

GLASS PLANT MAY BE BUILT HERE

Material to Be Shipped From Eastern Washington— Looking for Site.

(The Manufacture of Glass in Portland) was the subject of an interesting and instructive talk by George H. Savage of the Washington Glass company of Spokane, at the weekly luncheon yesterday of the Portland Realty board. Mr. Savage is an experienced glass manufacturer formerly from Pittsburgh, who has uncovered a vast deposit of glass making silica near Spokane but has found it impossible to establish a glass factory in Spokane because of the excessive cost of fuel in that city together with the freight to the coast on the finished product.

"Plate and window glass can be manufactured in Portland from silica shipped from Spokane and sold cheaper on the Pacific coast than the eastern manufacturer can possibly lay it down here," declared Mr. Savage. "Not only that, but the cost of shipping silica from Spokane to the coast is less than the cost of shipping glass from the east to the coast."

Following Mr. Savage's address, President Chapin of the Realty Board appointed a committee to cooperate with Mr. Savage in securing a site for a glass factory. It was voted to invite ex-United States Senator Fred W. Mulkey to address the board at next Monday's meeting on the public dock question, particularly with reference to his recent visit to the eastern seaports and what may be expected to come from his trip by way of expediting the solution of the local public dock question.

The complaint and arbitration committee of the board was instructed to inquire into and report on the controversy between Governor West and a certain eastern Oregon irrigation company.

The board voted that as many of its members as possible should visit the Centennial celebration at Astoria Saturday, August 19.

COMMISSION-SUSPENDS FREIGHT RATE ADVANCE

(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, Aug. 8.—The interstate commerce commission has suspended the proposed advance in freight rates on the western trunk line until December 30.

Four lumber companies of Portland, Oregon have filed complaints with the interstate commerce commission, charging that the Southern Pacific and other railroads operating between points in Oregon and California demanded more money for the transportation of box lumber than for undressed material. A reduction of rates is asked.

The suspension of the proposed advance on the western trunk line is important chiefly to eastern cities and does not materially effect transcontinental lines operating out of Portland. The complaints filed by the Portland and Astoria mills were prepared by Attorney J. N. Teal and allege discrimination against the Columbia river mills on rates on box shooks to San Francisco. From the Columbia river box shooks take a higher rate than ordinary lumber while from southern Oregon and northern California points they take a lower rate than ordinary lumber. The Columbia river mills want an adjustment of this alleged discrimination.

COURT COMMISSION BEGINS HARD TASK

Revision Body Named by Last Legislature Plans to Re-make Court Practice.

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.) Salem, Or., Aug. 8.—After meeting in the hall of representatives at the state house yesterday afternoon and discussing the best methods of doing the work assigned to them, members of the judiciary revision commission voted to adjourn to meet in Portland the last Saturday in August. The different phases of the report the commission is to make to the next legislature were assigned to the various members of the commission. Each will report on his division of the work at the next meeting.

Pleading and practice of the courts was referred to A. E. Reames and A. E. Clark; structure of the courts to R. R. Butler and Thomas O'Day; probate practice to Will M. Peterson and S. M. Garland, and the work of the district attorney to S. T. Richardson, chairman of the commission, for a preliminary report after which the question will be threshed out by the commission as a whole. Chairman Richardson is a member ex-officio of each sub-committee.

The law passed by the last legislature is sweeping and gives the legislature power to entirely reconstruct the present system of courts and officers of the courts. It was intimated by the commissioners in the brief session held yesterday that the question of the structure of the courts would be the big problem. The supreme court is now the only constitutionally constituted court.

Passing on Insurance Policies.

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.) Salem, Or., Aug. 8.—The law requiring the submission of all new forms of accident and health insurance policies goes into effect September 1 and is causing a rush of business in the office of Insurance Commissioner Hester. In harmony with the effort being made to get uniform laws on these subjects all over the country, policies of such companies as are now operating and licensed in states where these laws have been passed are accepted and approved by the insurance department of Oregon. New York and Massachusetts have these statutes. Rules adopted by the insurance departments of these states, therefore, respecting the forms of policies for accident and health insurance are promulgated as the rules of the insurance department of this state. One of the important provisions of the new law is that provisions, frequently printed in very fine type so as to be frequently overlooked and yet invalidating, are no longer permitted. All printing on the policies must be not finer than ten point type.

Would Have the Oregon Lead.

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.) Salem, Or., Aug. 8.—Secretary West sent a request to the secretary of the navy yesterday to have the battleship Oregon lead the way for the American naval vessels on their official trip through the Panama canal. "The magnificent record of the Oregon makes the distinction fitting," says the governor, "and the people of the state of Oregon would deeply appreciate such a consideration if it can be shown by your department."

Fishermen Fight Sand Concern.

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.) Salem, Or., Aug. 8.—The question of the alleged encroachments on the rights of fishermen by the Columbia Digger company and other sand companies on the Columbia, which was referred to the state land board by Master Fish Warden Clanton was referred back to him for adjustment yesterday afternoon. Representatives of the companies were present and declared there must have been some misunderstanding as they were sure adjustment of the difficulties could be made.

New Detention Hospital.

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.) Salem, Or., Aug. 8.—Salem and Marion counties are to have a fine modern hospital for the care of patients suffering from contagious and infectious diseases. Both the city and county set aside \$1500 for this purpose. Bids received today by the board are in excess of \$2000 but the additional sum will be made up. A public board of nine manages the hospital. This hospital has been in operation 15 years and during that time has treated 4400 patients. This good record figured in gaining for the new building from city and county.

NIGHT WITH POETS PANTAGES FEATURE

"A Night With the Poets," topped at Pantages this week, is one of the most artistic vaudeville productions seen here recently. Combining melody, mirth, pathos, beauty and mechanical effects, the act is a distinct novelty and the splendid recitations by Clinton E. Lloyd of several classics add much to the production. While Lloyd is giving these classics, illustrations of his subjects are given by living statues, a triumph of stage mechanism. The quintet which aids Lloyd to prolong the act is most welcome and furnishes incidental music.

Amusing is the sketch entitled "The Strike," in which Alf P. James and a clever company appear. HAROLD BUTLER, AGE 20 AND ILL, A VALE SUICIDE

His body was discovered at the office yesterday morning by other employees. He came to Vale from Boise, where his mother and sister now reside. They came from Boise last evening to take charge of the body, which will be taken to Boise for burial. Corporal R. O. Payne was summoned to Vale and held an inquest. The jury returned a verdict that Butler took his own life and that the cause was despondency and ill health.

Cry of "Scab" Leads to Killing.
