BOY HELPS JUDGE DECIDE QUESTION

Expected Legal Battle Suddenly Terminated When McGinn Talks With Lad.

The 10-year-old son of William Van Scoy, manager of the Alliance Film company, and his former wife, Frances, occupied a big leather chair beside Presiding Judge McGinn of the circuit court yesterday afternoon as the parents fought over the custody of the lad.

"The boy has helped me decide this question," said Judge McGinn, "and I shall direct that the mother be awarded his custody for three months and the father shall then take him for three months. Their custody shall alternate until the boy is 12 years old, when he can then decide for himself."

Mrs. Van Scoy secured a divorce from her husband in 1907 in Iowa. She also was given the custody of the child, who was 6 years old. The father had taken the child away before the divorce was finally settled, however, and has had the custody since.

When the boy is with the mother I want him to hear nothing but the best of his father," said the judge, "and when he is with the father I want him to hear the same of his mother. He must be taught to love both parents, and when old enough he can then choose which he prefers."
