

SALEM WILL MAKE FAIR OPENING HUM

Train With 500 Boosters Is Planned for Centennial Also, August 17.

Salem, Or., Aug. 10.—Reversing the old order of events in which the Oregon state fair has been opened with a scattering crowd and attendance, augmented throughout the week, Salem boosters are coming to the aid of the fair board and plan a big day on Monday, September 11, the opening day. On that day special honors will be heaped upon the old pioneers, who founded or attended the Oregon state fair, half a century ago. With a good crowd on opening day a big fair will be assured.
A feature of the fair this year will be a good roads day on Saturday, J. J. Hill and Louis Hill have been invited. The Salem Board of Trade is working on the fair and with the city of Salem will furnish automobiles for the pioneers, will decorate the city, and sprinkle the roads connecting paved streets with the fair grounds.
Resolutions declaring Salem's special interest in the centennial at Astoria because she is the second oldest city in Oregon and favoring a delegation of 500 or more to go to Astoria on Salem day, August 17, were adopted by the

Salem Board of Trade last night. A special train will leave Salem on the morning of August 17 and a committee of five is now working up a big delegation.
A rebuke to Mayor Lachmund was administered by the business men through the adoption of a resolution condemning the spirit of opposition to the railway company shown by the mayor. While Lachmund's name was not mentioned, all present understood that reference was made to his action in vetoing an ordinance for a franchise for a spur to the brewery. The mayor held for a common user clause but the railroad claims this is unreasonable, as the spur branch is not subject to the common user's clause.
Another resolution was passed favoring the re-election of Superintendent Chalcroft at Chemawa in the event the report is true that he is vindicated of the charges filed against him. The resolution expresses the highest confidence in Chalcroft and will be sent to Walter L. Fisher, secretary of the interior.

Willamette Faculty Changes.

Salem, Or., Aug. 10.—Professor W. J. Keller, last year head of the department of modern languages in Willamette university has resigned to accept a similar position in the University of Wisconsin. Professor R. B. Walsh of Columbus, Ohio, will take the chair left vacant. Mrs. Walsh will assist in languages. Professor E. B. Biddle comes from the Northwestern university to take charge of the departments of English and public speaking at Willamette. Miss Stella A. Chapel will be matron and assistant teacher in the academy. President Homan says he expects the freshmen class to be twice as large as the entering class of last year. The uni-

versity grounds are being renovated and put into good shape for the opening of school and for the state fair.

Finzer Can't Save Brodine.

Salem, Or., Aug. 10.—Adjutant General Finzer of the Oregon National Guard wired the attorney general's office yesterday that Private E. W. Brodine of company M of Salem was being detained on a civil charge contrary to the military code and asked that the attorney general have him released and sent to Columbia Beach at once. Assistant Attorney General Van Winkle replied that Brodine was held on a criminal charge. Under the statutes of 1907 non-support is a misdemeanor and Brodine had failed for a month to make the payments to his wife and family ordered by the court. He will be detained although the disappointment in not getting his trip to the seashore goes hard with him here in the county jail.

Atwood at first intended to make the start from Milwaukee instead of St. Louis as now planned.

KINNEY HOLDINGS WILL BE SOLD OUT

Long Drawn Out Litigation Over Coos Bay Projects to Be Closed by Receiver.

Marshfield, Or., Aug. 10.—The extensive Coos Bay real estate holdings of Major L. D. Kinney and his corporations, the Belt Line railway and the Coos Bay Rapid Transit company, will soon be in shape to be offered for sale. W. J. Rust, the trustee, has appointed appraisers to go over the property and set a value upon each lot and tract. He will sell for not less than the appraised price, and the total, according to the trust agreement, must aggregate not less than \$500,000. James T. Morris, John Graves and John Merchant have been appointed the appraisers.
All of the judgments against the property have been lifted and vested in the trustee, so that the latter can now give clear title. The real estate, when all plotted, amounts to about 12,000 city lots. It includes some of the most desirable property on Coos Bay, but for several years it has been tied up because of debts and mortgages and other legal complications of Major Kinney and his various corporations. Now that the trustee can give a clear title, the property will be thrown on the market, and

will admit of the building up of large tracts between North Bend and Marshfield and west of North Bend. As soon as the appraisers have completed their work the trustee will be able to offer the property for sale.

WINTERS DEED HELD UP PENDING QUIZ

After waiting two years to place a deed on record, W. E. Purdy, former captain in the Volunteers of America, filed an instrument yesterday with County Clerk Fields purporting to be a conveyance of valuable property on Grand avenue belonging to the estate of H. D. Winters. Deputy District Attorney Fitzgerald instructed the county clerk to hold the deed until an investigation can be made relative to the transfer.

The deed feature further adds to the entanglements of the Winters estate, which has a monthly income of \$400. Two women are already claiming they have the right to be administrator, and several persons from the east have written claiming relationship to the deceased. No relatives, however, have been found.
Since Winters was frequently involved in litigation, one of which was a breach of promise suit, it is thought the deed filed yesterday was given in anticipation of some threatened suit. The deed was executed May 1, 1909, and witnessed by M. L. Pratt and S. L. Wigle. The former is a stenographer and notary public, and the latter is a real estate dealer. Purdy was a friend of Winters, and now lives at Newberg. He offered no explanation for his delay in recording the deed. The signature of Winters on the deed corresponds with his signature on the registration cards.
Winters died early last spring. He

owns the half block on Grand avenue between Davis and Everett streets. Mrs. Agnes Butts, who acted as his secretary during the last two years of his life, took charge of the estate, as there were no known heirs. Mrs. Lora Maxfield now has filed a heavy claim against the estate and wants to be administratrix of the property. Attorney C. M. Idleman was Winters' legal adviser, and is trying to locate his relatives in the east.

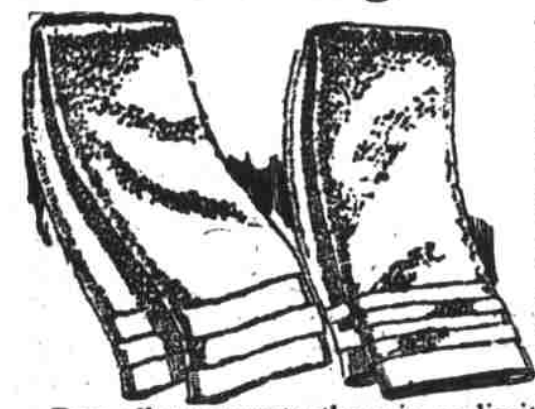
