

NEW COMPANIES IN TOO BIG HURRY

Often Fail Before Going Ahead
to Learn Whether Chosen
Name Will Pass.

Salem, Or., July 7.—Neglect to ascertain whether there is any other corporation in the state of the same name or a name similar to the one they are forming, is causing new corporation officers throughout the state much trouble and delay. A telephone company in Clatsop county, for illustration, sent in its articles of incorporation to the secretary of state's office this week, but it was found that the name chosen by the company was so similar to that of another corporation previously organized as to cause confusion. The company was written that the name would have to be changed. The answer came to the secretary of state that the officers had already sold \$20,000 worth of stock, much of which had been issued, and that it would be almost impossible to change the name. The case is under advisement.

If new organizations, before going on with their printing, would write or wire the secretary of state whether the name was satisfactory, much trouble and expense would be saved.

KING GEORGE AND QUEEN VISIT IRISH SUBJECTS

London, July 7.—Before the actual closing of the coronation program, King George and Queen Mary have two more weeks of ceremonial visiting, and today and tomorrow will begin the royal visit to Ireland. Their majesties will go to Kingston aboard the royal yacht Victoria and Albert. There they will be entertained by the lord lieutenant. While in Ireland, they will drive to Dublin and attend the opening of the Royal College of Science prior to attending the Phoenix Park races and a dinner at the castle.

Sunday will start another tour, when their majesties will attend the service at St. Patrick's cathedral, visit the Artane Industrial school and inspect the pensioners and girls at Drummond Institute.

Although during the next week there will be receptions, presentations, addresses and visits of all sorts, the most important event of the week will come Thursday, when the investiture of the Prince of Wales will take place at Carnarvon. King George and Queen Mary will leave for Carnarvon Wednesday. Though following closely upon the coronation of his father the investiture of the prince will lose nothing of its importance, for King George will take a conspicuous part in the ceremony. Ten thousand will visit the spectacle, as Edward Albert is the first Black Prince to receive the investiture on Welsh soil in hundreds of years.

CATSKILL OBSERVES ABSCONDER'S BIRTHDAY

Catskill, N. Y., July 7.—The birth of Henry Meiggs, who began his career as an absconder and died as a famous builder of South American railroads, is being celebrated today by the village of Catskill.

Meiggs was born here just 100 years ago today—July 7, 1811. In the early '40's, Meiggs went to California, and soon had an enviable reputation among the prospectors of that state. Meiggs betrayed the trust and fled to South America, where he carried to completion six lines of railroad in Peru and Chile, and started three others.

In this work and through lumber investments he made millions of dollars, and one of the first acts that he performed after making his fortune was to repay with interest all those who had claims against him. He returned to the United States during his last years and gave millions to charity. Devoted to the southern continent, Meiggs finally returned to Peru and died at Lima in 1877.
