

## PORTLAND LOSING TRADE BY NEGLECT OF COAST TOWNS

People of Port Orford Would Divert Trade Toward the Columbia River From the California Metropolis.

Port Orford, Or., July 24.—Portland business men have a problem to solve in directing the trade of southwestern Oregon toward the Columbia river instead of allowing it to drift toward San Francisco. California has long controlled the trade of this section of Oregon, largely because the wholesale houses of San Francisco have gone after the trade and looked after it carefully. James Sayre, of Portland, field secretary of the Oregon Development league, spent five days in Curry county, investigating the resources of this locality. The Port Orford Commercial club gave a banquet in his honor at the Masterson hotel. Forty boosters were present and listened to an instructive address by Mr. Sayre, who pronounced the Port Orford club the liveliest crowd he had found in this section.

Mr. Sayre endorsed the proposed port district to be voted on here. The feasibility of Port Orford as the best outlet for the Rogue River valley was discussed, a real problem being discovered for the Portland Commercial club in the situation in this district.

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## LORD CAMOYS PUTS OFF NEWPORT TRIP TO GET RICH GIRL

Father Sherman Said to Have Shattered Hopes of Impecunious Nobleman to Win Bride and Fortune in U. S.

London, July 24.—Miss Mildred Sherman and a large share of her father's millions may not after all be transferred to England in exchange for a lackland title. Lord Camoys has postponed indefinitely his expected visit to Newport, and thereby hangs a tale.

It is said that William Watts Sherman, father of Miss Mildred, has really set his foot down against the marriage of his daughter (and millions) to a title which doesn't represent more than an ordinary middle class living.

The Camoys family have a grand old name (in the past), but the glory of the battle of Agincourt, where the first Lord Camoys won his title from Richard II, is about all that is left.

Lord Camoys was not very cheerful when asked about the matter. He said: "I have authorized no statement regarding an engagement between myself and Miss Sherman, because no such engagement exists. I have no intention of going to America at present, but I may go later."

Nevertheless, it is known among the intimate friends of Lord Camoys that he has been in correspondence with the young American heiress, and that recent news from Newport indicated that his suit for her hand was progressing most favorably. It was the impression in society here that the nobleman was simply awaiting consent from the father of his choice before taking the first ship for America.

## POSSESSES COIN BEARING PICTURE OF WASHINGTON

Dr. Charles W. Mapes of 1138 Belmont street is the possessor of a rare old coin which he values very highly. It is a silver dollar coined in the year 1795, four years before the death of General Washington. Dr. Mapes said he was offered \$125 for the coin, but refused to part with it. The piece of money is a trifle larger around and a little thinner than the present dollar pieces.

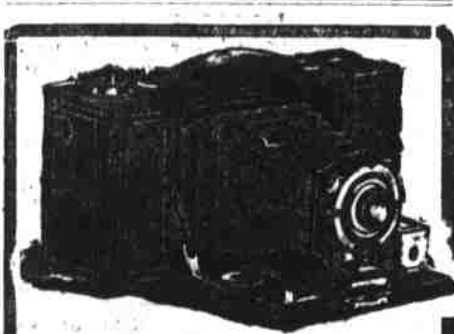
## DISTANT ADDITION BARRED; SUIT IS ON

## EXILED SHAH CAPTURES LARGE PERSIAN CITY
