

BEATTIE JURORS UNDER SCRUTINY

Records of Talesmen Being Searched Carefully by Attorneys for Defense.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Richmond, Va., Aug. 22.—Attorneys for the defense today are scrutinizing the records of the talesmen on the venire from which a jury is sought to try Henry Clay Beattie, Jr., for the murder of his young wife.

Beulah Blinford, "the woman in the case," pleaded in vain today for an automobile ride. She is exceedingly disappointed because she was not allowed to attend court at the opening of the trial.

The defense today received an anonymous letter from a man declaring that he murdered Mrs. Beattie. The killing was explained in detail by the writer. The prosecution, however, places little credence in the missive.

Owing to the fact that four trial jurors were peremptorily challenged by the defense after the court had adjourned until Wednesday, Sheriff Gill today summoned an additional venire of 30 residents of the county. The panel will report at the trial tomorrow and the required number of jurors will be selected.

Pinning their hopes on breaking down Paul Beattie's story of his having purchased the shotgun for the alleged slayer three days before the murder, Beattie's lawyers have summoned 24 witnesses including five women, most of whom are former associates or fellow employees of the prisoner's cousin. It is understood that some of the witnesses will testify to having heard calls for help and the sounding of a motor horn immediately after the crime was committed.

W. M. KAISER, AGED 58, SALEM LAWYER, DEAD

Salem, Or., Aug. 22.—William M. Kaiser, a prominent lawyer and native son of Oregon, died at his home in this city last night. He was born near Salem, February 10, 1853. Graduating from the Salem public schools he entered Willamette university, where he took a degree in 1874. After eight years teaching school he was admitted to the bar and had since been one of the leading attorneys of the valley. For 25 years he was a law partner of Tilton Ford. After Ford's death the partnership of Kaiser, Bogue & Slater was formed. The funeral will be held from the Catholic church tomorrow.

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SAYS POLICEMEN NEED ADDITIONAL VACATION

Councilman Ralph C. Clyde spoke this morning at the regular monthly meeting of the Policemen's Athletic and Benevolent association in advocacy of giving each officer two days' leave each month, in addition to the annual vacation of two weeks. Patrolman Epps presided.

Clyde announced his purpose to introduce a resolution in the council two weeks from tomorrow. His idea is that arrangements may be made to give the officers their days of leisure on alternate Sundays in each month, but details will be left to the police commission.

Clyde contends that this is a measure of justice to policemen, placing them more nearly on an equality with city hall employees, who do not work Sundays and have a half holiday on Saturdays.

Widow Gets \$3500.

The Portland Railway, Light & Power company has settled with Mrs. Frances I. Larson as administratrix of the

estate of her husband, Adon I. Larson, for \$3500. The amount has been approved by Judge Cleton in the county court. Larson was employed as a line-man by the company and lost his life working among the wires on a pole at Oswego on June 21.

PENDLETON ROUND-UP TO BE HUMMER

"The Pendleton Round-Up will be the most largely attended event in Oregon this year," declared Dr. W. H. Lytle, state veterinarian and sheep inspector, whose home is in Pendleton, today.

"In central Oregon and Idaho there won't be enough people left at home to milk the cows. No event is more distinctly Oregon, none more fascinatingly interesting. We will have more people at the Roundup than will attend the state fair. We will draw attendance from all parts of the United States and the program will contain the most thrilling and picturesque features that have ever been presented at Pendleton."

The date of the Pendleton Round-Up is September 11 to 14, and Dr. Lytle says preparations are being actively made, and are now so far advanced as to insure success.

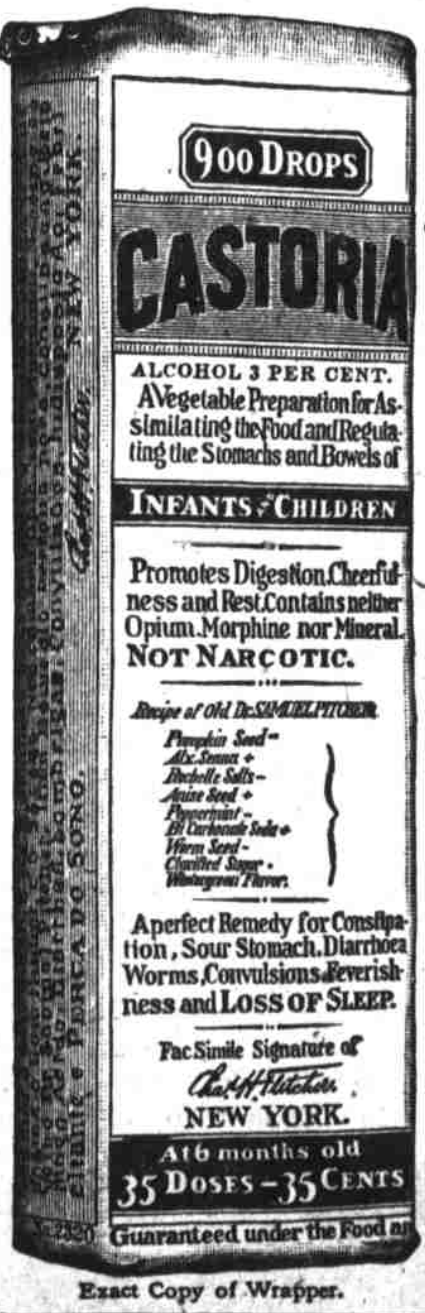
