

RILEY'S FIRST POEM DEDICATED TO DEAD

Copy of Poet's Maiden Effort,
Omitted From Works,
Sent to President.

Washington, Aug. 10.—Though count-
less gifts, usually more notable as curi-
osities than for their merit are re-
ceived at the White House, Secretary
Hillien the other day found in the presi-
dent's mail an offering of considerable
literary value. It was nothing less than
a copy of a hitherto unpublished poem
by James Whitcomb Riley, which he
himself has said was the first poem he
ever wrote. It has been omitted from
all collections of Riley's verse, owing
to its purely personal nature.
The verse is dedicated to Hamilton J.
Dunbar, who died in Greenfield, Ind.,
September 5, 1876. It is as follows:

Dead! Dead! Dead!
We thought him ours alone;
And none so proud to see him tread
The rounds of fame, and lift his head
Where sunlight shone;
And look thro' tears in vain for him.

Name! Name! Name!
It was his diadem;
Nor ever tarnish, taint of shame,
Could dim its lustre; like a flame
Reflected in a gem,
He wears it blazing on his brow
Within the courts of heaven now.

Tears! Tears! Tears!
Like dew upon the leaf
That bursts at dawn from out the years,
The blossom of the trust appears
That blooms above the grief;
And mother, brother, wife and child
Will see it and be reconciled.

In 1876, according to the letter sent
with the copy of the poem, James Whit-
comb Riley was 23 years old, and en-
gaged in the occupation of painting
signs in his native town of Greenfield.
Dunbar was one of its best beloved
citizens. Riley knew him well, and
idealized him.

Twenty years after Riley told this
preacher, the Rev. Henry A. Buchtel,
a Methodist:

"When the services were over I went
home and wrote a poem on Ham. Dun-
bar. It was the first poem I ever wrote,
and it gave me the idea that, after all,
I might be something more than a sign
painter."

CHEHALIS, ABERDEEN, TO VOTE ON COMMISSION

(Special to The Journal.)
Centralia, Wash., Aug. 10.—At the
next meeting of the city council in
Chehalis, Mayor Gingrich will set a
date for the special election to be held
to determine the voters' wishes in the
matter of a commission form of gov-
ernment. The petition for a special
election presented to the council sev-
eral weeks ago, has been thoroughly ex-
amined by City Attorney Studebaker
and the finance committee of the city
council, and it is perfect in all its main
points. The election date must be be-
fore September 25, or 60 days after the
time the petition was first filed.

Aberdeen, Wash., Aug. 10.—The com-
mission government has been abroad in
this section, and a petition for an elec-
tion to decide whether this city shall
change to that form is being circulated
and will soon be presented to the mayor.
It is the intention to call a series of
meetings to discuss the advantages and
disadvantages of the system. Many
feel it would be better to wait until
Hoquiam has had some experience with
the commission form, which it has just
put into use.

EXPERIMENT STATIONS NEEDED, SAYS HANLEY

William Hanley, the cattle king of
Harney county, and president of the
Central Oregon Development league, is
in Portland on his way to Astoria to
attend the meeting of the Oregon De-
velopment league to be held there Aug-
ust 14, 15 and 16. Mr. Hanley expects
several prominent central Oregonians
will journey to Astoria.
"I see a great need for agricultural
experiment stations in central Oregon,"
said Mr. Hanley this morning, "and
think that such stations should be es-
tablished at once so that settlers who
come into the dry farming districts
may get acquainted with methods and
get started in the right direction. We
don't want anybody to come out here
from the east or middle states and make
a failure. We want everybody to ac-
tually down on a piece of land and make
for himself a good comfortable home.
It can be done, but we should give these
people the right start. Begin at the
foundation and build up a great im-
munity. That's my idea. Let us have
these experiment stations without de-
lay and we will build a population on
solid ground."

CHINESE IS ARRESTED; COURT REFUSES BAIL

Lee Yip Mow, a Chinese arrested on
a charge of being illegally in the coun-
try as he stepped from an Oregon city
car last Tuesday, was refused bail in
the United States court yesterday. This
follows the precedent in another de-
portation case, which was appealed to
the United States circuit court and
affirmed and is now on appeal to the
supreme court. It has been found that
when Chinese are released on bail they
are usually so well coached by their
countrymen that it becomes almost im-
possible to show they are illegally in
the country. Lee Yip Mow is thought
to have been smuggled across the Mex-
ican line only a week or so ago, coming
by rail to Oregon City, where he
changed to an interurban car.
