

## LIQUOR QUESTION WORRIES PAROCH STATE OF MAINE

"Dry" for 65 Years, Northern Community in Throes of Fight Between Prohibitionists and Opponents.

Astoria, Maine, Aug. 8.—Sixty-five years ago the Democratic legislature of the state of Maine enacted the first prohibition law against the liquor traffic, thus setting an example of state-wide prohibition, which was not imitated by other commonwealths until many years later. In another month, on September 11 of this year at a general election, the voters of Maine will be called upon to decide whether state-wide prohibition, which has been statutory from 1844 to 1884, and constitutional ever since, shall remain part of the state's constitution or not.

Since the state of Maine enacted the first prohibition law, prohibition has made tremendous strides. The movement is no longer a state or even a national movement, but has assumed an international character. In many countries throughout the world the war against the liquor traffic has been taken up and the prohibition movement has met with varying degrees of success. For this reason the battle which is now being fought in this state is attracting world-wide attention. Maine was the pioneer of the prohibition movement, and maintained state-wide prohibition continuously longer than any other commonwealth in the world. It is quite natural, therefore, that the coming election is awaited with the most intense interest throughout the world.

**Outcome Important.**  
It is generally admitted by friends of prohibition in and outside the state, that a great deal depends upon the outcome of the coming election. In fact, it is believed that the result of the vote will be of the most vital influence upon the future of the prohibition movement. If the majority of the voters in Maine should decide by their vote that constitutional prohibition is to remain, it is believed that the prohibition movement will be a severe blow to the hopes of the friends of prohibition who, for years, have been working, inspired by the thought that some day all nations would combine in suppressing the liquor traffic.

The campaign now in progress in this state and which will continue for another month, until the last vote shall have been cast at the coming election, began practically immediately after the election in September of last year when it became certain that a Democratic legislature had been elected, believed to be pledged to vote for a re-submission of the prohibition clause of the constitution. The friends of prohibition cannot imagine how bitter and desperate is the fight between the prohibition and the anti-prohibition factions in this state. The campaign was begun by the prohibitionists with a rush and steadily increased in vigor and bitterness and there is every reason to believe that the remaining month will witness a campaign in this state, unparalleled in fierceness in the history of political fights.

**"Dry" Are Aggressors.**  
So far the prohibitionists have been the aggressors. As early as October 15 of last year the Maine Sunday School association adopted by unanimous vote a resolution declaring, "that any person who votes or in any way influences voters to vote directly or indirectly, so amend our constitution as to admit of a license of the liquor traffic, is equally guilty of giving his neighbor drink and putting the bottle to him as the rum seller and the woe of the prophet of God is upon him." That is rather strong language, but it is a fair sample of the language used by the prohibitionists in the present campaign. Everywhere their cry is "Rum Against Righteousness."

Even the opponents of prohibition are forced to admit that the prohibitionists are remarkably well organized and are putting up a great fight. The leader of the prohibition campaign is a state man, Mrs. L. M. Stevens, national president of the W. C. T. U. She is a Maine woman and a resident of Portland. She has fought for prohibition many years, but she regards the present contest as the greatest battle of her life.

**Literature Floods State.**  
Under her direction the whole state was flooded with campaign literature of the most vigorous nature. She enlisted the churches, the Sunday schools, the children and women to fight for prohibition and brought speakers from all parts of the United States and even from Europe, where prohibition has many staunch supporters.

The anti-prohibition campaign is conducted by the Maine Non-Partisan Local Self Government league, which is composed of men of high standing and has enlisted the support of four leading newspapers in the state. The work of the league is carried on systematically and thoroughly, but with little noise.

## COUNCIL DISCLAIMS 58 ARRESTS OF WOMEN

Astoria, Or., Aug. 8.—The council last night by vote denied all responsibility for arrests made by Chief Linville in the red light district. Up to date 58 women have been arrested and have forfeited \$50 cash bail each. The chief says he will continue to make arrests as provided by the ordinance on vagrancy charges. No action on systematically the responsibility was taken by the council.

## CONFEDERATE GENERAL BELIEVED NEAR DEATH

## STEPHEN B. THAW IN OREGON PRISON

Dr. Harry T. Kirkland, Heir to Millions, Discovered in Salem Penitentiary.

Salem, Or., Aug. 8.—Masquerading under the name of Curry Kirkland, Dr. Harry Thaw Kirkland, nephew of Harry Kendall Thaw who killed Stanford White in Madison Square Roof Garden, New York, and heir to the Thaw millions, under the laws of Scotland, has succeeded for a year and a half in hiding his true identity from the authorities of the state penitentiary. Kirkland is serving a two years' sentence for appropriating and pawned his sweetheart's watch for money with which to quench his thirst for drink—a thirst which, despite his social standing, education and wealth, has made him considerable trouble. Kirkland has admitted his identity. A letter sent to a local newspaper here was the means by which his identity was discovered.

## WELLS FARGO CO. OUSTS SHELBY

Former Portland Official, 31 Years in Service Here, Is Dropped in Shakeup.

Word has been received here from San Francisco of a general shakeup that has occurred in the Wells-Fargo Express company, in which Eugene Shelby, who was with the company 31 years in Portland and five years at San Francisco, was dropped from the company's service there.

It is understood that a general re-districting of the company's territory in the United States has taken place and several oldtimers with the company have been let out. John Mills, superintendent of the Los Angeles offices, was one of them. He was asked to go to a new district and declined. This rearrangement of the districts followed the election of a new president of the company. Several new districts have been created and new superintendents appointed.

Mr. Shelby, who fell under the company's ax at San Francisco, was born and raised in Portland and as he served the company here 31 years he has a host of friends in the city.

## POULTRYMEN PLAN TO STOP ROOST ROBBERIES

Oregon City, Aug. 8.—Officer Greene yesterday found a gunny sack with 20 fine chickens in it, on the Sound End road. The poultry had been lying there for several days. These were part of the chickens stolen at the last raid made upon the poultry yards on the outskirts of this city.

These robberies have awakened the poultrymen to action and a meeting will be held Wednesday night in the Mt. Pleasant schoolhouse for the purpose of organizing the Clackamas County Poultry Protective association. The association will employ a detective to run down the thief who has been making such "killings" during the year.

For a year, poultry raisers in the May-bush, Pleasant and other outlying districts have been losing valuable chickens. In November hundreds of dollars' worth of well bred hens and roosters were taken and through it all no one has been detected. The thief is an expert poultryman, as in many cases the best stock has been taken. The last raid capped the climax and the growers say they will stand it no longer.

Although the proposed organization will be brought together for the immediate purpose of stopping the robberies of roosts the outcome of it will be a poultrymen's organization for this county. Owing to the closeness to the Portland market, the growers of this county are well adapted to raising chickens and an organization of the sort proposed will greatly better conditions, both as to the method of raising and marketing of stock and eggs.

## FEAR OF RAILROAD STRIKE CAUSES LULL IN BUSINESS

Chicago, Aug. 8.—That a tense situation exists between western railroads and thousands of their employees as the result of the railroads' refusal to grant a new wage and time scale to shop workmen and helpers is freely admitted here today. That the negotiations, which involve an estimated yearly outlay of \$50,000,000, may be terminated by a general strike is also deemed possible. New York and Chicago financiers are watching affairs with the keenest interest and many feel that the present stagnation in business circles in both cities is caused, at least in part, by fear of a railroad war.

## GATES' STRENGTH EBBING; HEART ACTION WEAKENS

Paris, Aug. 8.—John W. Gates had a bad turn this morning but rallied within an hour under a drastic administration of cardiac stimulants. The American millionaire's heart is very weak and responds less promptly to stimulation after each attack. His strength is ebbing slowly and the probability of a fatal termination of his illness is now admitted by his physicians.

Early this afternoon Gates was reported to be in the greatest distress. Congestion of his kidneys had recurred and his heart action was very weak.

## NAVY DEPARTMENT PLANS BIG DRYDOCK AT BAY CITY

San Francisco, Aug. 8.—In accordance with plans to make San Francisco a great United States naval base for the Pacific ocean fleet, the navy department is planning to install a great drydock, capable of berthing the largest vessels afloat, in San Francisco bay, according to advices received here today from Washington. The proposed drydock, which is to be in operation by 1915, will be 1000 feet in length and 116 in breadth. An enlargement of the Mare Island navy yard is also said to be planned.

## LIGHTHOUSE MAN KILLED BY DERRICK

Rotten Beam Breaks While Heather Is Unloading at Destruction Island.

Astoria, Or., Aug. 8.—John Enquest, keeper of the Destruction Island lighthouse, was killed yesterday at 2:20 p. m. by the breaking of a derrick while unloading coal from the lighthouse tender Heather at the island. The end of the derrick beam broke clear off, striking Enquest on the head, crushing it in a frightful manner. Death was instantaneous. Near him at the time was Charles Moberg, second officer of the Heather, and six hands on a deck hand was escaped unhurt. The broken timber was found to be rotten clear through.

The body was brought here on the Heather this morning and was taken charge of by Coroner Clough. He was 55 years of age and well known in this city, and leaves a brother, Fred Enquest, who is a fisherman on the river.

## IS MIKE MORGAN SLAYER OF BAKER?

Admits to Journal Correspondent He Was Near Willows at the Time.

Grants Pass, Or., Aug. 8.—Claud F. Purkett, district attorney at Willows, Glenn county, California, has written here inquiring in regard to Mike Morgan, who is in jail here as the confessed murderer of John York, whose body he weighted with logging chains and threw into Rogue river. George W. Baker was murdered near Willows April 19 last, and the murderer escaped with the murdered man's horses. The Journal correspondent called on Morgan in the county jail this afternoon and interrogated him in regard to his former movements. He studied some time before answering. He admitted he had been near Willows, Cal., last spring—"about 25 miles from Willows," he said. He was at Sacramento, also. He said he went by train from Willows to Klamath Falls but could not remember when he crossed or any names of towns.

Morgan is about 29 or 30 years old, of light complexion, quite florid, has medium to light hair and is about five feet ten inches tall.

## NORTH BANK ASKS \$5175 DAMAGES

Olympia, Wash., Aug. 8.—With State Auditor C. W. Claussen has been filed a claim of the North Bank railroad by J. Russell, general superintendent, in which he sets forth that the Spokane, Portland & Seattle Railway company wants \$5,175 for damages sustained by the company by reason of the building of the state road near Lytle, along the Columbia river. This is the road known as the Sam Hill road, which was the subject of much discussion during the last session of the legislature. H. L. Rowley, deputy highway commissioner, had charge of the work and he pointed to it with much pride, and of late it has attained prominence by reason of being singled out as the class of highway that can be built under efficient management, according to statements made by Sam Hill, who is attacking the administration.

The claim is for various amounts spent for labor and material in removing rock from the track and the employment of watchmen to protect trains and the roadbed, and extends from March, 1910, to May, 1911. There are 14 separate claims and Attorneys Miller, Cruss & Wilkinson of Portland, who filed it, want to know in their letter about how soon the state will act upon the claim.

The majority of the claims are for removing rocks which fell on the track and for services of the watchmen who patrolled the right of way, but there is also one for material in building a dam, which was needed to clean the track of debris.

## HARMON'S FRANCHISE SHROUDED IN MYSTERY

Vancouver, Wash., Aug. 8.—Though not present at the meeting and no definite information being obtainable as to who he represents, Lawrence Harmon's ordinance asking for a franchise to ship electric cars within the corporate limits of Vancouver was read for the first and second times before the city council. Harmon is from Chicago and applies for a franchise to run 10 years and to cover the principal streets of the city. He also asks the right to use certain of the Vancouver Traction company's tracks at a reasonable rental.

The ordinance states that the purpose is to build and operate electric railroads, telegraph and telephone lines within the city.

The streets upon which a franchise is asked include Washington from the ferry to Third street, east of Thirteenth to the barracks, west on Thirteenth to Esther avenue, from Fifth and Washington through the barracks to the city limits, north on Esther to Twenty-eighth, east on Twenty-eighth to New York and south on Twenty-ninth, and north to St. Johns road.

It is understood that Harmon represents eastern capitalists, but who is not known. The ordinance was read and laid over without comment. It is also understood that power will be brought from Portland under the Columbia river and that electric lines will follow the river to Camas and Washougal.

## DR. LINDA HAZZARD RAISES \$10,000 BAIL

Seattle, Aug. 8.—Dr. Linda Burfield Hazzard, charged with starving a patient to death by means of her "fast cure," this afternoon succeeded in raising \$10,000 bail and is on her way from Tacoma to this city, where she will consult with attorneys. Several more former patients of the woman doctor came forward today, stating that they were ready to give testimony, some for and others against the defendant.

In connection with the arrest of Dr. Hazzard, who is charged with causing the death of Miss Claire Williamson by her system of fasting, an examination of the mortuary records of King county shows that three persons who died while under Mrs. Hazzard's care were victims of "starvation," according to the death certificates issued by different physicians. These were:

Mrs. Viola F. Deaton, died May 10, 1905, death certificate signed by Ashley Palmer; Mrs. Blanche B. Tindall, died June 18, 1909, death certificate signed by Charles S. Ford, M. D.; Earl E. Erdman, died March 28, 1910, death certificate signed by J. C. Snyder. Five other patients are shown to have died while undergoing the fasting process prescribed by Dr. Hazzard, but their deaths were attributed to different diseases by the woman physician, who herself signed the death certificate in each case.

Dr. Hazzard's fast diet follows: First, the patient promises to do what Dr. Hazzard orders. Then the patient is put on one meal a day.

A few days this meal becomes a little soup once a day. Massages and breathing exercises are claimed to make up for the missing meals. This program is kept up until the patient is ready to leave the sanitarium.

## CLUBS IN RACE TO RAISE ROAD FUND

That part of Portland west of the river and north of Stark street has been organized into a district which will be visited by Rotary club committees, in cash for the improvement of the Rex-Tigardville road. If the Rotary club gets more cash than the Ad club, the prize will be a silver cup. As yet the Ad club leads. The Rotary club's original committee, Will Knight chairman, has collected \$115.

Arrangements for the systematic canvass were made at the Rotary club luncheon at the Richards this afternoon. George E. Vancouver, president of the Yamhill Auto and Commercial Club Good Roads association, appeared before the club, telling how the improvement of the Rex-Tigardville road will connect Portland with the Willamette valley and being business to every land merchant.

The Rotarians made elaborate plans for entertaining delegates to the National Rotary convention, which begins in Portland August 21 and continues through to the evening of August 23. The business of the convention will be diversified by automobile tours, boat rides, a banquet Wednesday evening and other features of entertainment. It has been arranged that Governor West and Mayor Russett participate in the formal welcome to the convention.

## "ROBBER" AND "UNFAIR" HURLED BY MEMBER

Washington, Aug. 8.—Chairman of "Robber" and "unfair" are being hurled today by the Republicans in congress who figured, directly or indirectly, in yesterday's brush with the Democrats on the baseball diamond.

The Democrats won, 13 to 2. But for the fact that the double umpire system was used, each side furnishing a man, a protest probably would be lodged with the president. The game was called at the end of the fourth inning, despite the protests of Longworth, Blount, Keefe and others, who declared that all precedents showed that at least five more innings should be played. The arbiters ruled that closure may be applied after two hours debate and the game already had gone nearly two and a half, the decision stood.

## NAVAL RESERVE MEN ARRIVE IN PORTLAND

Two companies of the Oregon Naval Reserve, with a band of 24 pieces, under the command of Ensign Karl L. Haines, in all 62 men, arrived in Portland from Marshfield on the steamer Breakwater at 2:45 o'clock yesterday afternoon. They were immediately taken to the Boston in launches and were assigned quarters. They were given shore leave last night and enjoyed the sights of the city.

Tonight the band will be tendered a reception at the Elks' club and will play during the evening. The Boston will leave with the reserve tomorrow for Astoria to take part in the centennial celebration and will remain there several days.

**Woman May Recover.**

San Francisco, Aug. 8.—Mrs. Catherine Decker who was shot by George Forsyth, who then committed suicide, has a good chance for recovery, according to the statements made today by the physicians at St. Francis hospital. Relatives are arranging for the funeral of Forsyth, whose body has been transferred from the morgue to a private undertaking establishment.

## ASK THAT OREGON HEAD PROCESSION

Secretary of Navy Urged to Have Ship Lead Squadron Through Canal.

The following telegram was sent today by the Chamber of Commerce urging the secretary of the navy to have the battleship Oregon lead the naval parade through the Panama canal when it is completed:

"To the Secretary of the Navy:—We respectfully request on completion of the Panama canal that the battleship Oregon lead all other ships through the canal because of its past record of achievement."

At a meeting of the board of trustees of the Commercial club held this afternoon President Beckwith will offer a similar telegram for the approval of the board, and which will undoubtedly be sent.

## MRS. GOODE BUYS A BUILDING SITE

\$125,000 Paid for Yeon Property at Sixth and Everett Streets.

Mrs. Henry W. Goode has purchased the Yeon property at Sixth and Everett streets for \$125,000. The property comprises a quarter block at the southeast intersection of Sixth and Everett and is covered with two story frame buildings. John B. Yeon bought the parcel three years ago from Dr. Andrew C. Smith for \$80,000. The investment yielding him a profit of more than 100 per cent in three years in addition to a fair income from rentals. The sale of the property to Mrs. Goode was negotiated by Charles K. Henry.

Mrs. Goode has recently sold undivided interests in several business parcels of realty and it is understood that she intends putting a substantial improvement on the Sixth and Everett street quarter block.

## DES MOINES CAR COMPANY CARRIES FIGHT TO COURT

The three years' contract between the men and the company will expire in October, and the men say that they expect the company at that time will discharge all its employees, serving notice that the contract will not be renewed.
