RALEIGH EASILY WINS FROM SAC TO

Southpaw Never in Danger From Beginning to End—
Kern Stars.

Los Angeles, Aug. 12.—John Raleigh "came back" and never from the moment that the spoked wheel of the first ball until Hoger pitched under Kern's foul fly in the ninth did Sacramento look anything like a winner. Final score—Tigers 5, Senators 0. Hits—10, seven of them bunched, for Vernon; seven well scattered ones for the visitors.

EMERSON DEFEATS TYLER IN SINGLES

Tacoma, Wash., Aug. 12.—Through marvelous work at the net, combined with greater headiness in play, Nat Emerson, former middle states tennis champion, and one of the ranking players of the country, this afternoon demonstrated that he could "come back," when he defeated northwest champion J. C. Tyler of Spokane, for the Pacific northwest tennis championship in men's singles. The match was a grueling one from start to finish, and in spite of the fact that he was outgassed at every point, Tyler kept Emerson working his utmost to win. Tyler lost most of his points by driving into the net and failed to meet Emerson's brilliant returns at the net.

Emerson took the first two sets. Then Tyler braced and won the third and through erratic work lost a chance to take the fourth at a time when the North Yakima man was plainly tiring. The score in favor of Emerson was 6-4, 6-2, 4-6, 7-5.

Emerson's wonderful endurance was exhibited later when, after the singles, he played in three other matches, being victor in two.

May Sutton of Pasadena, rated as the world's champion woman player, defeated Mary Brown of Pasadena, in straight sets for the finals of ladies' singles, 6-1, 6-1.

Miss Brown played a brilliant game, running a large number of the games to deuce, but Miss Sutton's fierce driving from side to side of the court was too much for her.

Through the weakness of Captain J. F. Foulkes of Victoria, last year's Canadian champion, in service and at the net, Tyler and he lost to Sam Russell of Seattle, and Emerson in the finals of men's doubles, 1-6, 6-4, 7-9, 6-2, 7-5.

The match was hard fought throughout, Tyler playing better than in the singles, while Russell played the best game of his career. In the third set Foulkes and Tyler won out when the score was 5 to 1 against them.

In the semi-finals of the mixed doubles, Emerson and Miss Brown defeated Mrs. Fahrenstock of Tacoma and Matterson of Victoria, 6-3, 6-1, and then lost in the finals to Miss Sutton and Captain Foulkes, 6-4, 6-4.

Emerson gets the Charter Thorpe cup and Miss Sutton the Vaeth cup. The cup donated by Miss Susan Clark of Portland, goes to the Los Angeles Country club, as represented by Miss Sutton and Miss Brown, they having won the most points of any club entered.

All other firsts and seconds in the various events were awarded special silver cups this evening.

Miss Sutton leaves Tacoma Monday morning for Niagara-on-the-Lake, where she will meet Miss Hazel Hotchkiss, national champion.

WIGGS HIT HARD BY WILLIAMS' MEN

GLAVIS TAKES UP HIS NEW DUTIES

Former Field Division Chief Assumes Secretaryship of Commission.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Sacramento, Cal., Aug. 12.—Louis E. Glavis, who was discharged from the department of the interior after he had caused the disclosure of alleged frauds in the Alaska land claims, implicating former Secretary Ballinger, arrived here today to take up his duties as joint secretary to the California conservation commission and water power board of control, to which he was appointed as an annual salary of \$3600. Dressed in an ordinary blue serge suit and Panama hat, tired from eight days' traveling from Portland to Chicago and back to California, the young man who caused the downfall of Ballinger seemed an unassuming youth, ready for bed than for the discussion of national questions.

He refused to say anything about the Controller Bay fracas and President Taft's explaining message.

"As for the work I am to do here in California, I shall have more to say when I have found what my duties are to be," Glavis said. "I was chief of the field division of the department of the interior for California and Nevada, during part of 1908 and 1909, so the land here is not altogether new to me. For many years, of course, I have been intensely interested in the conservation of our natural resources, and it's a real pleasure to continue that work in California."

"Generally speaking, the principal purpose of conservation is to secure the greatest possible development of natural resources with the least possible waste, under such regulations as will prevent monopoly. These purposes, it would appear, are carefully prepared for in the acts under which we are to work here in California."
