

100,000 WELSHMEN CHEER NEW PRINCE

17-Year-Old Son of King George and Queen Mary Is Invested.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Carnarvon, Wales, July 13.—Cheered by 100,000 loyal Welshmen who gathered here today to greet their nominal ruler, Edward, the 17-year-old son of King George V of Great Britain, was today invested with ceremonies of quaint and medieval magnificence as Prince of Wales.

King George and Queen Mary played minor parts in the pomp and pageantry which brightened ancient Carnarvon castle, while their son occupied the center of the stage as the leading figure in this historic ceremonial.

As the royal Welsh choir of 400 voices broke into song the royal party entered the castle at the ancient water gate, the Prince of Wales and his escort in the lead, the royal party bringing up the rear. As the prince set foot in the castle entrance the ancient standard of Merioneth was broken out from the Eagle tower, where, it is said, the first English Prince of Wales was born. As King George and Queen Mary entered the castle the prince's flag came down and the royal standard of England was blown out from the staff.

JAPANESE NEWSPAPERS DISCUSS PACT'S TERMS

Tokyo, July 13.—The Japanese press devotes considerable space today to comments on an article in the London Times advocating modifications of the Anglo-Japanese treaty in order to avoid conflict with the proposed Anglo-American arbitration treaty. The comments are mostly in sympathy with the Times' attitude.

The Tokio Asahi and Nippon both advocate a continuance of the English alliance because it aims at the integrity of China, and both declare that modifications of the treaty will not be difficult because Japan has no intention of engaging in war with the United States.

MANUEL AND PRETENDER JOIN TO DOWN REPUBLIC

London, July 13.—With a war fund of \$6,000,000, raised by the Portuguese in Brazil, already available, a call to arms to all Portuguese monarchists has been issued jointly by Manuel of Portugal and Don Miguel, the pretender, according to an Exchange Telegraph dispatch received here today from Badajoz. It is reported that Captain Couceiro, leader of the royalist movement for the restoration of the monarchy, is now in England endeavoring to effect the purchase of a British warship.

GOOD OLD RIO GRANDE GIVES TEXAS NEW LAND

Galveston, Texas, July 13.—Out of its banks for more than a mile in width in many places, the Rio Grande today is cutting a new river bed which, according to the terms of the boundary commission will give Texas more than 10,000 acres of land. The river is cutting westward from a point at the western intersection of Jeff Davis county, then southward and into its original bed about 25 miles below this point in Presidio county.

JURYMEN SCORN TECHNICALITIES

On First Ballot Convict Nebraska Eloper Caught at Mt. Angel.

Salem, Or., July 13.—It took the jury just 10 minutes to return a verdict of guilty in the case of the state vs. Betchen yesterday afternoon. Betchen was charged with sloping from Nebraska with the wife of Newton Ruhle and living unlawfully with her in Marion county, Oregon. He was arrested several months ago on a farm near Mount Angel. The defense failed to introduce any evidence but sought to clear the man by setting up legal technicalities. Attorneys Kaiser and Pogue argued among other things that the state would have to prove the Ruhles legally married, and that Betchen was a single man. If Betchen was a married man, they argued, none but his wife could prosecute him. Brushing aside technical points, the jury voted unanimously for conviction on the first ballot. This is the second time Betchen has been convicted on this charge. He will be sentenced Monday.

2000 GREBES NEST ON LOWER KLAMATH LAKE IN NATIONAL RESERVE

Merrill, Or., July 13.—Protection afforded by the national bird reserve on lower Klamath lake, has resulted in a perceptible increase already in grebes and gulls, while ducks and geese are innumerable. Plumage hunters, who found ready market with the millinery and hat houses of large cities, practically exterminated the grebe population, but with the brief nesting immunity since establishment of the bird reserve, it is estimated there are probably 1000 grebe nests this year. With a special warden watching the lake, these fine birds may eventually recover their lost numbers.

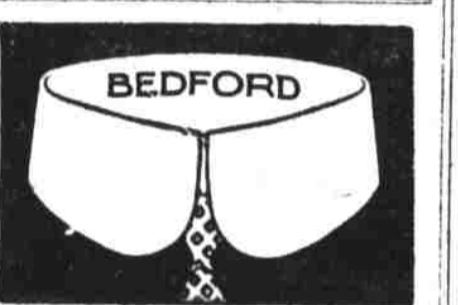
GARNISHEE CASE MEANS PRECEDENT

Ehhebe-Green Suit May Settle Whether State Employee's Wages Are Liable.

Salem, Or., July 13.—The old case of Carl Ehhebe vs. J. L. Green and Ben W. Olcott, secretary of state, garnishee, will come to trial. The plaintiff claims Green owed him \$50, and he attached his account with state for his services as deputy forester for February, 1910. The complaint was filed in F. W. Benson's administration, but the answer is just now being filed. After the writ of attachment was served over a year ago nothing further was done until Assistant Attorney General Van Winkle yesterday threatened to have the suit dismissed. The interesting point in the case will be the determination of the liability of the law authorizing the garnisheeing of funds held by public disbursing officers.

MYSTERIOUS INVADERS ATTACK LISBON CASTLE

Lisbon, July 13.—Adherents of the republican form of government here are on guard today due to an unsuccessful attempt made last night to capture St. George castle by a band of mysterious but daring invaders. Government officials today inaugurated a strict press censorship and the garrison at the castle has been increased so as to assure it safety from further attack. The attack made on the castle was a feeble one and the invaders, who are believed to be monarchists, soon disappeared into the darkness when the republican soldiers fired on them. It is said that the government officials have been informed that many of the monarchist constituents are ready to sacrifice their principles for pardon and cash compensation ranging from \$500 to \$2500.

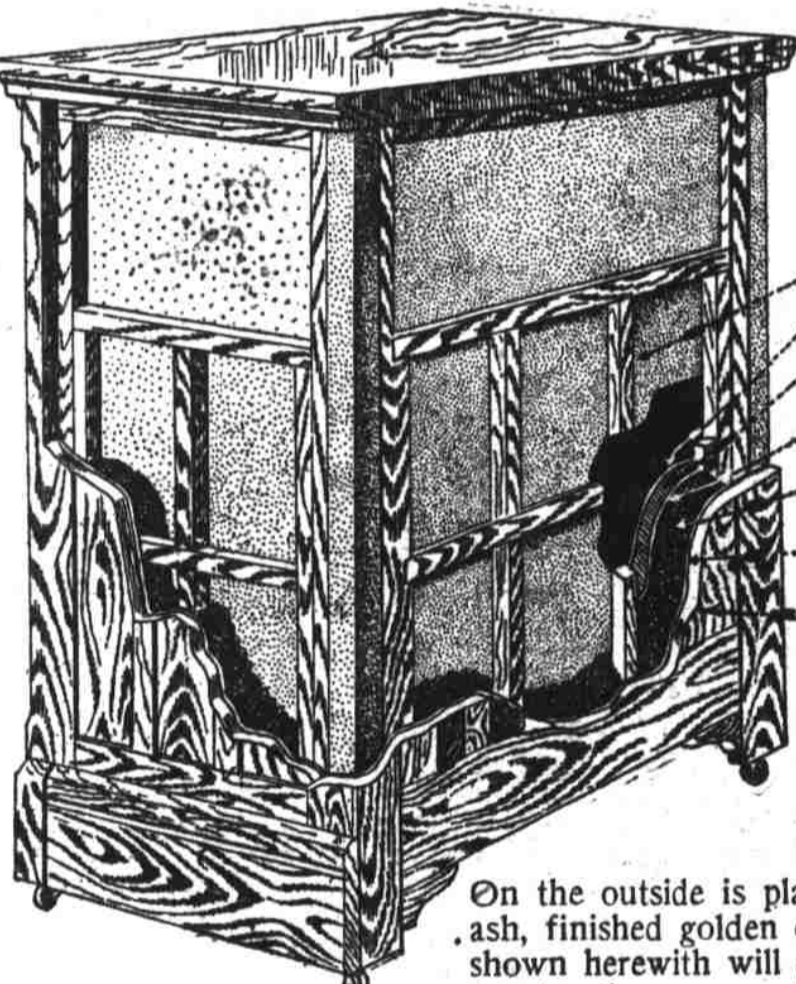

Construction of Celebrated "Alaska" Refrigerator

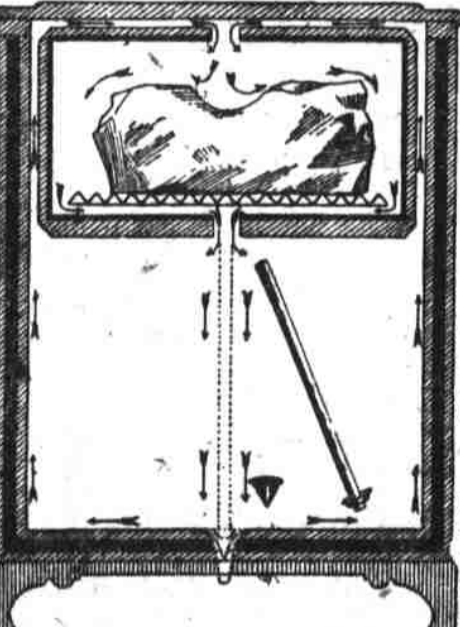


The Alaska has been sold in Portland for many years, and is the most popular refrigerator in use here today. We guarantee it to give perfect satisfaction.

The construction of the walls in an Alaska refrigerator is such that the maximum amount of cold air is produced with the minimum consumption of ice. This is secured by the use of the best insulation in a scientific manner so as to secure the result desired. We divide the inside of the walls into small compartments by a system of cleat construction which makes it impossible for the charcoal to settle away from the ice chamber. These spaces are all filled with pebbled charcoal.

On each side of this charcoal is glued one thickness of charcoal sheathing, and next to this is the inside case of odorless matched wood and then the metal lining.

On the outside is placed the paneled case of black ash, finished golden oak. A little study of the cut shown herewith will give a clear idea of the Alaska construction.



Showing "Alaska" Air Circulation

The above cut shows manner of air circulation. The ice rests on a corrugated galvanized iron rack, which is so constructed as to leave an air passage under the iron. The warm air in the provision chamber rises through the flues at each end of the ice chamber, comes in contact with the ice at the central opening in the lid flues, becomes colder and drops under the ice rack, where all moisture is condensed, and falls through the central opening under the ice into the provision chamber, cold and dry. No other system keeps the air so long in contact with the ice as the Alaska consequently it does the work more thoroughly than any other.
