MILITIAMEN DRILL AT AMERICAN LAKE

Tacoma, Wash., July 6.—Militiamen of the Washington National guard opened their annual encampment today at American Lake, near here, by oversleeping one hour. However, the alarm clocks had been set back intentionally. The guardsmen had put in three hard days at the Tacoma carnival celebration and did not reach camp until midnight.

TWENTY BANDS OF SHEEP DRIVEN TO MOUNT ADAMS

White Salmon, Wash., July 6.—Sixty thousand head of sheep from the eastern part of Klickitat county and from near Tappanish moved onto the Columbia forest reserve in the foothills of Mount Adams today. Harry Devoe, chief forest ranger, says there were 20 bands, and they will go out this fall, as they have done every year, the fattest lot of sheep from any reserve in the northwest. A charge of 7 cents per head is made for feeding on the government land.

CONVICTION HALTS BAD CHECK MEN

Government Considers Verdict in Case Will Act as Check on Such Crimes.

In the conviction of American Martine and Lorenzo Rinaldi by a jury in Judge Bean's court yesterday afternoon, the authorities believe they have landed two of the most prolific distributors of bogus money who have operated on the Pacific coast for some time. After listening to the calm denials of the prisoners and their attempted explanation of the incriminating evidence piled up against them, the jury spent less than 10 minutes preparing its verdict.

Against each man the indictment contained three counts, and on each count a conviction was secured. The possible penalty runs to 10 years imprisonment and \$5000 fine on each count. Sentence will be passed by Judge Bean Monday morning.

How Evidence Was Found.
The arrest of the two men followed the passing by Martine of several \$5 bank notes in Portland and the discovery at the Oakland, Cal., postoffice of a letter containing 17 similar bills. This letter was addressed to Rinaldi and called for by Martine. After that another letter arrived in Portland addressed to Rinaldi which fell into the hands of the secret service men, and this also contained 17 had bills of the same denomination. Both letters were sent from Lucet, Italy.

When Rinaldi was arrested an incriminating letter was found upon him, in which the writer spoke of having sent seven letters with "goods" and "cheats" in them, said he might come to New York himself if the thing turned out well, and said if the letter system did not work well he might send over a couple "salami," a kind of sausage, "with the goods inside."

Makes Poor Defense.
Rinaldi in his own defense, said he found this letter on the street in Fresno, Cal. He did not know who wrote it, he said. He professed ignorance of the other letters sent to him containing the bogus money, saying they must have been intended for another man having the same name.

The specific charge upon which the conviction was obtained, was that of passing a counterfeit bill on Mrs. McCoy, proprietress of a rooming house on First street. Martine rented a room for 50 cents, received the \$4.50 in change and departed, without occupying the room. Followed by McCoy, he was seen to meet Rinaldi, enter another rooming house while his partner waited, and pass something to Rinaldi when they met again.

REV. MR. BEARTEET VICTIM OF HOLDUP

Hounds Soon Lose Trail of Robbers Along Douglas Mountain Road.

Cottage Grove, Or., July 6.—Two unmasked men yesterday held up Rev. J. S. Bearteet, a Christian minister of Roseburg, nine miles south of this city in Douglas county and relieved him of \$25 in money. The robbery took place in a lonely place on a mountain road, where the preacher had camped for the night while en route to Albany, whither he was going to perfect a real estate transaction.

He had just broke camp when two men darted out from a secluded spot alongside the highway and ordered him to hold up his hands. One of the men covered him with a gun while the other searched him. Besides his purse, he took a \$1.25 watch and the man with the gun ordered his pal to "give the old duck his tin timer," and the watch was returned to the preacher, who was then instructed to drive on as fast as his team would take him.

Rev. Mr. Bearteet came to Cottage Grove and telegraphed the sheriff of Douglas county, who went to the locality. The minister returned on horseback, but no trace of the robbers could be found. Hounds were put on the trail but they soon lost it in the rough country.
