

WATER SHORTAGE TO BE CONTINUED

New Sprinkling Order May Remain in Force Till Pipe Line Is Completed.

"I cannot say just when the new sprinkling order will be rescinded," said Superintendent Frank T. Dodge of the water department this morning. "There will be no permanent relief from the threatened water shortage until the new

pipe line has been completed and it may be that the water board to be on the safe side will continue the present sprinkling until the big Bull Run conduit is finished. I know that water users are wondering how much longer they will have to get up early in the morning to water their lawns, but they know as much about that as I do.

"The reservoirs have gained 2,800,000 gallons in the past 24 hours, thanks to the cool weather, and the deficit in the storage basins is now only 2 1/2 per cent. At the rate the supply is increasing it will be back to normal within a few days, but there is no telling when we will have another hot spell.

"We have had much complaint from suburban tracts where real estate companies, in order to sell lots by representing that Bull Run water had been brought to the said lots have laid small pipes. As a result the first few houses take all the water that is supplied through these insufficient pipes during

the early morning sprinkling hours and the rest of the houses in the tracts must wait.

"My advice in such cases has been for the water users to store water at night for use during the morning period when they can get none."

Mayor Ruhlright yesterday received a letter from W. J. Platt, a resident of Roseme, suggesting that the city pass at once an ordinance prohibiting the laying of water mains under 8 inches in diameter. The letter will be referred to the city water board.

MANY SEEK POSITION OF CITY PHYSICIAN

Mayor Ruhlright has received a number of applications for the position of city physician. There is no vacancy in that position, as it is being filled at present by Dr. Fred Zeigler and the

mayor stated this morning that he believes the present incumbent is giving good satisfaction.

"I have never said I would displace any good official," replied the mayor when asked today if he intends to displace Dr. Zeigler, "and for the present, at least, there will be no change."

Among the applicants for the position of city physician are Dr. J. A. Applewhite, Dr. James C. Hayes and Dr. S. M. Gellert.

Dr. Applewhite has been strongly recommended, a petition signed by more than a dozen medical men having been presented to the mayor, asking him to appoint Dr. Applewhite. The petition is headed by Dr. Sanford Whitling.

PRES. GRAY PLEASSED WITH TILLAMOOK LINE

President C. R. Gray, of the Hill lines in Oregon, W. E. Coman, general freight and passenger agent of the North Bank and the Oregon Trunk, and L. B. Wickarsham, chief engineer of the United Railways, have returned from the Tillamook country where they went to inspect the holdings of the Hill system.

President Gray says this was his first visit to the Tillamook country and he enthusiastically praises the wonderful natural resources with which it abounds.

"We followed the course of the Willamson river to Tillamook," said President

Gray this morning, in speaking of the trip, "and saw some wonderful fir and cedar timber that for years to come will furnish traffic for our line. When this timber has been removed the denuded lands can be used for agricultural purposes because the soil in the valleys is of excellent quality."

President Gray said that extension of the line from Banks to Tillamook depends entirely upon what attitude the railroads take towards extension and construction work. He says that as yet he has received no information on that score and the resumption of work beyond Banks therefore is still an open question.

"We visited Tillamook, Bay City and Garibaldi," continued Mr. Gray, "and the people of the Tillamook country certainly have their arms open for a railroad. They need one and they will have one, but how soon the work will be taken upon our line depends a great

deal on the attitude of the public toward the railroads. Under existing conditions they are inclined to push new work."

Speaking of progress made on the Oregon Trunk, President Gray stated he expects to have the line in operation to Bend by November 1, and that the Crooked river bridge will be ready for trains October 1.

Bend will be the terminal until further extension work is authorized from St. Paul.

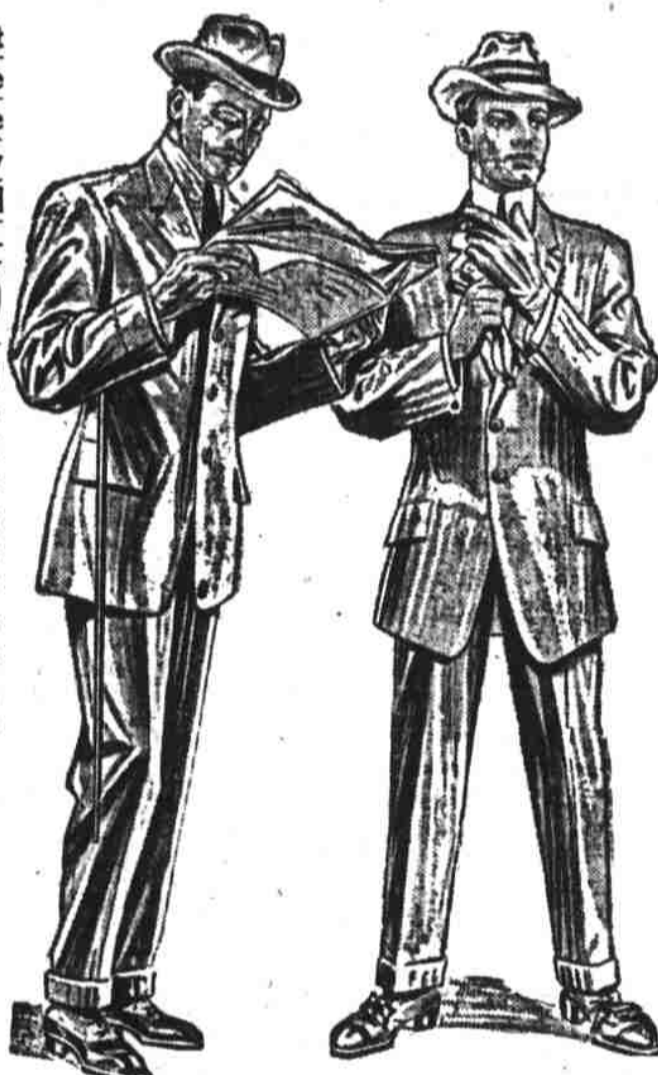
