

RAPID GROWTH IS SHOWN BY BANK

Security Savings & Trust Co.
Enters on Its Twenty-Second Year.

The Security Savings & Trust company enters its twenty-second year today with a capital of \$1,000,000, having voted at its annual meeting, July 1, to increase its capital stock from \$500,000 to \$1,000,000, effective August 1. This is the second time this bank has increased its capital stock since its organization 21 years ago. The bank was originally organized with a capital of \$250,000, which was increased five years ago to \$500,000, and now enters the million dollar class.

Officers of the bank today gave as the reason for the increase the fact of Portland's immense growth during the past five years and the consequent demand of its customers for increased accommodations to carry on their enlarged business. The wheat, hop and lumber business of the Pacific northwest is requiring larger sums every year and to meet the requirements of dealers handling these commodities the leading banks of Portland have all been compelled to make large additions to their capital stock.

The Security Savings & Trust company has recently added to its banking quarters a 20 by 100 foot room, in which has been installed the savings department. In taking in additional room the bank's lobby was considerably enlarged and much needed space provided for additional booths for the safety deposit department.

The additional capital stock was practically all subscribed by the stockholders at the time the increase was voted.

Comprising the directorate of the Security Savings & Trust Co. are: J. A. Adams, J. N. Teal, A. L. Mills, L. A. Lewis, Joseph Simon, E. A. Wyld and James F. Felling.

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RANCHER SHOTS HIS WIFE'S TENANT

Henry Bangert's Bullet Hits E. B. Heister Above the Eye, Near Glendale.

(Special to The Journal.) Glendale, Or., Aug. 1.—E. B. Heister, a rancher living near this city, was shot and seriously wounded by Henry Bangert, former owner of the ranch occupied by Heister, early this morning. Bangert was divorced by his wife, who resides in this city, a short time ago, and the property awarded to Mrs. Bangert. Ever since his wife secured the divorce Bangert has threatened and annoyed her. It is claimed. Shortly after the ranch was leased by Mrs. Bangert to Heister, Bangert put a sign on the gate warning Heister to leave inside of three days. Heister paid no attention to the warning, thinking it merely an attempt to frighten him. This morning Bangert took his rifle and went to the Heister place and waited until Heister appeared, and while the latter was lighting his fire Bangert fired three shots through the window, only one of them taking effect.

This shot struck Heister just above the eye, causing an ugly but not fatal wound. Deputy Sheriff Thomas Lawson was notified by telephone and went to the scene of the attempted murder in an automobile, arrested Bangert and brought him to this city.
