Weather Conditions.

The British Columbia low pressure area has advanced eastward to Saskatchewan, and a high pressure area of moderate strength is central over western Oregon. A large high pressure area in central northern part of the Great Lakes, and the barometer is relatively low in southern California and southern Arizona and also in the middle Atlantic states. Showers and thunder storms have occurred in the Rocky mountain states, the Lake region, Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas and Missouri, and local rains have fallen along the Gulf coast. It is cooler in the lower Lake region, New England and the north Pacific states, and much warmer in the upper Missouri valley.

Conditions are favorable for fair weather in this district tonight and Saturday. It will be cooler tonight in northern and southeastern Idaho, and warmer Saturday except in western Washington and along the Oregon coast.

Fails to Support Wife.—Fined.—"Little Willie" Austin, weight 200 pounds, arrested last night by Patrolman G. E. Fuller, on instructions from Captain Bailey, for failure to support his invalid wife, will break rocks on the Linton rock pile for the next 30 days and then an additional 100 days, he having been sentenced this morning to serve 90 days as pay fine of \$200. A week ago a report was made at police headquarters that Austin had refused to support his wife, and that instead of working, he hung around saloons, drinking and then went home only to abuse his wife for not working. Last night a similar report was made to Captain Bailey and he ordered the man's arrest on a drunk and vagrancy charge.

Italians in Near Riot.—Incensed at the alleged negligence of a car crew on the Southern Pacific, Oswego line, which was alleged to be responsible for an accident to an Italian laborer who sustained a broken leg yesterday afternoon when a rail which the crew and gang of laborers were unloading at Front and Hamilton streets fell on him, the laborer attacked the car crew and made so much trouble that it was necessary to send Patrolmen Sims and Evans on motorcycles to the scene. The injured man was sent to the hospital and the patrolmen quelled the riot before any damage was done.

Domestic Assaulted.—Collis Olsen, a domestic employed at the home of Robert Berger, 724 Melrose drive, was assaulted by an unknown man at midnight last night within a block of the Berger home. The woman screamed and aroused neighbors, who came to her rescue. A motorcycle patrolman was sent to the scene as soon as the matter was reported, but could find no trace of the man.

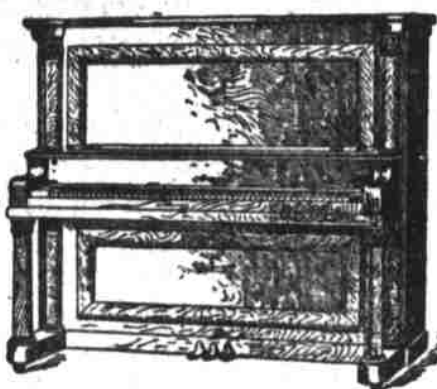
