

LIST OF STARVED PATIENTS IS LONG

Vice Consul Agassiz Says He Will Sue Dr. Hazzard for Mutilation of Body.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Tacoma, Wash., Aug. 4.—British Vice-Consul C. E. Lucian Agassiz went to Seattle today to confer with Attorney Frank H. Kelley and Prosecutor Stevenson relative to the prosecution of "Dr." Linda Burfield Hazzard, fast cure practitioner. Mrs. Hazzard is under arrest at Fort Orchard charged with murder in connection with the death of Claire Williamson, an English woman, while under treatment at the woman physician's sanitarium at Olalla last spring.

Before leaving the city Vice-consul Agassiz said he had received offers of assistance in the investigation of the case from persons in Tacoma, who assert they are victims of Dr. Hazzard's alleged "starvation" methods.

Civil actions in addition to the criminal proceedings will be started, according to Agassiz, who stated today that he would file suit for \$25,000 damages against Dr. Hazzard and a Seattle firm of undertakers as co-defendants, for alleged mutilation of the dead body of Claire Williamson. Attorneys representing Mrs. Hazzard have notified Prosecutors Stevenson and Kelley that they would file a bond this afternoon for the release of Mrs. Hazzard.

The following are among those who have died since April, 1909, after undergoing starvation treatment:

Mrs. Viola F. Heaton, died May 10, 1909. Death certificate gives cause as "starvation."

Mrs. Blanche B. Tindall, died June 18, 1909. Death certificate states cause as "starvation."

Earl E. Erdman, died March 28, 1910. Death certificate gives "starvation."

L. E. Rader, died May 11, 1910, after medical inspection had made vain efforts to get him out of Mrs. Hazzard's hands. Mrs. Hazzard signed death certificate giving "prolonged stomach" as cause with details of medical terms of contributory causes.

Mrs. Maude L. Whitney, died July 20, 1910. Death certificate also signed by Mrs. Hazzard herself, giving as cause "chronic pancreatitis" and a number of contributory afflictions.

Frank S. Southard, died May 30, 1911. Death certificate signed by Dr. George M. Horton, of Cobb building, gives "nephritis" as direct cause, but "patient under my care only two days."

These patients are ones whom it has been shown conclusively had declined greatly in weight under Mrs. Hazzard's treatment and in the case of several, it was charged that their deaths were due directly to starvation. Others who died while taking treatment from the woman included C. A. Harrison, publisher of the Alaska-Yukon magazine; J. H. Flux, of Gloucester, England, and E. I. Wakein, of Wellington, New Zealand, the latter having committed suicide on November 7, 1909, while undergoing the treatment.

PEOPLE LEAVE BEND TO DIG FOR GOLD

Location of Claims on Tumalo Creek Causes Rush to New Ore Fields.

(Special to The Journal.) Bend, Or., Aug. 8.—A gold strike that apparently is considerable promise has "started things" with a vengeance in interior Oregon. As the result of the discovery of gold bearing quartz, which became known last week, a rush has occurred from Bend that has all but depopulated the town.

Every one who could get means of transportation and spare the time has gone to the gold territory, 12 miles west of this place, near the headwaters of Tumalo creek. Assays from the original claims, while made entirely from the surface rock, are reported as showing more than \$10 to the ton. Those working the shafts that are being put down on several claims state that the rock looks more and more rich as they progress.

About 50 claims have been staked within the last few days, while the mountains in the vicinity are being swarmed over by thousands.

Last summer "float" rock found near the location of the present discovery assayed very high. Several nuggets were discovered which were found to be worth \$20, while the panning of placer prospects developed some very promising results.

While the initial assays do not disclose any very high grade rock, those familiar with the situation declare that there appears to be an enormous amount of gold bearing quartz of low value. A fact of importance is the accessibility of the country, and the immediate presence of wood, water and a great amount of water power.

Carl Ladewig was the original discoverer of the quartz, assays of which have given rise to the present rush. Together with John Steidl, a local man of considerable means, he has prospected over the territory where the discovery finally was made. Several weeks ago, it is understood, these men and others filed upon a group of claims and commenced preliminary work, whose subsequent discovery precipitated the excitement.

TWIN CITIES FACE UTILITY PROBLEM

Marshfield and North Bend, Or., Have Water and Railway Franchises Up.

Marshfield, Or., Aug. 8.—Municipal ownership of water plants and street railways for granting franchises to companies for those utilities is an alternative being considered by the members of the city councils of both North Bend and Marshfield and which will be decided at a meeting in a few days. A vote of the people may be called.

The water supply for both cities has been furnished for years past by the Coos Bay Water company and now a proposition is made to buy the plant provided Marshfield will grant the franchise. For the past four years there have been various applications for electric railways without result and now a company of local men has asked for a franchise. At the same time the proposition of the two cities owning the railway on the waterfront has been brought up, so the city councils of both cities are called upon to decide whether they will accept the offered capital for improvement or attempt municipal ownership of these two utilities.

Local Men the Promoters.

The applicants for the franchise to build an electric and steam terminal railway connecting and extending through the two cities is made by the C. A. Smith Lumber & Manufacturing company, the Simpson Lumber company, W. S. Chandler, president of the First National bank of Marshfield, and Flanagan and Bennett, bankers of Marshfield. They promise immediate construction work if the franchise is granted.

Who the Water People Are.

The financial interests behind the applicants for the water system franchise have been made known. They were first represented by T. J. Nowlin, an attorney of Omaha, Neb. The others connected with the company are William A. Jackson, an attorney of Milwaukee, who is associated with Ray Ney. The latter is president of the New-Snyder-Powder Grain company of Fremont, Neb., and is also president of the Eastern Oregon Light & Power company, which supplies Baker City, La Grande, North Powder and other points. The applicants state that they have closed the deal for the purchase of the local plant provided that the franchise is granted and that if the purchase is made they will build a new reservoir and extend the mains and fire protection and make a modern water system.

Stage Road Betterment Fund.

Marshfield, Or., Aug. 8.—While a committee of the Marshfield chamber of commerce is soliciting funds to make an improvement on the stage road to Roseburg, over which the mail is carried. The county will pay for half of the work and the rest is to be raised by the citizens. The mail contractor will also pay a part of the expense. From the start of the stage road at Sumner to the top of a mountain the road is in bad shape in winter time and the plan is to think it so thick in the transportation will be quicker during the winter months. The improvement will remove at least one of the difficulties which cause delayed winter mails.

Mill Burns at Sale Hour.

(Special to The Journal.) Marshfield, Or., Aug. 8.—While a purchaser was waiting in Bandon for L. J. Radley to close a deal for the sale of the latter's sawmill, located about three miles from Bandon, Mr. Radley was busy fighting a fire which entirely destroyed the plant. The loss was about \$4000. The mill burned at the hour the final papers for the sale of the mill were to have been signed. Mr. Radley will rebuild the plant and has ordered machinery, which will be installed as soon as it arrives.

HOOD RIVER OUSTS RIVAL REALTY MAN

Latter Attempts to Exploit Medford Dirt on Sidewalk of Other Fellow.

(Special to The Journal.) Hood River, Or., Aug. 8.—A large picture of Medford orchard lands featured in gaudy colors was displayed by a southern Oregon booster yesterday in front of the Oregon hotel on the sidewalk, and strenuous efforts were being

made by the representative of the orchard tracts to interest buyers in the southern Oregon lands. The efforts to canvass prospective buyers now at Hood River caused the local real estate men to have the Medford rival removed from the sidewalk with his picture and advertising matter. The chief of police took part in enforcing the city ordinance providing that no advertising matter shall be placed on the public walks.

Hot Tennessean Fined \$50.

BANNER HITS BACK AT MR. ROWLAND

Family Not Permitted Undisturbed Possession of \$10,000 Damage Award.

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.) Salem, Or., Aug. 8.—Immediately following the United States National bank's settlement of the \$100,000 damage suit brought against the bank by Mrs. Clara H. Rowland by payment to her of \$10,000, G. W. Eyre, a heavy stockholder in the bank, filed suit for

\$8000 against Mrs. Rowland's husband. The complaint alleges that Rowland, relying upon his standing as a presiding elder of the Methodist church and upon fraternal affiliations, fraudulently misrepresented to Eyre the value of Orville mining stock and inveigled him into buying. Eyre is now suing to recover the value of the stock.

Eugene Priests Transferred.

(Special to The Journal.) Eugene, Or., Aug. 8.—It has been announced here that Rev. Father J. M. O'Farrell, rector of St. Mary's Catholic church, of this city, and his assistant, Rev. Father B. T. Curley, have been transferred to the Medford parish by

Archbishop Christie. Their successors here have not yet been named. Rev. Father O'Farrell has been here for five or six years and has built up his congregation wonderfully in that time. He was instrumental in the erection of a handsome house of worship three years ago and a year later an academy building costing \$10,000. He is very popular with all classes of Eugene people. Rev. Father Curley has been here for only a year or so and is also well liked.
