

DENTIST IS HELD AS GIRL'S JAILER

Wealthy San Bernardino Man
Charged With Holding Young
Woman Prisoner.

(United Press Special Wire.)
San Bernardino, Cal., Aug. 17.—
"Please take me back to him. I love
him better than all else in the world.
For God's sake, let me see him if only
for a few minutes. Even my little
baby seems to know that something is
wrong. My heart is simply breaking."
This is the constant plea of Miss
Jessie McDonald, 21, whom the police
allege was held a prisoner for 15
months in a darkened room in one of the
main business blocks of San Bernardino,
while the detectives conducted a state-
wide search for her. She begs com-
passionately to see Dr. A. W. McDavitt,
a wealthy local dentist, in whose office
the girl's father, D. McDonald, a con-
tractor, says his daughter was held
prisoner under alleged hypnotic in-
fluences. McDavitt is a prisoner in the
county jail, but no charge has yet been
placed against him. The dentist has
a wife and two children.

"For my sake and for the sake of his
other family," pleaded Miss McDonald,
today, "do not prosecute him. It would
kill me if anything were to happen to
him."

At the county jail today McDavitt em-
phatically denied that he held Miss Mc-
Donald prisoner.

"Fifteen months ago," he said, "she
complained to me of the treatment she
was receiving at home. I offered her
the use of the room in which she was
found, and since then she has remained
there of her own volition. I exerted no
hypnotic influence and have done no

Gertrude: To beautify the com-

A. D.: Do not employ the electric
needle for the removal of those stray

OUSTED OFFICIALS RESENT SUSPICION

Eugene Policemen Want Pub-
lic to Have Specific Charges
Against Them.

Eugene, Or., Aug. 17.—The ousted po-
lice officers are incensed at the attitude
taken by the city council in re-
fusing to divulge the alleged charges,
which were covered at a meeting of the
city council a few nights ago by the
general charge of incompetency and
state that they will endeavor to force
the council to make public the charges.

They declare that they do not appre-
ciate the reservation of these myster-
ious charges. "In order that they may
not be humiliated," as the council mem-
bers said, and say that the suspicions
arising are more humiliating than any
possible charges they are aware of.

Former Night Chief Branton says
that he has employed legal help and
will force the members of the council
to make public the charges on which
his resignation was demanded. Officer
Farrington states that the only thing
that he knows that could be placed
against him is that he is accused of
holding a warrant until the person had
a chance to get out of town. The
councilmen and mayor still refuse to
give out any hint that would lead to
the nature of the offenses.

It is understood, however, that the
trouble is that several times recently
it is believed that certain persons and
places were either protected or care-
lessly neglected, while the officers
were aware that the law was being
violated. Acting Mayor Ness states
that "It is not a case of getting money
for neglecting to enforce the law and

not one of the city council believes
that the chief is morally corrupt. There
have been numerous complaints, some
of which would indicate that the offi-
cers were morally corrupt, but we do
not believe this is true; consequently it
is best to only charge inefficiency."

Both officers have issued statements.

Citizens Protect Woman.
Eugene, Or., Aug. 17.—The inter-
ference of the police saved Charles Hardt,
a butcher of Springfield, from being
roughly handled last night by citizens,
who gathered as he was beating his
wife in his butcher shop, which is lo-
cated on a prominent corner of Main
street. Passersby heard the screams of
the woman, who is frail and small, as
her intoxicated husband was beating
her. Leaders of the crowd that endeav-
ored to rescue the woman from the
hands of her husband were repulsed for
a moment when he seized a big meat
cleaver and threatened to kill the first
who interfered. He was overpowered
and dragged into the street by the mob,
where he was rescued by Officer Glen-

denning, who locked the man up. A
charge of assault and battery was
pressed against him and he was given
a hearing at once, although it was
after 1 o'clock.

**Dispute Over Terms of Gas
Supply Settled and Work
on Plant Will Begin.**

(Special to The Journal.)
Klamath Falls, Or., Aug. 17.—All that
remains to be done to insure Klamath
Falls a gas plant is the adoption of
the measure permitting the F. W. Board-
man company to begin work. After
several weeks of sparring between the
attorneys for the gas company and the
council a franchise has been prepared
that meets the approval of both the
officers of the company and the members
of the city council.

The company will begin work on its
system just as soon as the ordinance
granting the franchise is adopted. Under
the new franchise the company will be
permitted to operate for a term of
10 years before the council shall have
the privilege of changing the rate which
is fixed at \$1.50 per thousand cubic
feet. The minimum charge is fixed at
\$1 per month. After 10 years the coun-
cil shall have the privilege of changing
the rate every three years.

Getting Ready for Fair.

Klamath Falls, Or., Aug. 17.—Prepara-
tions are under way for a big agri-
cultural fair and race meet to be held
in Klamath Falls this fall. Sufficient
funds have already been pledged to
make the event a grand success. The
fair and race meet will be held on the
last four days in September.

Klamath county has a good average
crop this year. It is the intention of
the men in charge of the fair to gather
a fine display of products which will
be preserved by the Chamber of Com-
merce.

**TRAIN KILLS YOUTH ON
SNAKE RIVER BRIDGE**

Ontario, Or., Aug. 17.—Elmer Cross-
white, 16 years old, was struck and
instantly killed by the west bound pas-
senger train on the railroad bridge near
Nyssa about 7:15 o'clock last evening.
The young man was working near Apple
Valley and was on his way to the home
of his brother, at Nyssa. He had ar-
rived only last Saturday from Butler,
Tenn. Engineer Hayes who noticed him
too late to stop the train, said Cross-
white seemed confused as the train ap-
proached. The body was brought to
Ontario on the train and an inquest
was held by Acting Coroner G. L. King.
A brother, Tom Crosswhite, arrived this
morning from Parma, Idaho, to take
charge of the body.
