

MRS. SHONTS READY TO SEE HUSBAND FOR SEPARATION

Wife of President of Interborough Transit Co., of New York, to Bring Action in Gotham.

(By the International News Service.)
Paris, July 1.—The statement was made here this afternoon that Mrs. Theodore P. Shonts, wife of the president of the Interborough Rapid Transit company of New York, and a recognized society leader in America, has caused papers to be served on her husband in a suit for separation.

C. Archibald, an attorney who says he is a counsel for Mrs. Shonts, is authorized for the announcement. Archibald has been in consultation with Mrs. Shonts at the home of her daughter, the Duchess de Chaulnes.

Asks Only Separation.
Mr. Archibald, although unwilling to discuss details of the Shonts' matrimonial difficulties, made it plain that the proceeding was not a petition for an absolute divorce, but was merely for separation, maintenance and freedom from marital obligations.

"Mrs. Shonts is reluctant to have the public know of her differences with her husband," said Mr. Archibald, "but conditions are such that she has felt compelled to appeal to the courts for relief."

She in New York.
"As both she and her husband are residents of New York, the suit will be brought there."

"The petition to the supreme court is now in the hands of Leventis, Cook & Nathan, attorneys, of New York, and a copy of it was served on Mr. Shonts about a fortnight ago."

New York, July 1.—Theodore P. Shonts was not at the offices of the Interborough today. His assistant, Mr. Pepperman, said that he was on a morning trip and would not be back until Wednesday. Mr. Pepperman said that he had been busy for a week denying rumors on behalf of Mr. Shonts that he knew anything of Mrs. Shonts' determination to sue for separation.

Mrs. Shonts was Harriet Amelle Drake. She was married to Mr. Shonts in 1882 in Centerville, Iowa. It is a tradition of the town that she would not have him as a suitor until he learned to play the violin. She was the daughter of General Drake, in whose office Mr. Shonts studied law, afterward becoming a partner in the firm.

They have two daughters. The eldest, Theodora, was married to the Duke de Chaulnes in 1908, and became a widow a few weeks later. Mrs. Shonts is very fond of society and has made brilliant social careers for her daughters, Theodora and Margaret, since they entered the Washington society at the time Mr. Shonts became chairman of the Isthmian canal commission.

Husband Sues Shonts.
In September, 1909, Mr. Shonts was sued for \$200,000 damages by the husband of a woman whose affections he was accused of having alienated. The suit was brought by Frederick Hipsh, the New York manager of a Kentucky whiskey distillery.

Through his attorney, DeLacy Nicoll, Mr. Shonts declared it was not he but his "double who was meant. Shonts, it was said, met Mrs. Hipsh in the summer of 1909 at Narragansett pier. Mr. Shonts declared he did not know the woman, and that if Hipsh had found a telegram asking Mrs. Hipsh to meet the sender at Asbury Park, signed with Mr. Shonts' name, it was a case of somebody else using his name. The International News Service investigated the case thoroughly at the time, and did not find any foundation for the charges.

Mr. Shonts' private life, prior and since that time, has been wholly free from scandal.

COURT CLERKS CHARGED WITH KEEPING INTEREST

Chicago, Ill., July 1.—Charges that T. C. MacMillan and Edward M. Holloway, clerks of federal courts, and Marshall E. Sampson, a former clerk, wrongfully have withheld \$12,926.23 in interest on deposits of costs are made in suits filed in the United States district court today.

Mr. MacMillan, who is at present clerk of the United States district court, is the most heavily involved. It is charged that he has withheld \$9934.67 interest.

Holloway is clerk of the United States circuit court of appeals and is accused of withholding \$1801.61 of interest. Sampson, one time secretary to Peter S. Grosscup, receiver for the Union Traction company and clerk of the United States district court, is accused of withholding \$2190.25 interest.

It is said that the clerks and former clerk did not dispute the facts, but insist that they have kept the interest in accordance with the court and orders of the law.

LOGGING CAMPS CLOSE; MEN FLOCK TO CITY

Practically all of the logging camps in the Columbia river district have closed down for the summer vacation and hundreds of loggers are coming into the city for rest and recreation. How soon the camps will resume operations depends to a large extent upon the condition of the log market, which at present is rather dull.

At a meeting held by the Columbia River Loggers' association yesterday afternoon, it was intimated that there are enough logs in the water to keep the mills supplied for several weeks and in the meantime an inventory will be taken so that there need be no danger of the mills finding themselves without material for their saws. Should the lumber market show a sudden increase, the loggers will quickly get busy.

The closing down of the logging camps will leave some of the smaller communities quite deserted until the men return to the camps for it is the habit of the woodsmen to leave the big city whenever the pay roll is passed around for the last time. It is estimated that the closing of the camps will bring 2000 or 3000 men from the camps to the city.

Celebrate Fiftieth Wedding Anniversary

TANKS IN RIVER FOR OIL IS SUGGESTED

Civil Engineer Has Plan to Provide Protection for the Company and Public.

Concrete tanks anchored in the river for the storage of oil, is a solution of the oil tank question suggested by E. E. Lamar, a civil engineer connected with the city engineer's office. He declared this plan will provide full protection to the public and will at the same time make it necessary to have all oil stored outside the city limits, an alternative which it is said will greatly increase the cost of distribution.

"Let storage ships or barges be constructed," he said, "and used as a support for concrete tanks. The entire construction could be made fireproof and the barges floated to the most convenient points. These tanks could be made of sufficient capacity to carry a week's supply, for instance, and divided into several compartments for different kinds of oil. From the tanks a line could be run ashore to convey the oil to the wagons. All the pumps and other machinery would be on the land, far removed from the oil.

"This, it appears to me, would solve the problem, removing the element of danger, but allowing the oil to be kept where it would be easy to distribute. Oil tankers could be permitted to enter the harbor say once a week for the purpose of filling the receptacles and several of these could be provided at convenient points without danger.

"To require the removal of the tanks beyond the city limits will certainly increase the cost of distribution. The city could probably derive some revenue from permits for anchorage of the oil tank barges in the river."

KNOWS EVERY SIDE OF HIGHWAY QUESTION

Several hundred invitations have been sent to representative men of Portland and vicinity, asking them to come and hear "Good Roads" of Michigan talk on the need of better highways at 8 o'clock tomorrow evening in the convention hall of the Commercial club. H. S. Earle is a national authority on highway construction. The invitation reads: "He knows how to present the subject with fascination. Such an opportunity does not often come."

Mr. Earle has studied the national highway situation many years. For eight years he has been highway commissioner of Michigan. His presence in Oregon is expected to be of great value to the state good roads movement.

Tomorrow evening's meeting will be held under the auspices of the Oregon Association for Highway Improvement, and President C. T. Prall of the association will preside. Commissioners Earle and Spoke and Tacoma, and his national reputation as a highway expert has at each meeting drawn large audiences.

STRANGE DEATH ENDS DUAL LIFE

Body Identified First as That of Crook, Then as That of Property Owner.

Chicago, Ill., July 1.—The remarkable case of James St. Louis, who led a Jekyll-Hyde existence, was brought to light in a dramatic series of incidents today when his body was identified in an undertaking establishment in Wabash avenue, first as that of a notorious hotel thief known to the police of a score of cities, and then by a sister as that of her brother, well connected and a property owner to some extent.

Photographs of the dead man which had been printed in the Chicago papers resulted in his identification by his relatives.

In keeping with the life he led, the death of James St. Louis was mysterious. He was the victim of a strange murder.

The police were called to Peck Place and South State street, where they found a man bleeding from a crushed head. He was taken to St. Luke's hospital, where he died.

One suspect was arrested in connection with the case. He gave the name of John Powers and is being held at the Harrison street police station.

The body was taken to Rolston's undertaking establishment. The first clue to the man's identity was the photograph of himself found in a pocket. Then the case was brought to the attention of the bureau of identification. Detectives had just finished informing the undertakers of the identity of the man when two women entered and asked to see the body of the man whose photograph had been published. They were led to the rear of the undertaking room, where one of the women gasped: "It's Brother Jim."

The sister never suspected her brother to be a criminal.

Their father was a prosperous hotel proprietor in New York and at his death the son inherited the bulk of his property.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST SENDING 200 SHRINERS

Tacoma, Wash., July 1.—When the two special trains leave from here tomorrow morning and from Vancouver tomorrow night for Rochester, N. Y., there will be a total delegation of about 200 Shriners going from the Pacific northwest to attend the thirty-seventh annual session to be held July 11, 12 and 13. The special train from Portland on the evening of June 25, will leave Tacoma at 7:30 Sunday morning with about 100 delegates. The other special will gather delegates from Seattle northward and leave from Vancouver the evening of June 26, for the Pacific, going via the Great Lakes route and taking another hundred delegates.

REWARD OF \$25 FOR LOST OREGON CITY MAN

Oregon City, July 1.—It is feared by relatives that Charles Smith, who disappeared on the night of June 25, has met with a mishap. Smith was last seen near Melrum about 11 o'clock at night on his way home from a church society. He lives with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. H. R. Smith, at Green Point, a suburb of Oregon City. Smith is about 30 years of age and weighs 135 pounds. When last seen he was wearing a green suit of clothes, patent leather shoes and a dark hat, and had about \$40. A reward of \$25 has been offered for information leading to his discovery.

WARRANTS OUT FOR CAPLAN AND PALBURNS IN LONDON

Papers Given on Request of the American State Department—No Evidence Men Are in England.

London, July 1.—The magistrates of Bow street court today issued provincial warrants for the arrest of David H. Caplan and Milton A. Schmidt at the request of the American state department. The warrants were at once placed in the hands of the Scotland Yard forces, although the officials there insist there is no evidence that the parties wanted in connection with the dynamiting of the Los Angeles Times building are in London beyond the belief of the California authorities that the two men sailed from New York for London several months ago. The British police received the usual printed circular giving descriptions of the men and saying that they were supposed to be in England.

Detectives in all parts of the kingdom were instructed tonight to keep a sharp lookout for the fugitives. Detective Burns, the American officer who was instrumental in developing details of the alleged plot, came to England some weeks ago and was supposed to be here in connection with the presence of large numbers of questionable characters taking advantage of the presence of coronation crowds.

He did not communicate with the American embassy and, according to Scotland Yard, did not ask their assistance in connection with the dynamite case.

The issuance of the warrants today came as a result of negotiations carried on by cable during the last day or two. As the British government officials cannot deal directly with the individual states of the United States and as the action desired by California appears to be most important the British authorities made inquiries of the American state department, through whom all negotiations must proceed. The reply stated that the men were wanted and the warrants were thereupon applied for and issued.

LOS ANGELES MAN IS NABBED FOR LARCENY

DALLAS FAIR GROUNDS TO BE MADE MODERN

The Dallas, Tex., July 1.—It was decided by the stockholders of The Dallas Driving Park association at a meeting Wednesday night to negotiate for a loan of about \$7000 to be used in improving the local fairgrounds and planting lawns and trees. Buildings for livestock and agricultural exhibits will be constructed and a modern grandstand and judges' stand are to be erected.

The matter of more efficient transportation to the grounds was taken up and it is probable that auto trucks will be operated, charging a low fare to pay the cost of operation. Another thing that will draw people will be a low admission to the grounds.

Work is being done on the grounds now and the race course is being improved. The buildings will be ready for the opening of the annual district fair to open October 5. One of the best grounds in eastern Oregon will be located here after completion of the proposed improvements.
