

ENDICOTT CROP, 500,000 BUSHEL

In Western Palouse Locality Spring Grain May Average Nearly 20 Bushels.

Endicott, Wash., July 13.—Favorable weather will give the Endicott section a magnificent crop of wheat. More rain would be welcome for maturing the spring sowing and as this is the greatest portion of the crop here, show-ers would be doubly welcome.

While there is an increase of about 10 per cent in the spring acreage in the Endicott country, the fall sowing is from 10 to 15 per cent smaller than last year.

Spring wheat will average around 20 bushels per acre, although in some few instances prospects range as high as 30 bushels. Showers in the immediate future would add materially to the general average.

Fall wheat is already made and will soon be ready for the combines. The general start on the wheat harvest here will not be until the latter part of the month, but around Lacrosse, the cereal year will begin within a few days. The harvest in other sections of the county will be later than here.

There are plenty of men in sight for the harvest at this time, although many of them will probably disappear previous to the starting of the combines. No shortage of operators is, however, anticipated.

Wheat growers have done well since starting here. A sample is the case of Henry Leinweber, who came to this section 14 years ago with a cash capital of \$400 and who is able today to write a check for close to \$100,000. This season he has 1100 acres in wheat and has one of the best crops of this section.

George McKay, one of the big farmers of this vicinity, has 1500 acres of wheat, bluestem, while some of his land is expected to make the general average of 20 bushels, it is not likely the average of the 1500 acres will range above 14 or possibly 16 bushels per acre. The smaller showing is due entirely to the fact that a large per cent of his grain was sown very late and therefore did not get the benefits of the full season.

H. J. Miller has 1500 acres in wheat this season. The grain is almost equally divided between fall and spring sowing. For the latter a yield that will average perhaps 18 bushels, is expected, while from the fall planting the average will be very close to 20 bushels.

John A. Schmick, with 1200 acres of fortyfour that was sown in the fall, will have an average of 35 bushels per acre from present prospects.

H. P. Hayes has 1000 acres of spring wheat that indicates a harvest of 20 to 35 bushels. This is above the average for this section, however.

Cole Bros. have a similar acreage of spring bluestem that is expected to harvest 25 bushels.

Isaac Nease has 400 acres of hybrid wheat that is one of the wonders of even such a season as this. It will average 40 bushels, according to those familiar with that grain. Last season his sowing was spring grain and his yield did not average more than 21 bushels.

C. M. Smith, with his 160 acres of club wheat, says he will have from 40 to 45 bushels average.

J. Rockwell has 1200 acres of fall sowing that will make the general average of this section.

Last season this station shipped 450,000 bushels of wheat, but 500,000 bushels will undoubtedly be shipped during the coming season.

All the old wheat has been sold but a small lot still remains in the warehouse here. This will be shipped within a few days.

COKE'S EDUCATION FREELY DISCUSSED

Movement to Recall Marshfield Judge Will Fail, Says McKnight.

That the agitation to invoke the recall against Judge J. S. Coke of Marshfield, who presided over the Roy McKnight murder case at Roseburg, has reached its zenith and enough signatures will be secured to submit the question to the people, is the opinion of C. F. McKnight of Marshfield, who was one of the attorneys for the defense in the case.

"My opinion is that they will not receive the required number of signatures to place the matter before the people," said Attorney McKnight, who left Portland this morning on a trip into Washington and if they should secure enough names, I don't believe they would be able to get any reputable attorney to run against Judge Coke. To my mind, the whole affair is an insult to Judge Coke and to the entire legal fraternity. But I can say that Judge Coke and his friends have no disposition to block the recall. We want the people to have a chance to express themselves. We have an abiding conviction that the judge will be upheld.

"The public at large was crying for the recall of McKnight. So much so, in fact, that we had to ask for an order of the court to lock the jury up

and deny them all access to newspapers and private correspondence. The state of the public mind was indicated by the fact that after the jury returned its verdict, talk of lynching was mentioned on the streets, and by numerous anonymous letters written to the defendant telling him to leave the city. They went so far as to write to Miss Speicher who was unfortunate enough to be connected with the case.

"As one of the attorneys in the case, and being more or less responsible for the instructions given, I unhesitatingly say that the instructions complained of were law as laid down by the supreme court of this state, and particularly applicable to the facts in this case. I do not believe that any attorney of note, who is familiar with the facts and the law as laid down by the court, will question the instructions.

"I realize, if taken alone, the instructions relating to what constituted an overt act might be subject to some question, were it not for the peculiar facts surrounding the case. But in view of the other instructions given and the surrounding facts, there is no question in my mind but that Judge Coke properly stated the law in the case.

"The only other instruction complained of was the one in regard to self-defense. It was based on the supreme court's decision in the case of the State vs. Murrey, and is not subject to question."

James Has a Clear Field.

Kentucky is the first state to settle a 1913 senatorial contest. The withdrawal of Senator Paynter has left Representative Ollie James a clear field, and unless the legislature of the state becomes Republican on joint ballot next winter Mr. James will succeed Mr. Paynter in the United States senate. The present legislature is Democratic on joint ballot by 69.

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OREGON FORESTRY TOPICS DISCUSSED

New Bureau Estimates State Timber Worth Five Billion Dollars.

Salem, Or., July 13.—That Oregon contains one fifth of the standing timber of the United States; that the timber is estimated worth \$5,000,000,000; that one third of the stumpage of the state is in the national forests; that more than \$25,000,000 is expended in Oregon annually because of the lumber industry, but that fires destroyed \$12,000,000 worth of timber last year, are some of the striking facts brought out in a new bulletin just off the state printer's press and ready for distribution by State Forester F. A. Elliott.

The publication takes up the problem of forestry and discusses it from an economic point of view. Twenty thousand copies will be distributed. The cooperation of the Oregon Agricultural college was had and the writing was largely done by George W. Peavy, professor of forestry.

"Selfishness has retarded the development of a forestry policy in the United States," declares the publication. "Yet great progress has been made. The national forests now contain 200,000,000 acres and many states are just beginning to acquire reserves. Not only

will forests be maintained, but existing forests will be improved and new ones developed."

The Long Wait for Harvest. "Fundamentally, forestry means planting, tending and harvesting wood crops," says Professor Peavy. "The only difference between this and agriculture is that the planter must wait from 10 to 100 years for his harvest."

Quoting H. H. Schwartz, special agent of the federal land office, Mr. Peavy points out that not one in every hundred who have committed has ever occupied his claim. The claims have become a part of some large timber holding or parcel of a cattle or sheep ranch. He carefully traces the history of the government land laws from the beginning of the country's history.

Prodigality of the American. In Oregon the old story of the prodigal "log rollers" have been retold and millions have gone up in smoke in order that lands might be cleared.

"History fails to show another nation whose wealth has grown more rapidly, nor where wealth has been with equal prodigality. Of an original 4,800,000,000 feet of saw timber not more than 3,800,000,000 feet remain in this country. The annual drain on our forests, not counting the losses due to fire, storms and insects, is 20,000,000,000 cubic feet. We use wood annually at the rate of 250 cubic feet for every one of our 90,000,000 people.

"The sawmills of Oregon manufacture about 2,000,000,000 feet of lumber each year, 6 per cent of which is shipped to points outside of the state. The value of the material turned out by the wood consuming factories of the state is estimated at \$4,705,731 annually. Since this output is unquestionably on the increase, a wise policy of handling the forests is essential."

Presiding Judge Gantenben yesterday allowed the man to go upon his recognizance until Friday afternoon, when a further hearing will be held on the writ of habeas corpus.
