

PORTLAND DAY AT GOLDEN POTLATCH IS A HUGE SUCCESS

Friendship Between the Sister Cities Is Patched Up by Reciprocal Courtesies; Portland Everywhere Prominent.

Seattle, Wash., July 22.—The close of one of the best days of the Potlatch at Seattle and Portland, figuratively speaking, arm in arm, singing each other's praises. Portland's day at the Potlatch was a huge success in every sense of the word and last night found Portland and Seattle residents on better terms than ever before. The visitors from the Rose City were loud in their praise of Seattle's hospitality, which was shown in many ways. The Portlanders sang the praise of the Potlatch and of the city which inaugurated this festival in many little ways of their own. Among them is this:

Tune—(Every Little Movement.)
Every big Coast city has a stunt that's all its own.
The town of fair Seattle by its Potlatch shall be known.
If you wish to see a thing of beauty, Visit the town of Portland, see a Rose Show, That's going some.

From the arrival of the Portland special at 12:17 o'clock until long after midnight the Portland guests had not a spare moment. At 2 o'clock p. m. just prior to the parade, King D'Oro, received at the Arctic club, some of the Portland delegation, including Ernest E. Merges, duke of Portland, and W. J. Hofmann, duke of Willamette, and at the same time C. C. Craig was invested with the title of duke D'Bars, at sight. This occasion was one of much merriment.

During the afternoon, the local Publicity club entertained their Portland fellows with an auto ride about the city and last evening further entertainment was provided with a Dutch lunch. The local Press club provided autos and entertainment for the visitors from the Rose City, concluding with a late program of stunts at the local club rooms.

Marines Get Glad Hand.

The afternoon parade was one of the week's features. Seven hundred marines and sailors from the cruisers West Virginia and Colorado, which are in the harbor, were close to the head of the parade and inspired continuous cheering from the multitudes. No such splendid scene has been witnessed here since the visit of the battleship fleet from the coast. The Washington National Guard was well represented while the secret fraternities, including the Moose, Knights of Pythias, Modern Woodmen of the World, W. C. T. U., and other organizations were in line, many of them with beautifully decorated floats or autos. The Moose turned out the largest delegation and made a splendid appearance. Several members from Portland were in line. They had a decorated machine bearing this inscription:

"Too bad, Mutt, you can't be a Moose, but only good men are wanted."
Last night's illuminated parade was also a huge success. Portland was well represented and, notwithstanding a dearth of lamps and other material, the visitors had a large number of cars in line and they tried to make a clean sweep of the parade with the best. The Portland Rose Festival association was represented by Ralph H. Hoyt, George L. Hutchins and Dr. Ernest Drake. Other cars represented the Portland Ad Club, Portland Commercial club and Portland Press club. The latter had three handomely decorated machines donated for the occasion by the E. M. F. company, through courtesy of the Seattle Press club.

Brilliant Scene in Harbor.
During the evening, the harbor presented a brilliant appearance. The battleships and monitor Cheyenne were outlined in light and their powerful searchlights sent messages of light over the entire city. The illuminated parade was made bright with red fire and following it the visitors and Seattle people had a riot of fun and hilarity for two hours. However, the police prohibited the use of feather ticklers, masks and talcum powder and scenes bordering on the verge of rowdiness, which took place Thursday night, will not be repeated.

Several Portland people, imbued with the spirit of the Potlatch, were reported at the Seattle pageant by Rex Oregonus, an idea which has already found much favor among the visitors.

Penrose Monetary Commissioner.

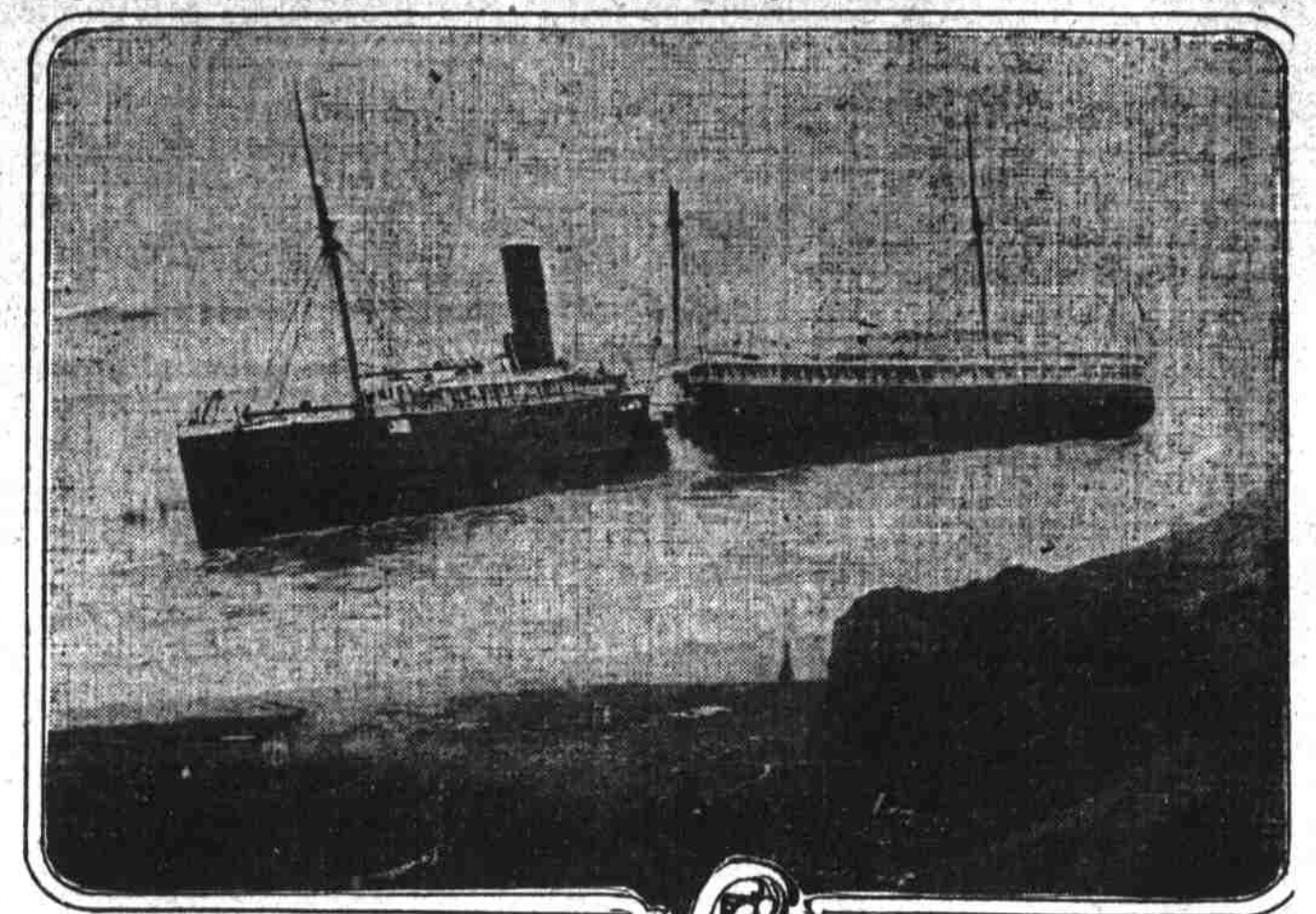

Captain May Be Held Responsible for Wreck

San Francisco, July 22.—With the examination of witnesses and the investigation of the disaster to the steamer Santa Rosa, concluded by Federal Inspectors Bolles and Bulger, it is believed here today that charges of negligence will be preferred against Captain Faria and Third Officer Thomas of the ill-fated ship. Thomas, it is said, was responsible for putting the vessel on the beach and Captain Faria for having exposed the passengers to danger in refusing to land them promptly from the wreck.

Captain Faria's alleged statement to the passengers that the steamer President would soon be along and take them all off was proved to have no foundation when Captain Thomas of the President testified that he knew nothing of the disaster until noon of the day it occurred.

Inspectors Bolles and Bulger are of the opinion that the wreck would not have occurred unless the course of the steamer had been altered. First Officer Jackson says he believes the Santa Rosa would still be afloat if "careless steering had not been done or the course of the ship changed."

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GIRL LAYS BARE RELATIONS WITH ACCUSED BANKER

Beulah Binford Ready to Confess Murder of Mrs. Beattie to Save Virginian From the Electric Chair.

Richmond, Va., July 22.—Stolidly puffing cigarettes and apparently quite indifferent to the charge that he murdered his young wife in order to be free to resume relations with pretty Beulah Binford, Henry C. Beattie, the wealthy Richmond banker, sat in his cell here today awaiting the resumption this afternoon of the inquest into the killing.

Never since the life history of Evelyn Thaw was bared to the world in a New York court room has a story been told which equals Beulah Binford's tale of her relations with the rich young banker. For four years, the girl testified, the two were intimately connected and when she was 15 years old she became the mother of Beattie's son, now dead. Prior to that time Beattie supplied money for her education at St. Mary's school, Alexandria.

Back to Old Love.

Questioned as to her relations with the alleged wife murderer, Miss Binford in a low voice told of agreeing to leave Richmond when Beattie was married. Four weeks ago, she said, she met Beattie accidentally in Norfolk, their old longing for each other was renewed and she returned to Richmond.

Since that time, Miss Binford said, she had been meeting Beattie in hotels and rooming houses, and she had arranged to make her home so as to be near the man whom she says ruined her life. Beattie, she said, had given her money with which to start the furnishing of a home where they were to meet, leaving the whole world outside the door.

Ready to Confess Murder.

The whole secret of the girl's life was told when she replied to the question: "Do you love Henry Beattie?"

"Rather than see him go to the electric chair," she replied, "I would confess that I killed his wife myself."

The girl concealed nothing of her relations with Beattie. She said that within the last few weeks they had visited a number of houses together and that the banker and she had been out automobiling at least twice a week. Monday night when the police say Beattie was absent from his home until dawn, the girl said he remained with her until midnight.

Detailing the birth of her child, the girl declared it had been born in Raleigh, North Carolina, and that it was named Henry Clay Beattie. When the baby died, she said, Beattie attended its burial.

Cousin Helped Buy Gun.

Chief of the witnesses to be examined at the inquest this afternoon will be Paul Beattie, cousin of the alleged slayer, with whom the police say Beattie went to purchase the shotgun Saturday night with which he killed his wife while driving in their automobile over a lonely part of the Middleboro Pike.

Paul Beattie collapsed when told of his cousin's arrest and has since been under the care of physicians. It is said by the police that he has signed a full confession of his part in the purchase of the weapon.

Beattie's father today received the following message from the accused banker: "Father, there is no truth in Paul Beattie's story that I had him to buy the gun."

It is reported that M. Weinstein, a pawnbroker, has identified the shotgun which killed Mrs. Beattie as one he sold to both Paul Beattie and the alleged murderer.

CHINESE FRAUD REPORT TABLED AT OTTAWA

Ottawa, Ont., July 22.—The report of Justice Murphy, of the supreme court of British Columbia, who was appointed a royal commissioner to inquire into allegations of fraud in connection with Chinese immigration on the Pacific coast was tabled in the house today.

Some time ago the trade and commerce department being suspicious of wrong doing, sent an officer to investigate and subsequently the royal commission was appointed.

The general result of the inquiry is to establish that for some years a system of wholesale entry of Chinamen into Canada means has been going on at Vancouver, B. C. Through connivance with the interpreter, Yip On, numbers of Chinamen have escaped the head tax on the allegation that they were merchants or sons of merchants and were thus entitled to exemption.

WYATT EARP IN JAIL FOR BUNGO

Gunman and Referee Charged by Los Angeles Real Estate Man.

Los Angeles, Cal., July 22.—Charged with having attempted to "bunco" J. Y. Peterson, a local real estate dealer, in a "fake faro bank" game, Wyatt Earp, noted western gunman and famous as referee of the Fitzsimmons-Sharkey fight, Walter Scott and E. Dunn are locked up today here in the city jail.

The three are booked as suspected confidence men.

Peterson alleged that the supposed "sure thing" was broached to him first by Earp. He declared the scheme, as outlined to him, looked so "raw" that he became suspicious and notified the police.

The scheme, as told by Peterson, was for him to go into a faro game and buy \$2500 worth of chips. Then, he said, when he had won \$40,000 he was to leave the game.

The three men, he declared, told him they were backed by a big San Francisco syndicate and had \$40,000 in the bank.

Peterson said Earp said that he was sore at his backers and wanted some "good fellows" to make a cleanup. Peterson apparently joined heartily in the scheme, but when Earp and the other two men appeared at the appointed place they were arrested by detectives.

BERLIN CLUB WANTS ALL TROUSERS ABOLISHED

Berlin, July 22.—The abolishing of trousers, substituting knickerbockers, and the passing of coat and waistcoat for a sort of loose blouse, hanging down to the knees, and the discarding of all linen, are some of the aims of a society of some 70 persons, which has been organized in Berlin for the purpose of reforming the style of men's garments. It is composed of persons from all sorts of professions.

The newspapers treat the matter as more or less absurd, and some of them challenge the members of the society themselves to appear in public in the new garb.

The Cologne Gazette points out that Germany can have no influence over the world's fashions for men's clothing because of the predominance of the military uniform over civilian clothing here, where even the emperor never lays aside his helmet for a silk hat.

It thinks that the fashion for men's garments will continue to be set in London, for "a popular dandy of London clubland has more influence in setting the fashion than the whole of this society of German scholars, artists and writers."

BLACK CATERPILLARS MAKE ENGINE STOP

SUGAR INVESTORS ROBBED BY TRUST, SPRECKELS SAYS

Stockholders in Combination "Milked" of \$5,000,000 for Benefit of Few, Testifies California Magnate.

New York, July 22.—That stockholders in the sugar trust were "milked" of \$5,000,000 for the benefit of Henry O. Havemeyer, Theodore Havemeyer, John Seear and his father, Claus Spreckels, was declared by Claus Spreckels, Jr., before the house Harwood committee today, which is investigating the sugar industry.

Explaining his charge, the son of the one-time sugar king, who today is president of the Federal Sugar Refining company, said:

"The sugar trust and my father's companies, especially the Federal and Philadelphia Refining companies, fought each other ruinously from 1882 to 1892. Then a truce was declared, and my father agreed to sell 45 per cent of his stock in the Federal company. It carried control.

"When he came to New York he found that the Havemeyers and Seears wanted to purchase his stock on a valuation of \$5,000,000 for the entire plant. The reason for this was learned months later when the trust voted to pay \$10,000,000 in cash for the property, and it was unloaded at that figure."

Spreckels further testified that Seear later forced him out of the management of the Philadelphia property. He said Seear ordered him to reduce the production of the property and to advance prices. When he refused Seear said:

"The only way to make money is to keep production down to the limit and to force up prices to the limit of what you can get."

"I refused to have anything to do with such methods," Spreckels said, "so they made trouble between myself and my father, and thus compelled me to quit my position."

"Spreckels explained that the trusts 'wrecking crew' methods were pursued after he had established his Federal Refining company plant at Yonkers, N. Y., in 1892. He said his machinery was broken, siphons were inserted into his tanks of liquid sugar and the product run into a sewer, dead rats and flies were placed in his barrels of sugar and his employees were bribed by the trust. He said he finally employed more trustworthy men and the troubles ceased.

prosecutions. A large number of killings are due to the fact that a revolver is at hand. If the man had to take time to load it, even, it would not be used.

"Another means would be to have laws requiring each individual to have a permit before buying a gun. Then you would have a record of each purchase, and the permit can be refused if the man is not a good citizen."

"Other restrictive measures should regulate the size of the gun, and not allow guns to be sold under a certain size. Then make the size large enough to cut out the sale of guns that are convenient to carry in the pocket. Not many murders are committed with rifles and shotguns, usually only those that are premeditated."

"I am most heartily in favor of laws that will reduce the number of revolvers carried and deal severely with those who carry weapons concealed. I am in favor of the penitentiary sentence, in the same way Texas did, to help check the fearful sacrifice of lives."

300 CHICKENS ROASTED IN POULTRY YARD FIRE

Ottawa, Ont., July 22.—In the house of commons today W. F. MacLean, resuming his address on state ownership of telegraph and telephone lines, called for a system of parcels post. He declared that the only way to bring express companies to time was to establish a parcels post system. That, in his opinion, would soon cut the express rates in two.
