

BIG POWER PLANT
OPENS NOVEMBER 1P. R., L. & P. Co.'s House at
Mill River to Add 30,000
Horsepower.

November 1 is fixed as the date when the immense power house of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company at River Mill, near Estacada, will be ready for operation, adding 30,000 horsepower to the company's equipment. Indications are that it will be ready perhaps before that day. Splendid progress has been made, the contracting firm, the Puget Sound Bridge & Dredging company, having reached various stages of the work several weeks earlier than estimated.

President B. S. Josselyn, accompanied by a number of other officials of the company, and several press representatives inspected the dam yesterday, and found that the project had suffered very little delay from the recent fire that destroyed part of the working apparatus, and that at the rate progress is now being made the town of River Mill, largely composed of employees of the dam project, will soon pass into history as a lively, bustling construction camp.

Channel Shifted.
To accommodate the builders, the channel of the Clackamas river has been shifted several times during the summer, and yesterday afternoon a crew was busy moving it to the south side, to permit the installation of the final section of the big concrete structure. The channel is shifted by means of a cofferdam that diverts the water in any direction desired. While the final section is being built it will escape through gates in the dam near the south shore. To shift the cofferdam requires considerable work under water, and this was done yesterday by expert swimmers who, experience has demonstrated, accomplish better results than men in diving suits, where the water has not great depth.

The five penstocks have been installed and the power house has been built with the exception of the steel and glass roof and walls. These will be placed in position after the heavy turbines and generators have been installed.

Dam One of Largest.
Most of the machinery, including a monster crane for installation of the heavy material, has arrived on the ground. There will be five power development units, each with capacity for 6000 horsepower.

The dam is one of the largest hollow type ever built. Its length being 675 feet, with a width of 150 feet at the base and 8 feet 6 inches at the apex. The floor space of the power house is 60 by 173 feet. The height of the dam is 80 feet, and above it will be formed a lake having a depth of more than 50 feet in some places.

The party also inspected the line extended to upper Casadero, where it will connect with a wagon road to the big power site at Oak Grove, at the headwaters of the Clackamas, which site was recently purchased from the Southern Pacific company. The railroad from Casadero station to the head of the line, used only for hauling material for the projects to be developed above the old Casadero dam. The foundation for the new Casadero dam is now being laid, and construction of the dam will in all probability be started with vigor immediately upon the completion of the Estacada dam at River Mill.

Engineers in charge of the work are J. L. Fletcher, representing the contracting firm, and F. H. Fisher, representing the Portland Railway, Light & Power company.

ATTEND CONVENTION

Twenty secretaries from the Portland Young Men's Christian Association will attend the Y. M. C. A. employed officers conference to be held at Delano Beach, Wash., next Thursday, Friday and Saturday. General Secretary Stone, who has just returned from the Y. M. C. A. conference at Estes Park, Col., will head the delegation.

Besides the conference proper, two smaller conferences will be held in Tacoma. The first of these is being held today and attended by men engaged in Y. M. C. A. work in the construction camps in the northwest. This is becoming an important feature of association activity in this territory. Among those who will attend from Oregon are the men in charge of the Y. M. C. A. work along the new railroad into central Oregon and at the Celilo canal.

YOUNG WOMAN WINS

Her notable achievement has been made the occasion for rejoicing by women artists who see in it the breaking down of what they call a prejudice against their sex, which so long kept them from participating in the higher honors.

WARNING IS ISSUED
AGAINST COUNTERFEITS

Notice of two new counterfeit bills has been received by United States Secret Service Agent S. A. Connell. One is a \$1 counterfeit silver certificate of the series of 1899, bearing portraits of Lincoln and Grant and is a crudely executed wood cut. It is an easily detected counterfeit.

The other is a \$10 National bank note, made with plain, uncolored photographs on two pieces of paper pasted together over silk threads. The maker of the latter issue was arrested in Henderson, Ky., July 26, and his four plates were taken in the raid. There is no danger that bills of either issue will get into general circulation in Portland.

It is said that counterfeiting by means of wood cuts is practically a "lost art," wood cut engraving being little practiced at the present time, the few who attempt it doing poor work.

CHILD PROBLEMS
FULLY DISCUSSEDMunicipal Phases of Questions
Considered at Rotary Club
Meeting.

"Does Portland keep faith with its men and women of tomorrow," was the general subject of three stirring addresses made before the Rotary club meeting at the Richards yesterday afternoon.

The work and the importance of the juvenile court was discussed by B. Frank Irvine. He startled the Rotarians by declaring that in the recent investigation into sales of cocaine to boys it was shown that the police department pooh-poohed the complaints of parents that their children were being ruined by the drug, that at the time of trial the vendor of the "dope" was defended by policemen, and that the facts of the situation and help for the victims would never have come had it not been that the officers of the juvenile court heard pleadings to which the police department had turned a deaf ear.

"The juvenile court," said Mr. Irvine, "is as much a product of progress as is the automobile or the 'floating skyscraper,' and is more essential to modern society." By a remarkable array of figures and statistics the speaker demonstrated that wards of the juvenile court come from broken homes and divorced parents, and that the court with knowledge of these conditions is playing an important part in helping unfortunate boys and girls into decent and useful manhood and womanhood.

The address of Dr. Calvin S. White, state health officer, on "Give the Youngsters the Chance They Deserve," was remarkable because of its fearless exposure of evil conditions. "The child, in the first place," said Dr. White, "has the right to clean birth, and yet, as a matter of fact, the habits of more than half the parents render a clean birth impossible. The results are darkened lives and deformed bodies. The child, in the second place, has a right to food. Unwise feeding and impure food have cost the lives of multitudes of innocent babies. In Portland until two years ago infant mortality was higher than in Chicago.

"The pure milk crusade has so altered conditions that where more than 50 per cent of milk samples examined in the city laboratory were unfit for food, now less than 2 per cent of the samples are unfit for food. The third thing the child has a right to, is to be clothed correctly.

"This does not mean muffling the chest with flannel and leaving the legs bare for the sake of an insane fashion, but it means the use of common sense in protecting the child against colds, yet not making the same child delicate by over dressing.

"The human side of 'The Play Park Mission,' was told of by A. M. Grilley, director of Portland play parks. Mr. Grilley described the children who go to the playgrounds pale and lifeless, but who come from exercise ruddy and overflowing with life. It is impossible, said Mr. Grilley, to rear children of strong minds who lack healthy bodies, and the play park thus contributes toward present clear-headedness and useful future.

"This survey has been so comprehensive as to demonstrate that child problems are municipal problems, inseparably interwoven with our social, industrial life," said Marshall N. Day, who served as chairman of the day, in summing up the value of the addresses.

There were present at the Rotary meeting yesterday 100 members. Plans for the National Rotary convention to be held in Portland in August were discussed.

PIRATES CAPTURE
RIVER STEAMBOATThat Is They Are Supposed to
Do So; Press Club Excur-
sionists Victims.

"Mouth of the Willamette river, Aug. 2.—Hans Larsen, a deckhand on the steamer Monarch, was picked up on the edge of the river here last night by the crew of the state fish patrol boat. The man was half dead, having been in the water for several hours. According to his tale the Monarch was seized by a villainous looking band of pirates as ever sailed the main in the days of Kidd and Morgan.

"He said the river buccanniers were great mustachios, high boots, cutlasses, and that each carried a bull dog revolver. According to the somewhat wandering story that was finally gathered from the deckhand the pirates boarded the Monarch yesterday morning as the steamer, loaded with Press club excursionists neared the mouth of the river. They suddenly appeared from under a clump of brush on the river's edge and in a large steam launch started into mid stream.

"A tall rakish man who acted as leader of the cutthroats bellowed an order at the Captain of the Monarch to heave to. The order was disregarded and the pirate launch at once came about and disclosed to view a long court come from broken homes and divorced parents, and that the court with knowledge of these conditions is playing an important part in helping unfortunate boys and girls into decent and useful manhood and womanhood.

The pirates clambered aboard and ran up the black flag at the Monarch's peak, compelling the crew and passengers at the points of drawn revolvers to go below decks. The crew of the Monarch was then turned up stream and the pirates proceeded to loot the boat at their leisure. Every man on the boat was searched and stripped of everything of value. The pirates for amusement ordered Larsen to dive into the river.

Foregoing is an account that might be written. Of course it may not be. But if it is left there will be news articles equally as thrilling, for the Monarch will leave Portland next Sunday, and if the program mapped out by Captain Kidd Morrison in the Jinks room of the Press club yesterday is any criterion the excursionists will be treated to the surprise of a life time.

Among these the captains were shifted about to make room for a new one in the person of "Jamsica Rum" Richardson, alias "Chinamen." Jamsica will be captain of the windward scupper. Other officers to be selected by the buccanniers for their preface voyage next Sunday were Pokes! Dave Morrison, the Captain Kidd of the expedition; "Jack Hielgho" Stevenson, king of the sea lawyers; "Waterlogged Pete" Strandberg, king of the vikings; "Bligewater Bill" Soula, chief bos'n; "James Cutenash" Good, bos'n's mate; Scotty Stevens, captain of the lee scupper; "Clew'em up" Simpson, captain of the yard arm; "Jolly Roger" Stymaker, captain of the skull and cross bones; "Fore Jack" McGottigan, chief wielder of the bloody marlin spike; "Wind Jammer" Beals, mate of the sludge watch; James Murphy McCool, high saturnaloon of the dog watch.
