CHAMPIONS ARE ON TOP AGAIN IN COAST LEAGUE PENNANT SCRAMBLE

When Portland took the second game yesterday by leading Los Angeles at the end of the seventh inning, 3 to 1, they made up for the ninth inning loss of the first game, 3 to 2, and took at least a 24 hour lead in the Coast League race, and whether they hold it depends upon the result of the game this afternoon between Vernon and Oakland.

Even Judge W. W. McCredie, the Portland magistrate entered the field and argued the case with the umpire, the first time in his life that he ever took part in a field argument.

Hildebrand maintains that Barry purposely got in the way of the ball, while McCredie asserts that he was within his rights on the running path.
