.
