

BIG EAGLE GIVES RANCHER BATTLE

Bird, Wounded, Attacks Man, Tearing Flesh Almost Into Ribbons.

Santa Rosa, Cal., July 31.—Samuel Boyd, a widely known rancher living near Bodega, and a big bald headed eagle fought a sanguinary battle in a secluded spot, adjoining the Boyd ranch, yesterday.

As a result, Boyd's face and hands are so badly torn that physicians fear blood poisoning may result. For a number of years eagles have been allowed to remain unmolested in their aerial way up among the tall trees. Of late kids have been missed from herds of goats in the neighborhood and the eagles have been blamed.

So Boyd made up his mind to teach the birds of prey a lesson. So he took his rifle and went out to battle. A well directed bullet brought down one of the eagles, but unfortunately for Boyd the big bird's wing alone had been broken. The man and bird were in close quarters and Boyd had no time to escape before the eagle flapped his remaining pinion and rushed upon the man. In the desperate fight, which followed, Boyd was scratched and his flesh torn almost into ribbons by the bird's talons. Finally Boyd managed to grasp the eagle around the throat with his hands, throttling it.

residence districts, where they may contaminate the girls working in the factories, the department stores and the offices.

The mayor says he has no evidence of organized graft in the police department, and he declines to say what percentage of the officers are involved in the private parties made to him. Chief Slover likewise knows nothing of the graft cabal within the department, and Mr. Coffey says he is likewise ignorant of any plundering.

Former Chief A. M. Cox says he is certain there is no such thing as organized graft in the department. Occasional "presents" may have been accepted by officers, he says, and there may be instances here and there of unfaithful officers who have collected graft, but he is satisfied that no "system" exists. No complaint was ever made to him concerning Sergeant Cole while he was chief, he stated.

"It is easy to get women of this class to make statements about officers," he said, "if they have some reward or favor held out to return."

From a source close to the police department it is said that information is being given by women on which future investigation will be made and other heads may fall as far as the suspension basket. The women, it is said, have been promised money from prosecution as to their past conduct, the primary purpose of the investigators being to clean up the police department. The problem of the women themselves is being separately considered.

Only a Start.
That the action of the mayor is only a preliminary to a reform movement that will have wide ramifications is the belief of all who have been observing the situation. Filings Made by Stevenson Man on Isolated Falls of Wind River



These falls, rarely seen by white men, are 18 miles northwest of Stevenson. Wind river is said to fall 1000 feet in a mile in this locality.

Stevenson, Wash., July 31.—Eighteen miles northwest of Stevenson, on Wind river, where few white men have ventured, are falls of water sufficient to supply power for a big area of the Pacific northwest. P. Ash and Sam Samson, while prospecting for gold and copper, came across these falls and realized at a glance the great opportunity before them. They returned to Stevenson and made arrangements for filing. They plan to incorporate for \$250,000, holding the greater part of the shares themselves. Mr. Samson is the owner of the Skamania Light & Power company and has a franchise throughout the county, and at present supplies power and light to this city and Carson.

Information as to just how he intends to accomplish his reform objects have proved futile. He is as close mouthed as the time honored monolith of the human head and lion's body. When interviewed this morning the mayor admitted that the entire police department was being submitted to a searching investigation under the direction of Chief Slover, but he would not say that he has gathered any positive evidence of grafting against any besides Sergeant Cole.

He intimated, however, that he has decided in his own mind that many of the common patrolmen, as well as officers of the force, have been carrying on a campaign of petty grafting and that the sweeping changes that have been made in the department of late with reference to transfers of scores of the bluecoats to different beats had been ordered by Chief Slover as a preventive against further grafting.

In connection with the cleaning out of the police department the mayor is considering a plan of attack on the social evil. This is one of the prime items in all police grafting, as it does, such splendid opportunity for the selling of "protection."

May Name "Social" Commission.
Some time ago the mayor announced that he was considering the feasibility of appointing a municipal commission to investigate the social problem. He was asked this morning if he had taken any steps to carry out this plan. "In answer to that question," replied Mr. Rushlight, "I will say that I have had a conference with two ministers and an attorney on the matter. I have been informed that these gentlemen will offer a resolution in the city council for the purpose of giving me the power to appoint a commission of citizens to investigate moral conditions, make findings and submit a report, carrying with it recommendations as to what the commission may deem the best method of handling municipal vice."

"Are you in favor of a restricted district?" the mayor was asked. "I returned an evasive answer, saying he believes the problem is one that deserves careful consideration from every angle, but he said that the state law prohibits a restricted district, and none would be established."

"Would you favor hearing the immoral denizens together, if the state law permitted this?" was the next query made.

"Such a district would be illegal and therefore I will only say that I am opposed to the scattering of vice throughout the city," was the mayor's answer, "and furthermore I will say that women of bad character will not be allowed to frequent lodging houses, hotels or residences where they may come in contact with respectable working girls or other decent women."

Mr. Coffey coincided in the mayor's opinion that undesirable women are scattered all over the city, and was positive in his declaration that this condition must be remedied.

"We will see to it that these women are not allowed to live in the respectable part of the city," he said. "What is the respectable part of the city?"

"Well, where respectable people live," was the somewhat puzzling answer. He would give no further definition.

"What about a restricted district?" "I know nothing of a restricted district," Coffey replied. "The law forbids it."

Chief Slover was even less communicative than his superiors. He said he does not know where the next blow will fall, or what the next move will be. He held a short conference with the mayor and city attorney this morning, and it is thought something more is likely to drop before long.

The chief is known to be dissatisfied with many of his men. Not all of those whom he would like to see removed are suspected of graft, however. He feels that many of the men are incompetent and a way may be found to reach many of them upon charges of minor infractions.

Creates Excitement.

The falls themselves have a 5000 minute foot volume. It is estimated, with over 1000 feet fall in less than a mile. They will generate over 6000 horsepower without a dam, but with a dam the power can be doubled or maybe trebled. The upper rock about 60 feet wide with walls 15 or 20 feet high; in damming at this point water could be backed up the canyon for miles and furnish almost unlimited power.

took office the first of the present month there has been a general feeling of unrest, but Sergeant Cole was one of the last men that would have been named to be stripped of his star. Had the mayor's club fallen on a number of other officials at the station there would have been a general nodding of heads and sub rosa whisperings of "I told you so," but the big stick of the administration fell in an entirely unexpected quarter and as a result the prevailing uneasiness of the past few weeks has increased tenfold. ACCUSED SERGEANT SAYS HE IS INNOCENT; VICTIM OF SOME PLOT

Sergeant Cole when interviewed today said: "There is not a single act that I have ever committed that would be the basis for any accusation against me. I know absolutely of no reason why I should be charged with grafting. I am innocent."

"I am an old man and have followed police business all my life, and I don't intend to give up my position now on any such charges of which I am innocent. Mayor Rushlight has been misinformed, and there is not a thing that I know of that can prompt any such action."

"It appears to me that I have been made a victim of some misunderstanding or some plot and Mayor Rushlight has been duped. I shall demand a hearing before the police board. I have not been accused of any specific act and therefore can make no statement regarding charges said to have been made against me."

TRAIN ORDERS PHONED; TELEGRAPHERS FEEL CUT

Spokane, Wash., July 31.—A conference between the Order of Railway Telegraphers and the officials of the Northern Pacific Railway company is being held in Spokane, a grievance committee having been sent from the Tacoma division as a result of the recent reduction in wages, which came about by the company substituting telephones for the "Morse," and making telephone positions \$10 per month less. It is rumored that in case the local representatives cannot come to an agreement with the officials of the Northern Pacific, the matter will be given to H. B. Perham, president of the Order of Railroad Telegraphers.

FRAGMENTARY REMAINS WORRY NEW YORK POLICE

New York, July 31.—Falling to establish the identity of numerous fragmentary human remains found floating in the harbor during the last week, or even the exact manner in which the bodies were mutilated, the police tonight declared their belief that they were victims of the Communipaw dynamite explosion last February. It was thought the dismembered bodies might reveal several murders, but the authorities were unable to make any progress in their investigation today.

FULTON PARK DEMANDS BETTER WATER SUPPLY

The Fulton Park Improvement club will attend in a body the meeting of the water board at the city hall tomorrow at 2 p. m. They are also urging all property owners in Fulton park, Capitol hill, Carson heights and Portland City homestead to join them.

Residents of that section feel that they have been treated shamefully in the matter of a water supply. Nearly a year ago petitions were circulated and signed by residents of these sections asking for relief. Rights of way for the mains were secured and some pipe was delivered in Portland City homestead, but further than that nothing has been done, they say.

For the past eight years children at the Fulton Park school have had to carry water for drinking and washing purposes or depend on the houses nearby. Up to that time there had been a well, but it was found to be unsanitary and was condemned. The district was one of the first suburbs in the city to be platted.

"We are praying that Mayor Rushlight will be a second Moses and make good the promises of his predecessors for 25 years back," said R. L. Hepburn, secretary of the association.

COPPER COMBINATION CHECKED BY JUDGE

Lansing, Mich., July 31.—Circuit Judge West today temporarily enjoined the formation of the proposed copper combination of Michigan, involving the consolidation of mines worth \$22,000,000. He held that the proposed combination is forbidden by the laws of Michigan. Eleven companies are involved in the supposed deal, including the Calumet and Hecla mines.

FLOUR MILL, DEPOT, STOCKYARDS, CARS, BURNED AT DALLES

was able to save the big brick warehouse of the Wasco Warehouse Milling company, which was directly west of the mill, and also the O. W. R. & N. freight depot.

The property destroyed was the flouring mill and elevators, the Great Southern grain depot and warehouse, 14 freight cars belonging to the Great Southern, the O. W. R. & N. stockyards and buildings connected therewith, and 27 freight cars, most of which were loaded with merchandise. Considerable damage was also done to the track of both railroads but this was repaired so that trains were delayed only a few hours.

The Wasco Warehouse Milling company mill was valued at \$120,000 and with it were consumed 10,000 bushels of wheat. This was well covered by insurance.

The loss to the O. W. R. & N. will aggregate over \$100,000 and the Great Southern was damaged to the extent of fully \$25,000.

The origin of the fire is unknown, as the mill had shut down at 5 o'clock yesterday morning and no one except the watchman had been in the building during the day.

It was probably caused by a defective electrical wire or by spontaneous combustion.

The Wasco Warehouse Milling company is a local corporation, very nearly all the stock of the company being owned by The Dalles residents. The mill was built last year, was operated by electricity and had a daily capacity of 1400 barrels of flour and the customary amount of bi-products. It was one of the leading industries of The Dalles and gave employment to 50 people, all of whom will be thrown out of employment until it can be rebuilt.

The annual meeting of the stockholders of the company is scheduled for tomorrow and at that meeting it will probably be determined to rebuild the property.

THE LION CLOTHIERS

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DECLARE SMELTER IS NEEDED IN PORTLAND

With the development of several new mining districts in the Pacific northwest and from which ore has to be shipped by way of Portland to the smelter at Tacoma, it is bound to follow the establishment of a smelter in this city, it is said. It is pointed out that in addition to being a valuable asset to industrial Portland, it would mean a big saving to shippers of ore.

Practically all of the ore mined in Idaho is shipped to Tacoma, by way of Portland and if this ore could be reduced here it would mean a saving of about \$3 per ton, it is pointed out. The quantity of ore now being shipped is said to be insignificant compared to the movement that will follow the opening up of the central part of Idaho, where Hill and Harriman engineers and surveyors are now busy. Recent advices from Idaho indicate that a number of rich strikes have been made recently and the interest in the mining industry is rapidly being revived there.

A strike on the Moscow, owned by M. E. Moore, resulted in a vein 20 to 30 feet of free milling gold ore. A four stamp mill is taking out \$180 per day. Moore is going to install a 10 stamp and a cyanide plant. Ore runs from \$8 to \$12 per ton.

A strike on the Red Metal, owned by Charles Ellison, shows a vein 4 to 6 feet wide, running from \$200 to \$2000 in gold and silver. He has cut the ore body 45 feet below the surface and has 500 tons on the dump.

The Mascot and Crown King, H. T. Abstein owner, have both made large strikes.

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Shifts also are expected in Brazil, at The Hague, Argentina, Havana and at Bucharest.
