Wanted—Somebody to erect a building on the Chautauqu ground of sufficient dimensions to accommodate everyone that wants a place to lay their weary heads. Nothing, it is pointed out, is so much needed as a large rooming house at Gladstone Park. Last night every available space was occupied. The same condition existed at the Y. W. C. A. and at the Federation of Women's club headquarters, and many private campers huddled together in order to take in a friend. This need was emphasized Sunday night when the car service was not in the best of working order. The management is already considering, for next year a large building which can be used for domestic science, a cafeteria and lunch room, with a second story for sleeping apartments.

The classes opened this morning with a slight increase in attendance—an unprecedented occurrence at this stage of the session, due, it is said, to the warmer day this morning promises. The marathon races, which were started by Professor Grilles Saturday with 18 boys competing for the medals, are holding up well. They race for 15 minutes every afternoon. They will conclude the races next Saturday, which will be made quite an event.

The large open fireplace at the W. C. T. U. cottage has become a real attraction these cool mornings and evenings and there has been a large circle around the hearth much of the day. Mrs. Hatfield makes everyone welcome and Mrs. Unruh does all possible to make her guests welcome. The cottage is open to everyone, with literature touching many phases of the temperance and suffrage work. Mrs. Booker's Bible lessons continue to interest and instruct. This week's work takes up the acts of the Apostles. A class in Bible expression has been organized at the cottage from 5 to 6 p. m.

Today Mrs. Roper gives her address on "The Men That Go Down to the Sea in Ships," and it is expected that a company of sailors will accompany her and sing some sailor songs. Mrs. Webster's art class is immensely popular, and fills Science hall every morning from 10 to 11 o'clock. Today her subject will be Spanish Paintings, and tomorrow it will be Dutch and Flemish Paintings. The first bell this morning sent the children trooping into the kindergarten, where Miss Clara A. Ahlgren and her assistants, Marie Rodgers and Miss Sylvia Phillips, succeeded in holding their attention throughout the morning hours. This morning the very popular Sadlers made their first appearance, when Dr. Lena K. Sadler talked on "The Cause and Cure of Colds," with demonstrations by a trained nurse.

The Sadlers will fill four engagements at this session. It is an attraction that has induced many to come on the grounds to camp, and will bring thousands of day visitors to the park. They filled a similar engagement last year, and the demand for their return was insistent, so much so that the management made unusual efforts to secure them. There are four in the party, namely, Dr. William Sadler, Dr. Lena Sadler, Anna B. Kellogg and Sarah Mildred Willmer. They will give both programs today.

Dr. R. P. Shepherd made a masterly address yesterday afternoon, taking as his topic, "The Cycle of Life." He began by stating, in substance, that every child had a right to be born well. He began with "little Willie," and took him through the various stages of "Baby," "Bill," "William," and finally "Dad." He made a strong plea that this youngster should be well cared for, that, in turn, there would be better fatherhood and motherhood when he reached the last stage of his cycle. He depicted race suicide and scathed the American women for shirking their duty of motherhood and lavishing their love upon poodle dogs. And to fathers, as well as mothers, he deplored many of the lax habits and ideas of life children were allowed to foster.

Advice to Parents.
He gave much wholesome advice to parents, which might all be summed up in the word "wisdom."

With the least advertising of any lecturer or attraction that has appeared on the program this year, came last night William Sterling Hatfield, a creator of a phase of art, while not wholly original, so interpreted as to be at least strikingly individual. He was announced as portraying Dickens characters in costume. What he really did was to give some very excellent sketches of Dickens, his character and his plots, as well as throwing in some very keen observations of Dickens as a writer and of the impress he made upon his times. While he was doing this, in full view of the audience, with only a table before him to hold his equipment, he made a rapid change in costume, with a facial make up to suit, and portrayed perfectly Captain Cuttle, Micawber, Bill Swoyer and three or four other familiar characters.

While Mr. Hatfield was witty and at times humorous, there was nothing of the burlesque about the performance, as so often accompanies the attempts of the "rapid change artist." It was the grave and yet mingled into a bright and dignified entertainment.

NEW INDICTMENTS WANTED FOR TRIO

Prosecution Asks for True Bills Against Hall of Justice "Dynamiters."

Los Angeles, July 11.—District Attorney John D. Fredericks and Deputy G. R. Horton appeared before the grand jury today and asked for new indictments against B. H. Conners, F. Ira Bender and A. B. Maple, charged with having attempted to dynamite the Hall of Records building.

Judge Frank R. Willis had ordered the former indictments quashed on the ground that certain provisions of the penal code had not been complied with. The McNamara brothers are disappointed at the continuance of their case by Judge Walter Bordwell until 10 a. m. tomorrow. At this time Judge Bordwell will give his decision on the defense's motion to quash the indictments against the McNamaras. If his ruling is adverse to the defense, the McNamaras will be asked to plead, and the date for their trial will be set.

Attorney Clarence Burrow announced today that the defense could not possibly be ready to go to trial before December 1. It was believed that the prosecution would insist on the trial being heard early in September.

Mrs. Mary McNamara, mother of the accused men, will leave for Los Angeles this week. She expects to be present at every session of the trial.

ROUGH RIDERS ACQUITTED OF CRUELTY CHARGES

Salem, Or., July 11.—Ray's Rough Riders from eastern Oregon were acquitted of the charge of cruelty to animals brought against them by the officers of the local Humane society yesterday afternoon. The witnesses for the prosecution failed to get their evidence in positive form. They did not go close enough to the bucking horses to be able to swear to the condition of the

animals after being ridden near to the kind of spurs worn by the riders. All testified that the alleged bronchos stood drooping by their hitching posts until they were led upon the field and that even after they were mounted they stood still until beaten unmercifully with whips and spurred. Some witnesses declared they were like old farm horses while others compared them with delivery wagon animals. In the absence of specific evidence the jury dismissed the defendants.
