

HIGH SCHOOL GIRLS GO, SHERIFF HUNTS

Goldie Nichols, Anna Duffy, of Forest Grove, Are Found at Oregon City.

Oregon City, Or., July 12.—Two girls about 16 years of age appeared at the home of Justice of the Peace Samson last night and asked whether he could help them secure work in this city. They gave their names as Julia Smith and Maymie Jones and said that they had just arrived from San Francisco. The justice and his wife took the girls into the house and gave them their supper and during the meal questioned them thoroughly. He soon became convinced that they had run away from home and questioning them on this point, it developed that they were Goldie Nichols and Anna Duffy of Forest Grove. They said they had left their homes Tuesday because they could not stand the treatment accorded them by their parents. Justice Samson procured lodging for the young wanderers and this morning took them to his house for breakfast. The authorities at Forest Grove have been notified and it is probable the girls will be returned to their parents today.

Forest Grove, Or., July 12.—Goldie Nichols and Anna Duffy, aged about 15, both Forest Grove high school girls, disappeared Tuesday evening, and today Sheriff George Hancock of Hillsboro is in quest of these well known lasses, the reason for whose supposed flight is not clear. Miss Nichols is daughter of James Nichols, a fruit tree sprayer of this county. Miss Duffy's parents also live in town, and the girls have been chums.

The two went to Gaston, Washington county, first, and it was reported this morning they had been seen in Oregon City. Sheriff Hancock, however, thinks they went from Gaston to Portland. Mrs. Nichols says her daughter some time ago alluded to an offer of \$25 a month she said had been made her by a showman to accompany his troupe.

Each girl is slender, fairly good looking, about five feet tall, and with black hair. Each is about the same size.

WOODMEN DECLARE PREHN MURDERED

Winlock Night Marshal's Lodge Fellows Will Demand Investigation.

Winlock, Wash., July 12.—The Woodmen of the World lodge of Winlock, of which Night Marshal F. F. Prehn was a charter member, are taking steps to demand an investigation of what Prehn's fellow members consider was a murder. They think someone struck Prehn over the head, then shoved him over the bank into Olequa creek, where his body was found last Saturday morning by two boys. In line with developments which have consistently indicated that Prehn's death was not due to accident, the people of Winlock have grown to nearly one way of thinking—murder. There is variance of opinion regarding why the night officer went into the pitchy dark opening under the Elliott store, but the general view now is that when he arrived there he encountered someone who caused his tragic end. It is a practice of certain select Winlock groups to indulge in "mulligan" parties, a not uncommon prank in towns of western Washington and west-

ern Oregon. One or two of the group will raid a conveniently located chicken coop, secure a hen or two, repair to where the co-conspirators have a fire kindled and enjoy a chicken feast. Under the Elliott store, on a platform over the creek bottom, was kept a chicken coop. It is now claimed by Prehn's friends that someone seeking material for a "mulligan" climbed up the steep bank to the basement opening and that the marshal went down the stairway on the other side of the store, opened the padlocked door with a key from his ring and slipped in among the pots in the darkness to surprise the culprit; that, startled, the latter struck him or pushed him off the platform, then clambered down the

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Half-Hour Schedule for Vancouver Cars

Five minutes will be added to the schedule running time of the Portland-Vancouver car, beginning next Monday. This will give a half hourly service instead of a 35 minute schedule. This change was made necessary because of the delays occasioned by the draw in the Burnside bridge being open so much

of the time. These delays make it almost impossible for the car men to run on a 35 minute schedule and keep the cars on time. The distance between Portland and Vancouver, beginning with Fifth and Washington and landing at the ferry slip in Vancouver, is eight miles. Cars, upon their present running time, can make this distance with the customary stops in the business district in 35 minutes, not counting the time occupied in the ferry crossing the river. But when the draw in the Burnside bridge is open and 10 or 15 minutes are lost, it is almost impossible to make up the time. It is to obviate this difficulty that the service is to be changed to a half hour schedule.
