

SENATOR LEA STAYS DEATH'S HAND —BY RUSHING SICK WIFE TO WEST

Mountain Climate Hurriedly Sought To Combat Pneumonia

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Denver, July 15.—United States Senator Luke Lea of Tennessee, won his race against death, the stake of which was the life of his wife.

Threatened with "ether pneumonia," and in such a condition that to contract it would be fatal, Mrs. Lea was rushed from Deer Park, Md., in a fast train accompanied by her husband, a physician and nurse.

The physician said unless she reached a cooler and dryer climate, she must die. Tonight the same physician, Dr. Henry N. Fry of Washington, D. C., advised Senator Lea that his wife was out of danger.

Last Wednesday night Dr. Fry discovered symptoms of "ether pneumonia," resulting from the ether taken during a difficult operation Mrs. Lea recently underwent. He advised her husband of the danger and the senator immediately rushed his wife west.

Mrs. Lea's mother and sister accompanied the party. For 1700 miles the train raced, but not until it reached the mountain air of Colorado did the patient show signs of improvement. Senator Lea, who has spent four summers in Denver, stated tonight that he would remain here until his wife has entirely recovered. He does not expect to get back to the national capital in time to vote on the Canadian reciprocity bill, but will pair off with some opponent of the measure.

GLACIA CALLA NEW CO-RESPONDENT IN SIDNEY LOVE CASE

Noted Actress, Mrs. Love Says, Was With Love in New York in the Days When She Was "Barefoot Lil."

Seattle, Wash., July 15.—The limelight that has been turned on the gay life of Sidney Love, former New York and Chicago millionaire broker, since his sojourn on the Pacific coast, following the loss of his fortune in the Chicago wheat pit, has been switched across the continent by a sensational turn given the case by his pretty young wife, Mrs. Marjorie Burness Love of New York city. Mrs. Love has amended her answer in her cross complaint at Baker, Or., naming Mrs. Paul Roy of Boston, New York and Washington, D. C., as a co-respondent.

The connection of Mrs. Roy with the case has hitherto been suppressed, but it is now a matter of record at Baker and was filed by Ivan L. Hyland, attorney for Mrs. Love, in the case of Seattle, one of the eight firms of attorneys employed by Mrs. Love in this country and in England.

The Love case is to be resumed at Baker on July 20, when Love is scheduled to begin putting in his rebuttal evidence, and the naming of Mrs. Roy was held back just to disconcert him. Mrs. Love's attorneys intimate that on Monday another woman well known in New York as well as several well known women throughout the northwest will be named as co-respondents.

Mrs. Roy is referred to in the papers as Glacia Calla and "Barefoot Lil," but as Glacia Calla, this actress was prominent in the east and only a few years ago attained much notoriety when her life in Washington, D. C., and in Boston was exploited through sensational investigations conducted in her home in New Hampshire. Mr. Love is accused of indiscretions with Mrs. Roy at New York city on various occasions between September 1, 1909, and March 1, 1910.

"For that matter, I do not think that any arbitration treaty between the United States and Japan would invade the agreement as to coolie labor at present in force. I am glad to say that the Japanese government seems to be living up to its promise to keep its laborers at home and conditions in that respect on the Pacific coast now are fairly satisfactory.

"There are, however, some questions still to be decided about the entry of Japanese women into the United States. These probably will be arranged without serious difficulty."

NURSE WHO STOLE FORTUNE ASSERTS SHE'S NOT A THIEF

"I Must Have Taken These Bonds," Says Mrs. Armour's Companion, "But My Conscience Is Clear."

Kansas City, Mo., July 15.—"I am not a thief, and my conscience is clear, yet I must have taken these bonds. I found some of them after Mrs. Armour accused me, and I found money and valuables that I could not have acquired in any other way. I have no recollection of taking them, however. I have given back everything that I took. That is all that I can do."

This was the statement made tonight by Miss Harriet Byington, former nurse and companion of Mrs. S. B. Armour, wife of the late millionaire packer, who is accused of stealing bonds valued at \$142,000 from Mrs. Armour.

Miss Byington's name was made public for the first time today when attorneys for Mrs. Armour filed suit against her to recover the money and valuables. Heretofore Mrs. Armour, while admitting her loss, has refused to make public the name of the person in her household whom she suspected of the theft.

Attorneys for Mrs. Armour said tonight that the nurse had returned \$70,000 in cash and bonds, clothing, jewelry and costly furniture to the value of \$33,000, leaving a balance of \$39,000 still missing. Miss Byington denies any knowledge of the remaining amount. It is to recover this that suit was brought today.

Widow Will Not Act.
Mrs. Armour says that she will not take the initiative in bringing criminal prosecution against her former nurse, but that she believes the state should institute criminal action.

"She should be punished or she may do the same thing again," said Mrs. Armour tonight. "Her sex should not protect her."

Miss Byington is 37 years old and a native of Naples, Italy. After coming to the United States she became a professional nurse. Called to the Armour home during a time when Mrs. Armour was ill, she won the friendship of her charge and became her confidential companion. The loss of the bonds and valuables was first discovered last February.

East Side Towns Want Road.

Oregon City, Or., July 15.—Unless a determined fight is made by the towns of Canby, New Era, Hubbard, Barlow, Aurora and Oregon City, it is thought by Grant B. The west side route seemed to be favored at the meeting of the commission held in Portland, but it is thought that the route might be changed to pass through this city by the aid of substantial subscriptions.

REFUSED A KISS, WIFE TAKES POISON

Mrs. Frank Steffan, Vancouver, Brings Domestic Woes to a Climax.

Vancouver, Wash., July 15.—Because her husband refused to kiss her when he arrived at their home on the St. Johns road at 2 o'clock this afternoon, Mrs. Frank A. Steffan grabbed a handful of corrosive sublimate tablets and attempted to swallow them with suicidal intent. Her husband grabbed her by the throat with one hand and with the other forced a quantity of the poison from her mouth. Mrs. Steffan's

daughter and son-in-law called Dr. J. T. Guerin, who administered raw eggs and milk as temporary relief and called Dr. R. E. Thompson. On arrival of Dr. Thompson a stomach pump was used and indications showed that a large amount of poison had been swallowed. Mrs. Steffan was removed to St. Joseph's hospital, where it is said tonight that her condition is critical. Her lips and face are badly swollen and raw from the poison. Mrs. Steffan recently underwent a delicate surgical operation and has not fully recovered from the effects, and this, it is said by her physician, will work against her recovery.

Steffan conducts a dye and cleaning plant at 304 West Fifth street. A few days ago he was arrested on complaint of his wife charged with a statutory offense, and was fined \$75 on conviction in police court.

CHERRIES RIPPEN TOO FAST FOR THE PICKERS

Forest Grove, Or., July 15.—The extremely hot weather of the past few

days has caused the cherry crop in this section to ripen more rapidly than the raisers can care for it, and in consequence there will be considerable loss of the fruit. The main trouble is the lack of pickers, other work offering better wages than cherry picking. Crops of all kinds promise a large yield this year in Washington county. All classes of grains are showing up well, and the potato yield will be heavy. Growers report the hop outlook as encouraging.

BRITAIN MODIFIED JAPANESE TREATY IN FAVOR OF U. S.

Fourth Article Shows That England Regarded Original Pact as Conflicting With Alliance With This Country.

(By the International News Service.)
Washington, July 15.—The secretary of state today gave out the text of the modified Anglo-Japanese treaty and it shows that Great Britain regarded her general arbitration treaty with the United States as being in conflict with the original Anglo-Japanese pact.

This is apparent on a reading of the fourth article of the modified treaty which is as follows:

"Should either high contracting party conclude a treaty of general arbitration with a third power, it is agreed that nothing in this agreement shall entail upon such contracting party an obligation to go to war with the power with whom such treaty of arbitration is in force."

JAPANESE-AMERICAN AGREEMENT WOULD NOT AFFECT COAST'S STAND

San Francisco, July 15.—That the arrangement of an arbitration treaty between the United States and Japan, similar to the amended treaty between Great Britain and Japan which it is reported from Washington may soon be moved for, will make no difference in the attitude of the Pacific coast toward the Japanese was the statement here today of A. E. Yoell, secretary of the Asiatic Exclusion League.

"It is very interesting to know that such a treaty between the United States and Japan has now become a possibility," Yoell said, "but that or any other treaty between the two countries would in no way alter the position taken by this organization."

"Californians and people of the Pacific coast generally have only the kindest feeling for the Japanese government and for the Japanese in Japan. While the Japanese and all other Asi-
