

LA FOLLETTE RAPS RECIPROCITY PACT

Under Heading "Whose Victory?" Senator Says Bill Is "Private Legislation."

Madison, Wis., July 28.—Under the caption of "Whose Victory?" La Follette's magazine today bitterly denounces reciprocity.

"A piece of private legislation, enacted in supreme obedience to the presidential mandate," is the magazine's characterization of the bill. The magazine asserts that the measure is worse than "the outrages of the Payne-Aldrich law."

The article continues:
"Its passage is a victory for the railroads, which may gain increased traffic as Canadian wheat flows to our mills and agricultural implements, motor cars and other manufactures go from our mills to the farms and homes of Canada. The millers are given free access to the wheat fields of Canada, and are handed a club with which to beat down the prices which the American farmer receives for his grain. It is a victory for the big industrial and transportation interests, Mr. Ultimate Consumer, not a victory for you."

Bound to Have Dirigibles.

Friedrichshafen, July 28.—Despite the disasters which have destroyed five dirigibles, Germany is still to have a fleet of Zeppelin airships according to reports here today. Following the successful flight of the Schwaben I from Friedrichshafen to Luzerne, Switzerland, and return in seven hours, Count Zeppelin will begin immediate construction of another dirigible.

S. P. EMPLOYEES GET \$850,607 IN PENSIONS

Since the inauguration of the pension department of the Southern Pacific company, January 1, 1908, nearly \$1,000,000 has been voluntarily disbursed among the retired employees of that corporation. The precise amount is \$850,607.70.

The total disbursements for the month of June, 1911, were \$14,010.35. This was divided among 420 men and women, retired employees of the Southern Pacific company. The total disbursements for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1911, were \$168,000.23.

Since the organization of the pension department the Southern Pacific company has pensioned 616 of its employees. Of this number 145 were from the operating and train service, 288 from the motive power department, including engineers, 102 from the maintenance of way, 7 from the stores department, 61 from the general offices, 22 from the Atlantic steamship lines and 31 from the ferry and river steamers. Length of service is all that is necessary to secure a pension from the Southern Pacific company. The employees are not required to contribute anything toward the pension fund, all payments being made out of the general funds of the railroad company.

BATHER DROWNS IN WALLOWA LAKE

James Love Takes Cramp and Disappears in Deep Cold Water.

Joseph, Or., July 28.—James Love, 29 years of age, was drowned in Wallowa Lake yesterday afternoon while bathing with a party of friends. They had been in the water for some time when he suddenly took a cramp and disappeared. The lake being very deep and cold at the point where he disappeared his companions did not succeed in getting assistance to him until it was too late. He is survived by a mother and sister living in Joseph.

SUES TO STOP PAYMENT ON INSURANCE POLICY

Charging that a son took advantage of her worn out condition following the death of her husband, Mrs. Alice E. King has started suit against five of her children to recover an insurance policy on the life of James R. King. The suit is also directed against the Ancient Order of United Workmen, and is for \$1700.

The action is in the circuit court. Mrs. King alleges her husband died May 4 and the policy was made out in her name. The next day after the funeral, she alleges, Frank E. King, a son, approached her upon the subject of signing a release to the policy. She refused, but it is asserted in the complaint, that he misrepresented, urged, coerced and used fraudulent means to obtain her signature, whereby she relinquished all claim to the insurance money.

ONE OF HINDU'S VICTIMS DIES FROM HIS WOUNDS

Chicago, July 28.—Archibald Hunt, one of the eight victims of the murderous fire which M. Hussain, an insane Hindu, poured into a crowd on the street here from a 45 calibre rifle, is dead today, as the result of the wounds he received. Following Hunt's death the Hindu was formally charged with murder.

SPAULDING BARN BURNS AT NEWBERG; HORSES OUT

Newburg, Or., July 28.—Fire broke out in the horse barn of the Spaulding Lumber company Wednesday night and the intense heat made it impossible for the fire fighters to save any part of the barn. Six head of horses were in the barn at the time but all were rescued before the fire got under headway. The origin of the fire is not definitely known, but it is thought to have started from new hay that had just been put in. The Newberg volunteer fire department did very efficient work in containing the fire to the barn alone. The loss is estimated at about \$3000.

HILLSBORO GRAND JURY CRITICISES POOR FARM

Hillsboro, Or., July 28.—The July grand jury, which adjourned Monday, found eight true and one not true bills. In its report the jury condemns conditions at the county poor farm and recommends that a different method of caring for the county poor be adopted. The report speaks specifically of medical attendance, which is now supplied under direction of the contractor. The jury believes the county should see that sick paupers have attendance. There are eight inmates of the farm.

Signatures Nearly All Faulty.

Centralia, Wash., July 28.—The petitions for a commission form of government, filed with the city clerk a week ago, have been found faulty by the city attorney. There were 282 signatures, the required number for the calling of an election being 110, but that 110 had to be registered legal voters. Only 96 were registered voters and of that number many had failed to give their age, and a notary's seal was not affixed to the affidavits accompanying the petitions. New petitions are in circulation.

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
