

STAG RECEPTION HELD ON BOSTON

Officers of Oregon Naval Militia Hosts—Speeches, Refreshments.

A large number of guests were entertained on board the ship last night by officers of the Oregon naval militia at a stag reception. Guests were taken to the ship in launches and spent the first part of the evening in examining the boat and its accessories. They were received on the after deck by Captain Reynolds and his officers and were given the freedom of the boat. During the evening a band stationed near the stern played patriotic and popular selections.

Brief addresses were made by R. F. Irvine, Commander J. M. Elliott, U. S. N., Postmaster Merrick, and Father McDevitt, representing Archbishop Christie. Mr. Irvine, speaking for Governor West, who was unable to be present owing to his southern Oregon trip, gave a very interesting history of the Boston and her part in Dewey's victory at Manila Bay.

Commander Elliott dwelt especially on the fact that the ship is not a toy for pleasure and recreation but a ship of war loaned to the militia for the purpose of training its men in order that they may be ready to defend their nation in time of necessity. He dwelt especially on the absolute necessity of subordination and cleanliness, saying that the former should not be given as a personal obligation but rather as a duty.

Postmaster Merrick spoke of the deserving nature of the work of the militia and the support which should be given it. Father McDevitt made a plea for high morals among the members, asking them to lead clean lives.

Among those present were many officers from Vancouver Barracks, officers and members of the Oregon National Guard, representatives of the Portland banks and Chamber of Commerce and prominent citizens.

After the program an informal reception was held and light refreshments served. Ex-Senators John M. Gessin and Charles W. Fulton and Colonel David M. Dunne who were to have delivered addresses were unable to attend.

4 POWER LOAN PACT EXCITES JAPANESE

Sixteenth Article Is Declared Violation of Agreement Affecting Manchuria.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Tokyo, July 6.—The Japanese press today is excitedly discussing the sixteenth article of the four power loan which is held to be a violation of the agreement for equal opportunity in Manchuria. The alleged American contradiction in the agreement of principles previously declared is most resented.

Various conjectures are being made as to the real inwardness of the proceedings in the Franco-Japanese and Anglo-Russian negotiations, as to their being held separately, and demands are insistent for an explanation of the disputed sixteenth article.

In a long inspired article today the Kokumin, a semi-official organ, says there is good reason to believe that the governments of France and Great Britain favorably instructed their financiers, but if America and Germany object to a satisfactory settlement of the question Japan and Russia jointly will make a formal protest to the United States, Germany, England, France and China.

Peking Correspondent Morison of the London Times, in dispatches received here today, declares that Japan's position in Manchuria justifies such a protest.

35 Mile Phone Line in Forest.
Eugene, Or., July 6.—For the better protection of the government forests and to facilitate the work of the rangers and guards, the government will build a telephone line 35 miles long in the Cascade forest east of Eugene, a crew of linemen leaving today for Leaburg, from which place, which is the terminus of the toll line, the line will be built to the Paradise Rangers' station in the vicinity of McKenzie bridge, 35 miles distant. A crew of men has also been sent out from Eugene by Supervisor Seitz to resume work on the government trail, which extends along the summit of the mountains from McKenzie bridge toward the headwaters of the Willamette. A branch will extend from Box canyon to Waldo lake.

Mumper, stepsons, reside in Salem.

BOURNE FAVORS REWARD SYSTEM

Urges Money Recompense for Evidence Against Corruptors of the Ballot.

Rewards for evidence resulting in the conviction of persons guilty of violation of the corrupt practices act are suggested by United States Senator Jonathan Bourne in a letter to Attorney General A. M. Crawford.

Commenting upon the importance of this law in connection with the success of the "Oregon system," the senior senator says campaign methods will be made a subject of particular scrutiny and that some state officer should make it his duty to see that the law is enforced in all essential particulars. While it is the duty of district attorneys to enforce the law, Senator Bourne suggests that some officer of statewide jurisdiction should give especial attention to it. He closes by saying:

"In the last campaign you were one of those candidates for office who refused to countenance the indirect violation of our primary law by the holding of an assembly. You will not be a candidate in the next campaign, and therefore, will be in no way interested in the campaign of any candidate. In view of your loyal support of the Oregon laws in the past and your entire freedom from interest in the campaign, I wish to urge you to make it your special effort to see that the law for the control of political campaigns is strictly enforced throughout the state. I am writing you this far in advance of the beginning of the campaign so that any action you may take or policy you may outline cannot be construed in favor of or against any particular candidate."

"Quite likely the enforcement of this law is not strictly within your province. As a rule officers of justice wait until a complaint is made before beginning a prosecution. Violations of the corrupt practices act are, however, of such a nature that they will not be discovered unless some one makes it his business to watch for violations and secure the evidence necessary to conviction. You are in a position to do this and I am sure the legislature will not hesitate to reimburse you for any necessary expenses and will ratify your action by making the necessary appropriations if you offer rewards for evidence resulting in conviction of persons violating the law. I think no one cares to have the law enforced in a technical manner. What is desired is a vigorous enforcement of the spirit of the law by the punishment of acts materially in contravention of its provisions."

GOVERNOR ACCEPTS NO PROFIT FROM THE STATE

Salem, Or., July 6.—Voucher for payment for Governor West's portion of the block north of the state capitol in which the new state house is to be built was drawn yesterday. The appraisers valued Governor West's holdings at \$10,000, but the governor declined to accept more than \$500, which represents his original investment plus street improvements.

LARGE CLASS TAKING MEDICAL EXAMINATION

The largest class, with one exception, that ever assembled in Oregon to take the semi-annual examination for licenses to practice medicine in the state is undergoing the ordeal of a three-days' examination, conducted by the Oregon State Board of Medical Examiners at the Lincoln high school. The class consists of 102 candidates, a majority of whom are easterners who have located in Oregon with the intention of joining the medical fraternity of the state.

There are seven women in the class, five of whom are osteopaths. Most of the eastern applicants are young graduates from eastern medical colleges. There are also quite a number of graduates from the medical department of the University of Oregon in the class. The examination began yesterday morning and will conclude tomorrow afternoon. It is estimated that about 80 per cent of the class will pass a satisfactory examination and will obtain the necessary license to become full fledged doctors, as about that proportion of former classes has succeeded in running the gauntlet of the questions prepared by the board of examiners.
