Mothers' congress day opened most auspiciously this morning.

The heat of yesterday kept many visitors on the Chautauqua grounds over night. In consequence, the grounds today were a beehive of people long before the time had arrived for opening the gates to the public. While the day promises to be a hot one, there is little fear of any one in the park suffering, for the grove is so dense that there are places on the grounds the sun's rays can scarcely penetrate. There is plenty of water, and it is being used freely to keep things comfortable.

All Class Members Present.
Every class started with the full quota of members this morning, and while there was just as much interest manifest, it was evident that all felt the beginning of the end was at hand. The lessons all had an air of finality that indicated the close.

Today Mrs. Webster talked on French art, to a crowded house. The kindergarten remains popular, both with parents and children. The school of expression is keeping up its interest and enthusiasm, and this morning had quite

as large a class as at any time during the session.

Mrs. Booker draws wonderfully and has been most successful as a teacher in Bible study. Mrs. Fox's class does real, actual study work and those who have been constant attendants feel the subject is so large it has scarcely been touched upon.

Mrs. Waldo's Address.

Mrs. Clara Waldo made such a pleasing address, and was so warmly welcomed yesterday when she spoke at the forum hour, on "Life at Home and Abroad," that many went out this morning specially to hear her address at 11 a. m. for the Congress of Mothers.

A large audience listened to the silver medal contest at 4 o'clock. Upon the platform were the state officers, Mrs. Unruh, Mrs. Swope and Mrs. Alice Hanson, several women who hold medals and Rev. Hanson, who led in prayer. A. K. Bishop sang two fine solos and responded to enthusiastic encores. Miss Elizabeth Whittlesey accompanied the singer and played two solos with exquisite effect.

The medal was awarded to Miss Olive Clark, who recited "Yeremiah and His People."

The cottage was crowded all day and many congratulatory comments were made on the beautiful cottage that has replaced the tent which has been the headquarters at Gladstone for so many years. Although it accommodates 25 ladies it has proven already too small for the need and plans are on foot for its extension, and the small deficit remaining at the opening is provided for when all pledges are paid.

Thousands are expected on the grounds this afternoon to hear Dr. Aked's address on "Gladstone, His Legacy to the English People." His address yesterday was one of the most profound, scholarly and logical talks ever delivered from the Chautauqua rostrum. When he began to speak his English accent was so pronounced there was some speculation as to whether or not it would affect the interest of the audience in the message it had to give. But he had not spoken a dozen sentences before this was forgotten. He had either lost it, or his audience was so intent upon calculating and holding every word that they lost the inflection.

His subject, "The Strongest Man on Earth," referred to no modern Samson, who could kill lions with the jaw bone of an ass, or raise great buildings, with their hundreds of occupants, to the ground, but his strongest man on earth was the man that could stand absolutely alone. His first example was Socrates, who asked questions and forced the people to answer them. "For when we think we are thinking we are often doing nothing of the kind; we are simply riding on the back of a craze." "Some one," he said, "suggested that a telephone be put from the vestibule of the church to the minister's study so that he might hear the comments on his sermon as the congregation passed out." Every pulpit in the land would be vacant if they did; yet, he thought, it might be a good thing to know their idea of the many stock terms used in sermons that meant absolutely nothing to the people.

Praises Ibsen.

He then took up Ibsen and no finer

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tribute was ever paid than when he referred to Ibsen as one who asked questions of the age. He classed him as the very greatest among the formative influences of the age. He mentioned several of Ibsen's dramas and pointed out their bearing upon various phases of society, but he found his text in "Ghosts" and made Dr. Stockman a type of the strongest man on earth. Rapidly he sketched the story and before he was half through, even those who were not familiar with Ibsen, could see the drift and how it applied to present day conditions in municipal, state and national government. It was a masterly picture, strong, clear cut and unmistakable. He then followed this up with an array of the strong men of earth, Oliver Cromwell, John Wesley, Garibaldi and Lincoln—all standing alone in their strength of purpose, but "upon the thrones of time and history." He justified the eloquent doctor does not believe in; he thinks more often it's the minority that thinks, therefore it's the minority that is right. With dramatic effect he recited Burns' poem, "A Man's Man, For All O' The Time." It was certainly a most "undesirable" who was not made a better citizen for having heard Dr. Aked yesterday.

OILER AT DEE, OR., IS ELECTROCUTED

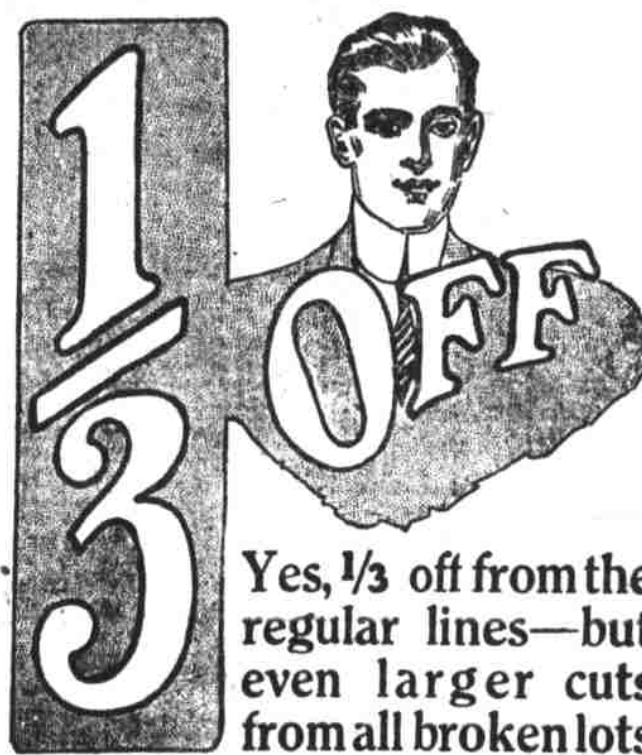
Comes in Contact With Wire at
