

MOB HOOTS GIRL'S ALLEGED CAPTOR; M'DAVIT UNNERVED

Dentist Cringes in Cell, Fearful of Frantic Townspeople's Rage; Wife Rushes to Side; Girl Now Accuser.

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Bernardino, Cal., Aug. 18.—Dr. A. W. McDavit, the wealthy local dentist who is charged with having held Miss Jessie McDonald a captive for 15 months, has lost his nerve and today is cowering behind the bars of his cell in the county jail.

The stern faces of the crowd at his hearing, the whispered threats and the sight of clenched fists of brawny men has left the dentist a nervous wreck and he is making no effort to raise the \$1000 bail necessary for his release.

Jealousy Brings Story.

Jealousy of another girl on whom Dr. A. W. McDavit is alleged to have showered presents, caused Miss Jessie McDonald, 21, daughter of a prominent building contractor, to go before the district attorney today and tell the story of her 15 months' stay in the room adjoining McDavit's dental office.

"I was hypnotized by Dr. McDavit," Miss McDonald told the district attorney.

"I met him four years ago. Nearly three years ago our first child was born. A year ago last May I determined to leave San Bernardino. At the railroad station I met McDavit, and he persuaded me not to go, and took me to the room which I have occupied for 15 months."

Sentiment Runs High.

Sentiment is strongly against the accused man and the sheriff is preparing for any emergency.

Miss McDonald, McDavit's alleged victim, has suffered a complete nervous breakdown. She says that her love for the dentist has entirely vanished, and that she will do everything in her power to keep him in jail.

Dr. McDavit, father of the girl, said today that he would like to see McDavit freed for a few minutes. "Just long enough," he said, "to give me a chance to wipe up the ground with the viper."

Standing loyally by her husband, Mrs. A. W. McDavit, wife of the imprisoned dentist, rushed today to his defense.

Victims "Willing Subjects."

"Dr. McDavit," she said, "may be a hypnotist, but I venture to say that his alleged victims were willing subjects. The world may say and believe what it pleases. I do not care. He has always treated me right, and that is all that I have ever asked of the world. It is true that I fell in love with him while he was working on my teeth, but that is nobody's business."

Fired by curiosity, scores of persons today broke into McDavit's office and the room where Miss McDonald is alleged to have been held, and almost completely stripped the apartment of all furnishings. The police were forced to use their clubs to disperse the mob.

The crowd then went to the county jail and hooted and jeered at the prisoner until driven away.

Test of Her Love.

Miss McDonald today told more of her love for McDavit.

"For five years," she said, "we have been devoted to each other. He merely cast his eyes on me and I was fascinated. When I would determine to go away the power of his eyes changed my plans. I love him yet—I cannot help it—but now that I have learned that other girls are in his 'charmed circle' I will never return to him."

The police today visited Irene Gibson, a pretty young woman of Bloomington, a suburb. With a baby not quite a year old on her knees, she told of her love for McDavit.

"Yes, I love him," she said, "and I guess that I always will. This is our baby. Isn't he cute?"

Miss Gibson said that she also fell in love with McDavit while having dental work done.

For it, because I could not bring myself to self criticism for such a thing.

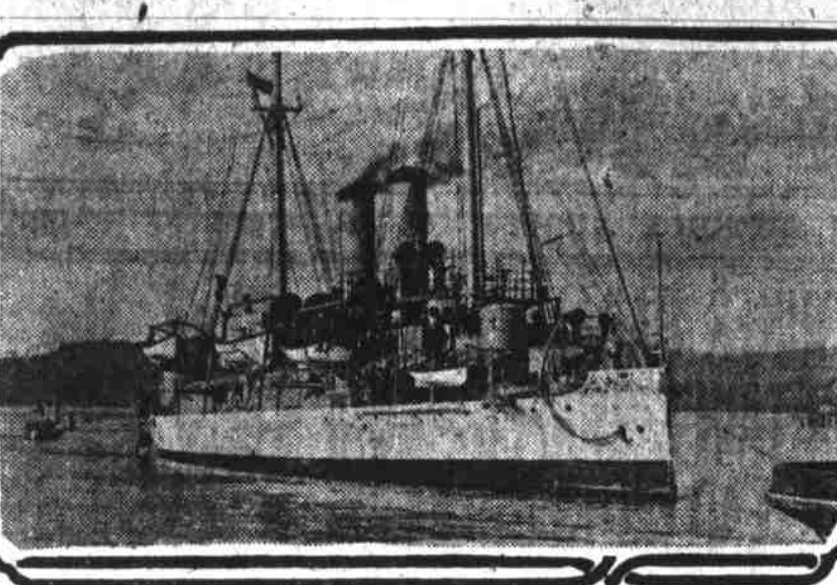

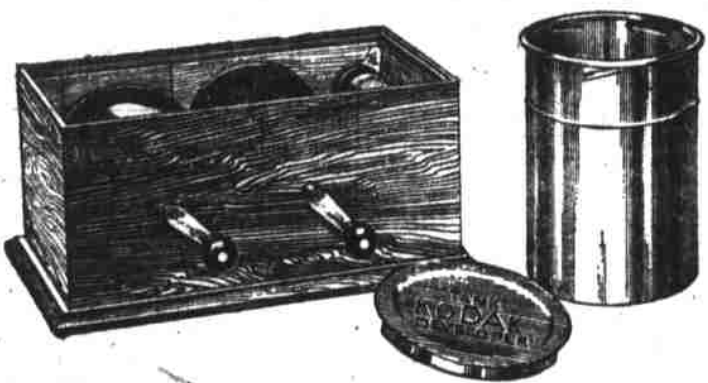
