Weather Conditions.

Low pressure obtains generally over the greater portion of the United States, with moderate depressions central over British Columbia, Arizona and Minnesota, respectively. Moderate high pressure areas are over the north Atlantic coast, and Alberta. Unsettled weather conditions have fallen in the northern states from the north Pacific coast to the Great Lakes, and light rains have fallen locally in western Oregon, Washington and British Columbia, eastward to the Red River valley; also in Nebraska, Missouri, Michigan and Ontario, and heavy rains have fallen in Minnesota and Iowa. Thunder storms were reported from Spokane, Sheridan, St. Paul, Des Moines, Green Bay and St. Louis. The weather is cooler in Washington, northeastern Oregon, Nebraska, and southern Louisiana, and it is slightly warmer in western Missouri, Saskatchewan, western Minnesota and along the southern lake region, Pennsylvania and along the Atlantic coast.

The conditions are favorable for showers this afternoon and tonight in Washington, and for tonight in northern Idaho, with generally fair weather throughout the district Tuesday.

CHURCH'S DUTY IS TO MINISTER

Spirituality Comes First in Program of Church, Says Albert Ehrhott.

On the occasion of the first anniversary of the union of the old Second and Central Baptist churches into the present East Side Baptist church, the minister, Albert Ehrhott, Sunday morning defined the practical province of the church in present day life.

Taking as a basis the words of Jesus, "not to be ministered unto but to minister," Mr. Ehrhott said in part: Spirituality comes first in the program of the church; so uniting men with the Christ that God shall be their supreme joy. It is a superior privilege to be instrumental in infusing into others the ruling passion of a pure love, the unselfish direction of the will and the working of the mind in accord with truth. Primarily a church's mission is to secure the right attitude of men toward God. Down through the ages, the burden of the prophets' plea has been to treat God right, give him his first place in love, in will and in reason. A man's destiny is thus determined by himself according to his attitude toward God.

Story of Love.

It is quite clear that this brings with it obligations to our fellow men which are on a footing with our duties to God; indeed our attitude toward our brethren is a convincing index of our real attitude to God. No man can be right with God who is wrong with his neighbor. No church can be serving God which is not ministering to men here and now. How can we love God whom we have not seen and be indifferent to our brothers whom we now see?

The "Gospel," God's story of love for all men spiritually and practically concerns itself with every phase of life here in view of eternity.

Lovers of God and men are coming to see how intimately environment influences character. Scientific investigation has proved that poverty (contrary to the old time view—that misery makes for character), is woefully detrimental to morals. Low wages, high cost of living, unjust distribution of the fruits of labor, land monopoly and competition which is warlike all militate against that Golden Rule of love which Jesus Christ taught and lived.

In her ministerial the church should seek the cause of poverty and should constantly advocate a democracy with true "liberty, equality and fraternity."

The church must take the side of the "common man," as a son of God, as our brother, of incalculable value, with rights that must be insured him to enable him to do his duty. In short the church has social duties, should be a social center and must have the social outreach.

It is not enough that the church say "Come to Jesus"; that is the first essential indeed, but continuously, week in and week out, in a statesmanlike manner, the church must keep in touch with the great movements that determine men's surroundings, their present welfare in view of eternity.

History has proved that it is not

enough to see that a man has "a new heart." It is needful to create an atmosphere in which this new life can thrive. The gospel is indeed all-inclusive in its program, but we have swung the pendulum so far toward heaven that we have neglected life here.

The church in her Christlike ministrations will find it necessary to concern herself with the present economic problem out of which grows untold misery, as evinced in the white slave traffic, the saloon, poverty and a whole brood of other evils. She should sympathetically encourage municipal officers in their efforts to seek the welfare of the people they represent; all movements such as the juvenile court, playgrounds, prison reform, public health should meet with a cordial, intelligent cooperation.

Such a church, of the people for the people, not to be ministered unto but to minister, will be a perpetual power and will glorify God through blessing the people and only in proportion to ministering to the people will she honor God.

Their efforts to gain admission to statehood.

The Arizona constitution is modeled largely after the Oregon constitution, and is admitted to be, by those who have examined it, the most modern of all the present day popular government "experiments." It provides for the initiative, referendum and the recall, which is extended to include the judiciary of the territory. It was this last feature that President Taft opposed, and while he has been committed all along to statehood for the two territories, he insisted he could not and would not approve this extreme constitutional provision, and it is to be out out to secure presidential sanction.

Very Unlike Arizona.

New Mexico goes almost as far to the other extreme in her constitution. It is a solid, practically, unnamable, fundamental law, containing a variety of the best features from the constitutions of other states, with the exception of the method of dealing with corporations, in which it stands alone among the states. The New Mexico constitution provides for a corporation commission of the state, elected by the people and having direct supervision over all corporations doing business in the new state.

The peculiar feature consists in an automatic transfer of matters before the commission to the supreme court of the territory in cases where a corporation fails to carry out the instructions of the commission within a time specified. This, it is claimed by the drafters of the constitution, will do away with the interminable delay which can be brought about in other states by injunctions sued out by corporations.

New Mexico Is Republican.

Nominally New Mexico is Republican by about 5000 majority, while Arizona is about equally divided between the two parties, with the Democrats having a slight advantage. Arizona, however, has a large number of progressives in both parties, and contains greater proportion of American born citizens than does New Mexico where probably 50 per cent of the people are of Spanish descent, although natives of the territory, descendants of the early Spanish settlers.

FIGMAN'S COMEDY SCORES SUCCESS

As Coachman, Jokester, Suit-or, Gentleman, Actor Gets Great Welcome.

Playing the leading role in "The Man on the Box," Max Fligman, at the Heilig last night was welcomed in a manner that augurs mighty well for his success during his month's engagement here.

So well pleased was the audience with his comedy and that of Miss Lolita Robertson, as Lieutenant Worburton and Betty Annesley, respectively, that they were compelled to respond to several encores, and Fligman was called upon for a speech. Miss Robertson, by the way, is Mrs. Fligman in real life.

Though "The Man on the Box" has been on the boards for a number of seasons, it seems new with Fligman transmuting his inimitable eccentric humor into the lines. The plot hinges on a practical joke conceived by the Lieutenant, but which miscarried.

As coachman, jokester, actor and gentleman, he was splendid, and he allowed no chance to pass to extract the last drop of funniness from the excellent little comedy.

But Fligman is not the whole show by any means. Miss Robertson, Denton Vane as Charles Henderson, a newspaperman who earns his living by "flea" Louis Morrison as the choleric "Magistrate Vane," J. Frank Burke, as "Colonel Raleigh" and Paul Hurst as "Officer O'Brien" likewise follow the example of their chief, and the result is an exhilarating brew of laugh-producing, clean comedy.

The only serious characters of the play were handled nicely by Charles Yule as Colonel Annesley, and Harold Holand, as Count Karloff, a Russian diplomat.

The plot is based on a practical joke that miscarried. Worburton, lately resigned from the army, had intended to play a joke on his sister by taking the place of his coachman and driving his sister home and then kissing her when he assisted her from the vehicle. By accident he got on the wrong coach, and as a result the joke is played on Miss Annesley, a girl whom he had seen and whom he had vowed to marry. After a police court trial Worburton is employed by her as a coachman. She suspects his identity and it is a battle of wits between two lovers until the deus ex machina, which of course ends as it should—in an engagement.

The comedy will run the remainder of the week.

HAYTIAN REBELS ATTACK GAY PARTY

Daughter of Luke Wright Is Among Those Fired Upon by Revolutionists.

(United Press Leased Wire.)

New York, Aug. 7.—With a tale of how they narrowly escaped death at the hands of Haytian revolutionists, Mrs. Charles Palmer, daughter of Luke Wright of Tennessee, her husband and Evan Dick, a Wall street man, returned here today on board the Atlas liner Allemanian from Port au Prince. Deputy Paul of Hayti and a young son of the deposed president, Simon, were also passengers. They had with them \$120,000 in gold belonging to the fleeing ruler.

Mrs. Palmer's escape came off the Haytian coast. Dick, whose guests they were, was taking the yacht America to Port au Prince, where it had been sold to the Haytian government. They knew

nothing of any revolution and all were on deck when a party ashore began shooting and the bullets pattered all around. Palmer forced his wife behind a small boat. No one was hurt.

Dick said today that the situation in Hayti was grave. He declares no stable government is possible there, and predicts the most serious future troubles.
