

MASTERS OF WATER ENDANGER SALEM

Water Company Also Receives
Severe Rebuke From City
Council.

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.)
Salem, Or., Aug. 1.—Salem now furnishes a conspicuous illustration of the results of a water system without meters. In debating a resolution condemning the Salem Water company for not furnishing the city with an ample supply of pure water, the fact was brought out by councilmen that enough water is now being pumped to supply a city of 50,000 people, but that Salem is nevertheless in danger from fire. A resolution was adopted to give the company a limited time to give the city a better water supply or have its franchise revoked. While the old fight between the municipal and anti-municipal water forces cropped out, it was evident that no ordinary system will supply the city adequately without meters. For half an hour last night 14 councilmen sat in bewilderment when a question involving a veto by the mayor on an ordinance to grant the South Pacific a franchise for a spur track on Trade street came up. Confusion became worse confounded by long speeches and half the councilmen changed their votes. The entire vote was thrown out and taken over again. Finally the veto was sustained and an ordinance will be drafted inserting a common user clause for a spur off a spur where the main spur franchise contains no common user clause. Polk county, Marion county and the city of Salem may join forces with the Salem & Polk City Railway company in constructing a bridge across the Willamette at this place. A committee of the Salem council was appointed last night to confer with the two counties and the railroad company. A bridge similar to the Hawthorne bridge in Portland is contemplated.

EARLY DAY FIREPLACE GIVES UP OLD LETTER

Scio, Or., Aug. 1.—While tearing down an old chimney and fire place in one of the oldest homes in town a few days ago a letter was found which was written almost half a century ago to George M. Stroud of this city by his mother in Cincinnati, Ohio. Mr. Stroud was the first mayor of Scio. He afterwards moved to Portland and was conductor on the first passenger train run over the line between Portland and Albany on the old California & Oregon road. He was also well known in Masonic circles and was grand master and later grand lecturer of the Masonic order.

Much of the letter concerned the Christian welfare of her children. Enclosed is a newspaper clipping containing a poem entitled "Your Mission" which had recently been sung by Wendell Phillips. On the reverse side of this clipping were a few items and of interest to people now from an historical point of view. They were printed March 9, five days after the inauguration of President Grant. Some of the items follow:
"In the house the resignation of Mr. Washburn of Illinois was received."
"A case under the civil rights act came before the court of common pleas in New York today. Harriet Jones, a colored woman, sued Atlantic Navigation company for \$500 damages for refusing to allow her to occupy a first cabin on a steamship."
"John C. Breckinridge, after an exile of eight years, returned to his home in Lexington yesterday. He will immediately resume the practice of law and carefully eschew politics."

Upper Lewis Roads Passable.

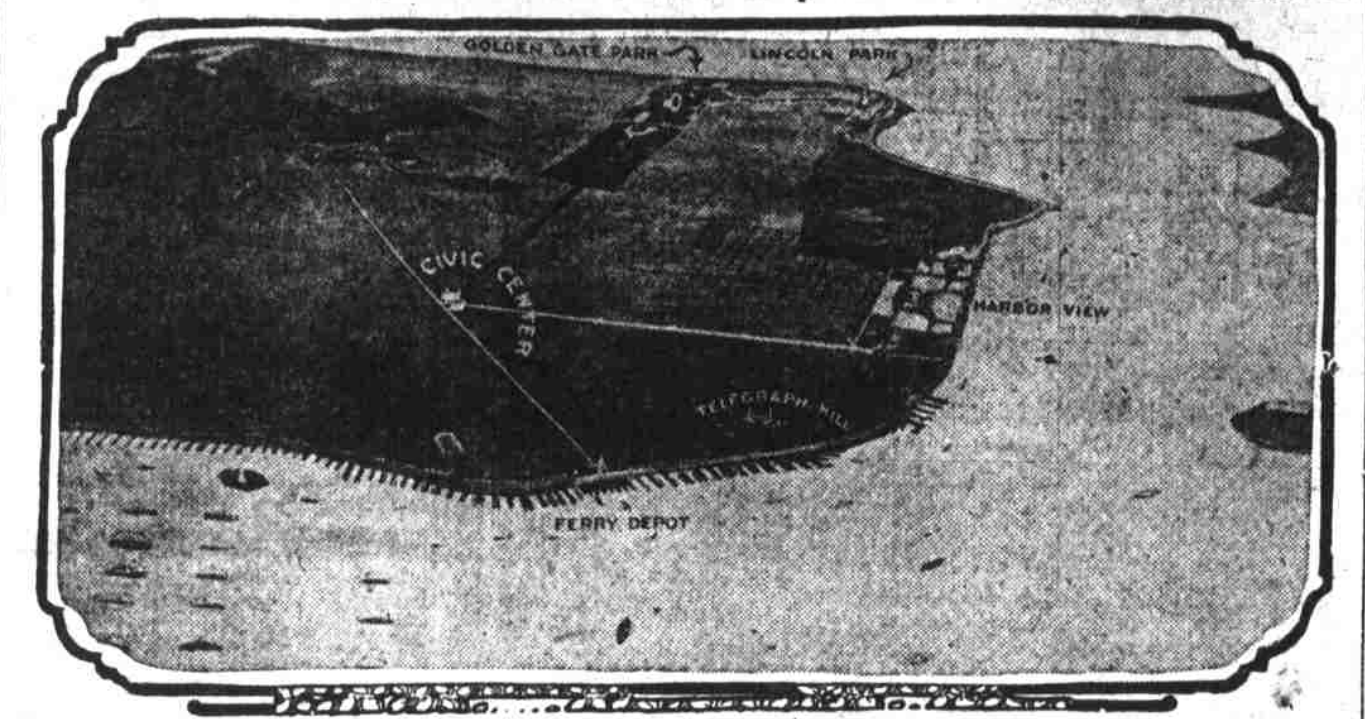

Site Selected for Panama-Pacific Exposition at San Francisco



San Francisco, Aug. 1.—By unanimous vote of the board of directors of the Panama-Pacific Exposition company, at a meeting held Tuesday, July 25, a combination of sites was selected for the World's International exposition to be held in San Francisco in 1915. The site for the grounds is described as follows:
Commencing at Telegraph hill and by means of a boulevard along the bay front connecting, in turn, with the harbor view site, the Presidio, Lincoln park and Golden Gate park. The length of the proposed boulevard is estimated at between eight and nine miles.
These various sections of the site will be connected also by an inter-

mural railroad, which, according to present plans, will run along the south side of Harbor View and the Presidio and then break off, skirting Lincoln park and running through Richmond district to Golden Gate park.
At Harbor View will be located such heavy exhibits as the transportation (locomotive) machinery, and, perhaps, located the museum and art gallery, the Manufacturers' building; also the concessions and other features that will constitute the night life of the exposition.
At the Presidio, it is expected, the United States government will erect its government buildings and exhibits, which, it is suggested, could be after-

ward used for division headquarters. Lincoln Park is to be devoted to scenic features, and for that purpose is to be improved and beautified. A giant commemorative statue at the summit, commanding the entrance to the harbor, is contemplated. Picturesque cafes and gardens are to be located here.
Connecting Lincoln Park with Golden Gate Park it is proposed to utilize some 200 acres of land in the Richmond district. Here will be located the foreign, state and countries' buildings and the horticultural, electrical and other exhibits.
Golden Gate Park is reserved for the construction of only permanent features that are calculated to add to its attractiveness without destroying any of its natural beauty. Here are to be also Japanese and Chinese gardens, fountains and statuary.

LAST YAKIMA SURVIVOR OF UNION GAP IS DEAD

(Special to The Journal.)
North Yakima, Wash., Aug. 1.—George W. Alexander, the widely known oldtimer of Parker, nine miles southeast of this city, died at the home of his daughter and son-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. A. E. Goodwin from dropsy.
Mr. Alexander was the last survivor of Yakima county of the battle of Union Gap in 1854, when the whites were pitted against the Yakima Indians. He joined the fight forces on his 18th birthday and fought under Colonel NeSmith, leader of the Oregon volunteers, organized for the purpose of stamping out the warlike redskins. He also fought with Colonel Cornelius, Major Hallett and Captain Nathan Olney, all of whom have long since passed to their reward.
Among those participating in the Union Gap battle was the dashing and intrepid Phil Sheridan, then with the regular army of the United States and afterwards the famous cavalry general in the Civil war.
Mr. Alexander served for years as government messenger in the early days when there were no railroads or telegraph lines, and when mail had to be taken by stage and on horseback up the coast from San Francisco, over to Wells Wells and Salt Lake City, and to points further up the coast from Olympia.
Mr. Alexander was born in Kentucky in 1836, moved to Missouri in 1842 and crossed the plains to Polk county, Oregon, in 1852 in company with G. J. Buskett, who did so much for the upbuilding of the territory of Oregon. He

was survived by his widow, by an only daughter, Mrs. A. E. Goodwin, and an only grandson, Chester Goodwin.

FASHIONABLE WOMAN DIES MYSTERIOUSLY

St. Louis, Aug. 1.—Fashionably attired and bearing evident marks of refinement, an unidentified woman was found dying in an alley today under an open third window of the Vendome hotel. She died without having uttered a word.
The woman was registered as "wife" by a man who disappeared half an hour before the woman was injured. A rope fire escape was dangling from the window of the room and the theory of the police is that she tried to flee, and fell to her death. The man in the case has not been arrested.
