

Birdman Arrives at Buffalo Flight Record Set at Chicago

ATWOOD REACHES BUFFALO IN HIS OVERLAND FLIGHT

W. G. BEATTY WINS DURATION FLIGHT WITH PASSENGER

Boston Aviator Covers 86 Miles Between Erie, Pa., and Buffalo, N. Y., in Face of Chilling Wind.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Buffalo, Aug. 19.—The face of a treacherous wind that threatened to dash his aeroplane to earth, Harry N. Atwood, the Boston aviator, flying from St. Louis to New York successfully navigated the air from Erie, Pa., to Buffalo, a distance of 86 miles, late this afternoon.

Atwood's arrival at Kenilworth Park race track was unheralded and only a few hundred people were on hand to greet him. Within 15 minutes after he had descended, however, the old race track resembled a derby day gathering. The young aviator was surrounded by admirers and throngs of women proffered their hands and congratulations.

Hands Numbbed by Cold.
"I kept about 1000 feet in the air most of the way here because I could make better headway at that height," said Atwood upon alighting from his machine. "It was a cold, hard ride and my hands were numb and I shivered most of the way."

Atwood arrived at 7:02 p. m. having left Erie at 4:33 p. m. Earlier in the day he flew from Fairview, Pa., into the city of Erie, 12 miles.

Ascending at Erie, Atwood struck out for the Lake Shore & Michigan Southern railroad tracks which he followed most of the way.

Just over the New York-Pennsylvania state line he began a search for more favorable conditions and glided down to within 400 feet of the earth. Finding no more favorable currents he rose again and until he reached Buffalo city limits it was one continuous flight against adverse currents.

When Atwood made his descent here it was his first stop in New York state and when he stepped from his machine at Kenilworth he was exactly 86 miles from New York and he is confident that he will complete the world's long distance air record. Atwood started from St. Louis last Monday and his arrival in Buffalo meant that he had covered 826 miles and has flown over portions of six states.

Rochester Next Stop.
Atwood stated that on Sunday morning he will give an exhibition flight at Kenilworth before resuming his flight for New York. He will probably leave here at 1 p. m. tomorrow, passing over the New York Central right of way and perhaps landing at Rochester for gasoline. He will probably make Syracuse by tomorrow night.

It is probable that Atwood will complete his trip to New York in a different machine than the one he drove into this city tonight. A new biplane is awaiting his arrival at Utica.

Up until tonight Atwood had flown 805 miles since leaving St. Louis, in 25 hours and 45 minutes.

Atwood arrived in Erie from Swanville, Pa., where he spent the night, at 11:10 a. m. It was his intention to proceed eastward at once, but owing to the high wind he was compelled to wait and it was 4:55 this afternoon before he started for Dunkirk, circling over the temporary aviation field at Erie.

As Atwood covered 86 miles in this flight, it is apparent that his speed to date equaled, if it did not exceed, that of the first day of his trip from Pontiac, Ill., into Chicago. When Atwood left Erie, he expected, owing to high winds, to fly only to Dunkirk, but on progressing eastward he passed no more dangerous currents. As he was going west and at a moderate height when he reached Dunkirk, he concluded to try for his original destination—Buffalo.

Aviator Sets New Record in Chicago Meet by Sailing Air With Companion for Three Hours 42 Minutes.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Chicago, Aug. 19.—One world's record, that for duration flight with one passenger, was broken today by W. G. Beatty, the Wright aviator, who carried a passenger over the Grant park aerodrome for 3 hours, 42 minutes, 23 5/8 seconds. The previous record was 3:19, held by A. Mergo, a German flyer.

Beatty had no trouble establishing the record and declared tonight he could have continued up much longer had he been permitted by the contest committee to rise earlier.

The eighth day of the aviation meet capped the climax of the sensational flying, Lincoln Beachey and Jimmy Ward doing particularly daring spirals and dips until flagged down and fined for violating the aerial joy riding rules.

After Altitude Record.
According to announcement made tonight, a determined effort will be made tomorrow to break the world's altitude record, after the fluke announcement that Oscar A. Brindley had risen 11,728 feet, when, as a matter of fact, he had lifted his aeroplane only 5768 feet.

The record is 11,155 feet, held by Commandante Felix of the French army. Ward, Beachey, Parmelee, Gill, Beatty, Brindley and other high flyers tomorrow will attempt to break this record.

The crowd which attended the meet today was the largest ever gathered in the west, 85,000 persons paying admission, while it is estimated 250,000 saw the flights from the free spaces in Grant park and from the roofs of adjoining buildings.

The meet will close officially tomorrow, though a special benefit will be given Monday for the widow of St. Croix Johnstone, killed Tuesday. All the aviators have donated their services for this benefit.

The passenger carrying contest of the day was won by Phil Parmelee, who, in his biplane, circled the field three times with three passengers, a total weight of 458 pounds extra. Second money went to Tom Sopwith, who carried two passengers, with an excess weight of 48 1/4 pounds.

The world's quick climbing record was also broken. Rene Simon and Tom Sopwith, both in monoplane, climbed 500 meters, or 1640 feet, in 3 minutes, 55 seconds. Though he cannot recall the previous record, G. Campbell Wood, official statistician of the Aero club of America, declares himself certain that the twin time is a new world's record.

Lincoln Beachey climbed the same distance in a biplane in 3 minutes and 55 seconds.

SEATTLE GETS 24TH POSTAL BANK IN STATE

Seattle, Wash., Aug. 19.—Postmaster George F. Russell has been instructed by the postmaster general to establish a postal savings bank to open September 8, an inspector to arrive prior to that date and explain its operation to those who are to take charge. Assistant Cashier A. E. Drake has been appointed overseer of the savings bank. For the time being deposits are to be received only at the main office, although later it may be possible to deposit at substations.

Seattle's bank will be the twenty-fourth established in this state, those now operating being at Aberdeen, Anacortes, Bremerton, Centralia, Chehalis, Colfax, Coville, Ellensburg, Hoquiam, Montesano, Mt. Vernon, Olympia, Port Townsend, Prosser, Pullman, Puyallup, Ritzville, Sedro-Woolley, Snohomish, South Bend, Sunnyside, Vancouver and Wenatchee. Olympia has \$12,000 on deposit.

Joseph, Or., Home Burns.

Kodinopes already has taken long walks in Europe and Asia, one of which was from St. Petersburg to Paris, which he made in 82 days. JUDGMENT FILED AGAINST MOORES

Receiver Devlin Puts Lien on Grand Theatre; Defendants Say Wives Own It.

Vancouver, Wash., Aug. 19.—Thomas C. Devlin of Portland, receiver for the defunct Oregon Trust & Savings bank of that city today, through his attorneys, filed a judgment in the superior court in Vancouver, obtained against Walter and William Moore for \$15,153.30. In connection with the action, a lien was taken out on the Grand theatre building at Tenth and Main streets, erected last year by Mayor John P. Higgins at a cost of \$50,000.

The defendants secured A. E. and M. H. Clark of Portland and P. J. Kirwin of Vancouver as their attorneys. It is alleged by the defendants' counsel that the Grand theatre property is owned by their wives and the case will be fought through the courts.
