Weather Conditions.

There has been a marked increase of pressure within the last 12 hours over British Columbia and the basin and plateau states, and a decided decrease of pressure has taken place over the lake region, where a storm of considerable intensity is central this morning. The pressure is also low over the south Pacific slope, and the upper Mississippi and Red River valleys. Light rains have fallen within the last 12 hours in British Columbia, north central Montana, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, the Dakotas, Florida and the eastern lake region. A heavy rainfall of 1.44 inches occurred at St. Louis within the last 24 hours. Thunderstorms were reported from Havre, Moorhead, Huron, St. Louis and Buffalo. The weather is warmer in Utah, Nevada and the plateau and plain states, and it is cooler in north central California, northern Idaho, northern Montana and Maine. Elsewhere temperature changes have been unimportant. Conditions are favorable for fair weather during the next 36 hours in this district with rising temperatures in interior Oregon.

Altogether over 300 delegates from all parts of the country will meet in San Francisco.

Skidmore was arrested yesterday by Patrolman Pressey, after a search of several days, on complaint of his wife, Mrs. Skidmore, is responsible for the arrest of Mays and of P. Heavy Plum Crop.—B. He says he has a fine plum crop and that his plum trees are bending beneath their loads of fruit. His apple crop, he says, will be light. Last year, at the annual exhibition of the Oregon State Horticultural association, he won a bunch of first and second premiums on apples and prunes and he expects to have some fine displays this year.

Hunting for "Masher."—The police have been asked to search for a "masher" dressed as a modern Beau Brummel, who has been annoying young women in the vicinity of the old restaurant building on the Lewis and Clark grounds. He is described as being about 25 years of age, rather stout and with a little black moustache. He could be identified by John Ferring of 905 Upshur street, who informed the police of his actions.

Extensive experience has demonstrated the necessity of requiring deposits, and courts and commissions have held the practice to be reasonable and justifiable.

With the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph Company this deposit is returned at the end of one year, without application therefor by the subscriber, and with interest thereon at the rate of six (6) per cent per annum. This procedure of returning the deposit with interest has been followed and will be continued without regard to municipal action. Lack of receipt will not prevent the subscriber from receiving refund.

Individuals, firms and other corporations with labor or commodities to sell can extend or refuse credit in their discretion. A public service corporation is without this power.

The deposit is a guaranty that the subscriber will pay a telephone rate, the basis of which is an annual contract. It is a just and necessary protection to the company and patrons who comply with their contracts.

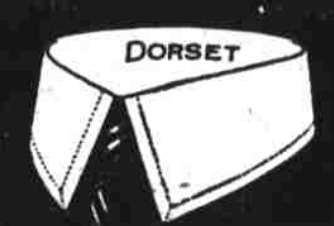
